SUPPLY OF GAS RESTORED IN MERKEL AREA

Lone Star Gas Company Relaxes Curtailment Order Within Few Hours After Precautionary Steps Had Been Taken.

At 8:30 p. m. Wednesday, Local Manager Frank Breaux of the Lone Star Gas company received orders relaxing the order, which had come earlier in the afternoon, (between 1:30 and 2 o'clock,) curtailing natural gas service to all industrial users, thereby cutting off schools, laundries, theatre and other indus-

The Dallas office of Lone Star Gas. issued a statement to the effect that the curtailment order had been relaxed when it was determined that reserve supplies of natural gas were greater than estimated earlier on Wednesday.

The original order, it was reported, was made necessary "by demands 38-year history, despite a record amount of construction and enlargement of facilities since the war and row-Sheppard Funeral home, was in particularly during the past 12 months."





3 Unions Block Labor Peace—Refuse Wage Boost Already Accepted by 19 Other Railroad Unions!

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen and the Switchmen's Union of North America, representing 125,000 railroad employes, have refused to accept the offer of the Railroads of a

wage increase of 15% cents an hour.
This is the same increase awarded 1,000,000 non-operating employes by an arbitration board in September, 1947. This is the same increase accepted by

175,000 conductors, trainmen and switchmen by agreement on November 14, 1947. Agreements have been made with 1,175,000 employes, represented by nine-teen unions. But these three unions, representing only 125,000 men, are trying to get more. They are demanding also many new working rules not embraced in the settlement with the conductors and train-

Incidentally, the Switchmen's Union of North America represents only about 7% or all railroad switchmen, the other 93% being represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and covered by the settlement with that union.

Strike Threat

Strike Threat

The leaders of these three unions spread a strike ballot while negotiations were still in progress. This is not a secret vote but is taken by union leaders and votes are signed by the employes in the presence of union representatives.

When direct negotiations failed, the leaders of these three unions refused to join the railroads in asking the National Mediation Board to attempt to settle the dispute, but the Board took jurisdiction at the request of the carriers and has been earnestly attempting since November 24, 1947, to bring about a settlement. The Board on January 15, 1948, announced its inability to reach a mediation settlement. The leaders of the unions rejected the request of the Mediation Board to arbitrate. The railroads accepted.

What Now?

The Unions having refused to arbitrate, the Railway Labor Act provides for the appointment of a fact-finding board by the President.

The railroads feel it is due shippers, passengers, employes, stockholders, and the general public to know that throughout these negotiations and in mediation, they have not only exerted every effort to reach a fair and reasonable settlement, but they have also met every requirement of the Railway Labor Act respecting the negotiation, mediation, and arbitration of

labor disputes.

It seems unthinkable that these three unions, representing less than 10 per cent of railroad employes, and those among the highest paid, can successfully maintain the threat of a paralyzing strike against the interest of the entire country-and against 90 per cent of their

The threat of a strike cannot justify granting more favorable conditions to 125,000 employes than have already been put in effect for 1,175,000, nor will it alter the opposition of the railroads to unwarranted wage increases or to changes in working rules which are not justified.

Most bulbs are planted too shallow. The required depth to set the base of bulb is at least three times its own depth below the soil level. The bulb should rest on a one-inch layer of coarse sand. This should be enriched with humus (peat moss) and plant food. The enriching of the soil below the bulb, where feeding tales; place, is of more importance than the condition of the soil above the bulb. The only requirement for the soil above the bulb is that it is light and porous garden soil.
