MEETS DEATH

All But One of the Crew on B-29 That Crashed Near Merkel Early Tuesday Night Drop to Safe Landing.

Nineteen members of the 20-man rrew of the B-29 which crashed about 8:10 Tuesday night three and onehalf miles west of Merkel, just south of the railroad tracks, parachuted to safety, and eighteen of the numnight.

Of the two missing crewmen, the nineteenth member, Sgt, Gregory Bussiere, was found about midnight Tuesday on the King ranch about 17 miles southwest of Merkel. He suffered a badly injured knee.

Shortly before noon Wednesday the body of the 20th crewman. Lt. Irving Bloom of Albuquerque, N. M., was found by searchers suspended in a tree about 12 miles southwest of Merkel. He was wearing his parachute which had caught in the tree. The parachute was open.

Ten of the fliers were taken to the Sweetwater hospital, two were brought to Merkel and two were carried to Hendrick Memorial hospital. Five who were seriously injured were later flown to Brooke General hospital, San Antonio.

M-Sgt. Don Lee Ellis, 26, of Paris, was brought to Sadler Clinic early Tuesday night. He had suffered a broken right arm immediately after pulling his ripcord.
