"Because of the acute water shortage caused by continued dry weather, we are asking residents not to use water for washing cars or for irrigation purposes in order to conserve water for necessary uses for health and sanitation," Mayor A. J. Canon stated to a representative of The Mail Thursday morning.

"It is hoped that consumers will do this voluntarily but if the request is not complied with it may be necessary to make the regulation compulsory by law," he added.

#### City Council Studies Advisability of Calling Election for Issuing Revenue Bonds for Water and Sewer Improvements.

Advisability of calling an election for the issuance of revenue bonds in the sum of approximately \$100,000 for water and sewer improvements in Merkel was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the city council, presided over by Mayor A. J. Canon, with three aldermen present: Joe Cypert, Robert Hicks and Earl Hughes, but it was decided to defer final decision until the next meeting date, Aug. 16, when the complete board could be present. (The other two aldermen, O. B. Leach and J. W. Hammond, were out of town, when this week's meeting was held.)

Of course, this part of the program is in its infancy.

The projector is simply this: our Veterans' hospitals where our boys lie flat on their backs unable to turn the pages of a book to read, this projector does the work for them, throwing the story onto the ceiling so that each may read and help pass the hours away.

Aside from the funds for the projector, money was raised for several films, all of which will be sent to the Veterans' hospital at Kerrville.
