

"MADRID SWEET CLOVER PLANTING TIME"

Madrid sweet clover is a hardy biennial yellow blossom variety of sweet clover obtained several years ago by the U. S. Department of Agriculture from the Botanical Garden in Madrid, Spain. It is highly recommended for this section of Texas because of its ability to withstand our drouthy conditions and because of its growth habits, being somewhat lower growing, leafier, fiber stemmed and possessing early seedling vigor. It has about the same uses as other sweet clover such as soil improvement, grazing, hay erosion control and seed. Either of these uses are worth the effort of growing the crop; however, if properly managed you should realize considerable advantage from each of its uses during the life cycle of the plant. This strain of sweet clover is perhaps best adapted to fairly tight soils which are free of cotton root rot. It has been observed growing in this area from the tighter clay soils to the fine sandy loam and on shallow gravelly soils. It will naturally do better on the more productive soils and for trial plantings should probably be planted on average land on your farm for a fair test. Soils which are low in phosphorus should have a light

application of super-phosphate prior to planting sweet clover.

Madrid sweet clover seed are very small, being about 260,000 seed per pound. This fact substantiates the recommendations that the preparation of your seed bed is of utmost importance. The seed bed should be prepared early by onewaying or breaking reasonably shallow so as to be in condition to utilize fall and winter rains and snows. About this time of year preparation should be made to level and firm the seed bed as much as possible. This can be done with a section harrow or drag and is preferable to run a cultipacker behind these operations so that the seed bed will be firm at planting time.

With your seed bed in a good firm smooth condition you are then ready to plant madrid sweet clover. It is considered best to plant this crop in February or March whenever ample moisture is present in the soil. We are recommending planting this crop in 3 ft. rows as nearly flat as possible, at the rate of from 2 to 4 lbs. of seed per acre, and covering the seed from one-fourth to one-half inch deep. Your regular farm tractor planter can be used for this work provided the boxes are tight to prevent seed leakage; otherwise it is best to use a small seed planting attachment to fit inside your planter boxes. The district has several sets of these attachments for use by co-operators who desire to use them. The Soil Conservation district also has a cultipacker for use by district co-operators at a nominal charge per acre. In adjusting your planter for sweet clover it is best to use medium size sweep on the planter beam with your opening plow running about one inch deep. The covering plows should be removed and a sack with a little

dirt in it drag behind the drills to cover the seed. This operation should leave the rows fairly level to prevent covering of young plants on seed by erosion if heavy rains fall prior to the clover plants getting large enough to cultivate.

With normal seasons the crop should be ready to graze by June 1st and should furnish grazing throughout the summer and fall up until a heavy freeze occurs. This will be the expected result provided the plants are not cropped too closely. The plant is killed back to the ground by a hard freeze and it remains in this stage until the weather begins to warm in late February. This plant will put out new growth from the roots the

beginning of the second year and furnish early spring grazing for about 6 weeks provided moisture is normal. Grazing should be withheld usually beginning about April 1st to permit the crop to make seed. Under normal conditions the crop should yield from 200 to 300 lbs. of seed per acre.

Both Warren, cooperator in the Salt Branch Conservation group, is having a large diversion terrace constructed on his farm to provide additional drainage for a large farm pond which has been built for several years and has never been completely full. This diversion terrace will divert an additional 20 acres of

very steep sloping land around an escapement to this pond. The terrace ridge and channel will be seeding to bermuda grass. Mr. Warren is constructing contour furrows on a sizeable area of his pasture to improve the grass cover and to retard runoff. He plans on fencing this area for a few years and completely defer the area to enable the grasses to re-establish themselves.

New terraces are being built on these cooperating farms: W. B. Tombs of Blair Conservation group, Andrew Baker of Merkel group, W. A. Richburg of South Trent Conservation group, and L. R. Lewis of Carpenter's Gap group.

Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights?

A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days, one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-incurred injury or disability incurred within that first 90-day period of service, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the termination of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months.

Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have dependents.

Q. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas?

A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in?

A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled, if you enlist for 3 years.

Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade?

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.

Q. Is there any other way I can reenlist in grade?

A. Yes, if you held one of certain military occupational specialties, and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, you can reenlist in a grade depending on the length of time you held the desired M. O. S.

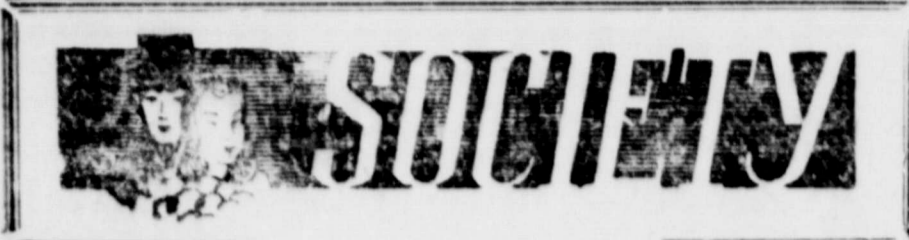
