Number of Merkel Women Knit for **British War Relief**

Knitting for the Red Cross and British War Relief organizations has been started by a number of Merkel women, according to Mrs. Connor Robinson, who has been asked to be chairman of this work in Merkel.

A call was issued last week in the Merkel Mail for experienced knitters from Merkel or surrounding communities to do volunteer knitting on garments, such as women's and children's sweaters, socks, mittens and children's caps or beanies. Yarn and needles for these garments will be furnished; but it is desired that experienced knitters work on these garments, as they must be made perfectly, and according to instruction.

Those not capable of knitting garments can knit or crochet six inch squares out of any kind or color of scrap wool yarn, following any pattern, and knit on any size needle up to a No. 6. Anyone having scrap yarn not being used is asked to call Mrs. Robinson who will collect it for use. Thursday, July 31, from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m.,



Austin, July 24 .--- Germany can't win.

That was the flat prediction Sunday of C. E. Ayers, University of Texas economist and author.

"Having lived by the sword, the totalitarian economy has no alternative to going on that way except to perish," he said, "for sooner or later the slave-nations conquered by Germany will rise and crush her."

The German plan of economic world domination, which will ultimately destroy the totalitarian regime, is this, Ayers said:


