The governor's proclamation, issued in Austin, points out that the percentage of rural homes in Texas having electric service has increased from 2.3 per cent to 55 per cent during the past 12 years.

"More than 160,000 farm and ranch families of Texas now enjoy the benefits of electric lights and power through cooperatives which they, themselves, own and operate," the proclamation stated.






