Average Class Ranks About Three Months Above Norm Score

A series of achievement tests given to the pupils of the Merkel Grammar school recently revealed that on the average each class rank about three months above the norm or standard score.
During the past seven months each class has gained about seven and one-half months on the average.

Only two grades, the eighth and seventh, ranked below norm. The separate grades ranked as follows: first grade, about 4 months above norm; second grade, one month above norm; third grade, five months above norm; fourth grade, six months above norm; fifth grade, about 5 months above norm; sixth grade, about six months above norm; seventh grade, about 5 months below norm; eighth grade, about four months below norm. The school as a whole ranked below norm in only two subjects, literature and social studies. Here's how the school ranked in the ten subjects: science, 12 months above norm; choice of words, one and one-half months above norm; literature, 10 months below norm; dictation, 5 months above norm; reading vocabulary, about one-half month above norm; reading comprehension, 7 months above norm; social studies, 2 months below norm; health, 10 months above norm; arithmetic reasoning, 6 months above norm; and arithmetic computation, 3 months above norm.

Last October about 50 per cent of the pupils were ranked below norm, but in April this figure had been reduced to 31 per cent, a reduction of 19 per cent in the number of pupils ranked below standard score.

Father of Merkel Woman Passes Away

Mrs. J. M. Salter was called to the bedside of her father, J. J. Bachus, who died Wednesday night of last week at Cisco. He had celebrated his 100th birthday with Mrs. Salter last September.

Born in Carlton, Ga., Sept. 13, 1847, he was reared in Alabama where he became the owner of several lumber mills. In 1907, he moved to West Texas where he bought a ranch on which he resided until his retirement in 1925. After the death of his wife in 1937, he had made his home with another daughter, Mrs. B. C. Ingram, of Cisco.

1/2 cup Pet Milk
1/4 cup uncooked rolled oats
2 1/2 tsp. leavening
finely cut onion

1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 hard-cooked eggs, shredded
1 tablespoon shortening

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Mix together meat, milk, oats, onion, salt and pepper. Shape half of mixture into oblong patty about 6x3 inches. Arrange eggs, end to end, on top. Cover with remaining meat mixture. Shape into loaf, sealing in the eggs. Top with bits of shortening. Bake about 1 hour, or until brown. Serve warm or cold. Makes 4 servings.
