# Blade Editor Tells About Paris Trip

We returned Friday, July 19, from a fabulous trip to Paris, France.

My sister, Jane McBeth of Colorado Springs, and I flew from Amarillo to Dallas on Thursday, July 11, 6:30 a.m. We changed airports at Dallas, flew to New York City, where we taxied to another airport and flew to London. We spent a couple of hours there and flew on into Paris, arriving approximately 24 hours after leaving Amarillo.

After clearing customs and immigration, a Trans-National Travel Agency representative escorted us by bus to our hotels. In the evening, we were honored with a welcome party and a hour's briefing where we signed up for optional tours. My sister, Jane, was a little over-excited and signed us up for all the tours, so we saw everything!

We took bus tours through the city and country, a panoramic sightseeing tour of Paris and an illumination night tour.

We took a tour through the Versailles/Park and Trianon, which was a lavish castle built over the course of fifty years by Louis XIV. We enjoyed walking through these grand chambers.

We visited the Louvre, a castle which was the home of the Mona Lisa and an immense collection of art and artifacts.

We took a cruise down the Seine River one evening and saw the famous landmarks of Paris by night. That evening we stopped by the Sacre Coeur and walked around the "Place du Tertre," where the artists and painters meet nightly.

One day we visited the Chateau Country and Chartre, this was a step back into the era of nobility and we spent a day in the "Garden of France," and visited the Cathedral in Chartres, as well as toured two other castles and viewed four other castles that day. We were told there were over 3,000 castles in Paris and hundreds of thousands of castle ruins there.

One evening we had dinner at the Eiffel Tower and viewed the spectacular Paris skyline. The Eiffel Tower is almost 1,000 feet high and we were told it was 7,000,000 pounds of iron. It was a thing that didn't go with anything else in Paris. They told us that it took four years to paint this monstrosity and by the time they finished, it was time to start over. It was fascinating but rather grotesque.

We were surprised and amazed as we were introduced to their way of life. They are bronze colored people with very strange dispositions.

There are very few private homes there and not any of those homes were outstanding. Most of the people live in the high rise apartment buildings. There are no yards around the buildings, only concrete. Most of the apartments had potted plants in the windows. Our guide told us that there were only small simple apartments and the average rent was \$300 to \$500 a month.

The Paris homes were simple and only had two bedrooms, bath and kitchen. No one was ever invited to their homes. They would get together down town at the sidewalk cafes, which were everywhere, or they would meet at the bars. Every night, while we were there, the streets were filled with people until midnight and after.

The cars were all very small, partly because gasoline was \$2.50 a gallon and the streets were very narrow. We never saw big cars. The buses were very nice and many ride the buses everywhere. There are no school buses. The bus that we rode on all week was very pretty and looked new with picture windows all along the sides and pretty pleated drapes.

The average salaries of the Paris people are \$500 to \$1,000 a month.

One day we took an all day tour to the outskirts of Paris and we traveled about two hundred miles from Paris. We saw the pretty crops of wheat, barley, corn, rye and sunflowers. All of their land is in cultivation and there are no unpaved roads in France. France is

## Around The House

Learn more about one of the oldest methods of food preservation. Janette Pierce, Parmer County Extension Agent and Connie Moyers, Southwestern Public Service Marketing Representative, will be demonstrating the latest techniques in drying and using dried food. This will be held Wednesday, July 24, at 2 p.m. in the Farwell Community Center.

Recently, drying food has regained popularity because it is easy, inexpensive, nutritious, requires less storage space than foods preserved by other methods, and has a reasonably long shelf life. There are also a variety of methods which can be used, one of which will suit anyone's situation. Try sun drying, solar drying, oven drying, convection oven drying, microwave oven drying or use commercial dehydrators.

Fruit leather is a nutritious snack, as well as a good way to use over-ripe fruit. Try this easy method.

Fruit Leather--suggested fruit: apples, apricots, blueberries, cherries, plums, peaches, raspberries, strawberries, or a combination of fruits.

Directions: place 2 cups of fruit

in a blender or food processor. (You may add a sweetener for tart fruit.) Puree fruit mixture and pour onto a plastic wrap lined drying rack or cookie sheet. Tape plastic down on corners. Dry at 140-150 degrees for 6-8 hours. When dry, the mixture should be bright, translucent and chewy. While still warm, peel away from plastic and store by rolling and wrapping in plastic. Leathers will keep at least one month at room temperature, four months in the refrigerator or one year in the freezer.

Variations: add cinnamon, nutmeg, lemon or orange peel, raisins, coconut or chopped dates.

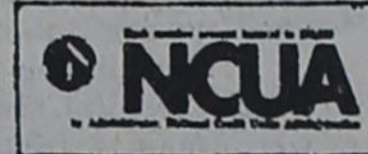
Drying food was in the olden days and still is a good way to preserve surplus food. Especially if the freezer is crowded, or when canning jars are full or if this method appeals to you. For more information, the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service has a publication called, "Drying Fruits & Vegetables at Home." This can be obtained at the Parmer County Extension Office, located on the second floor of the Courthouse in Farwell or by calling 481-3619.

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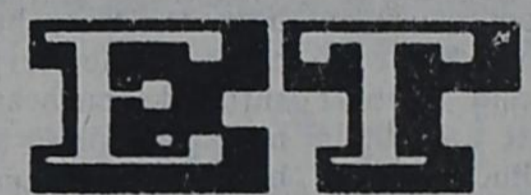

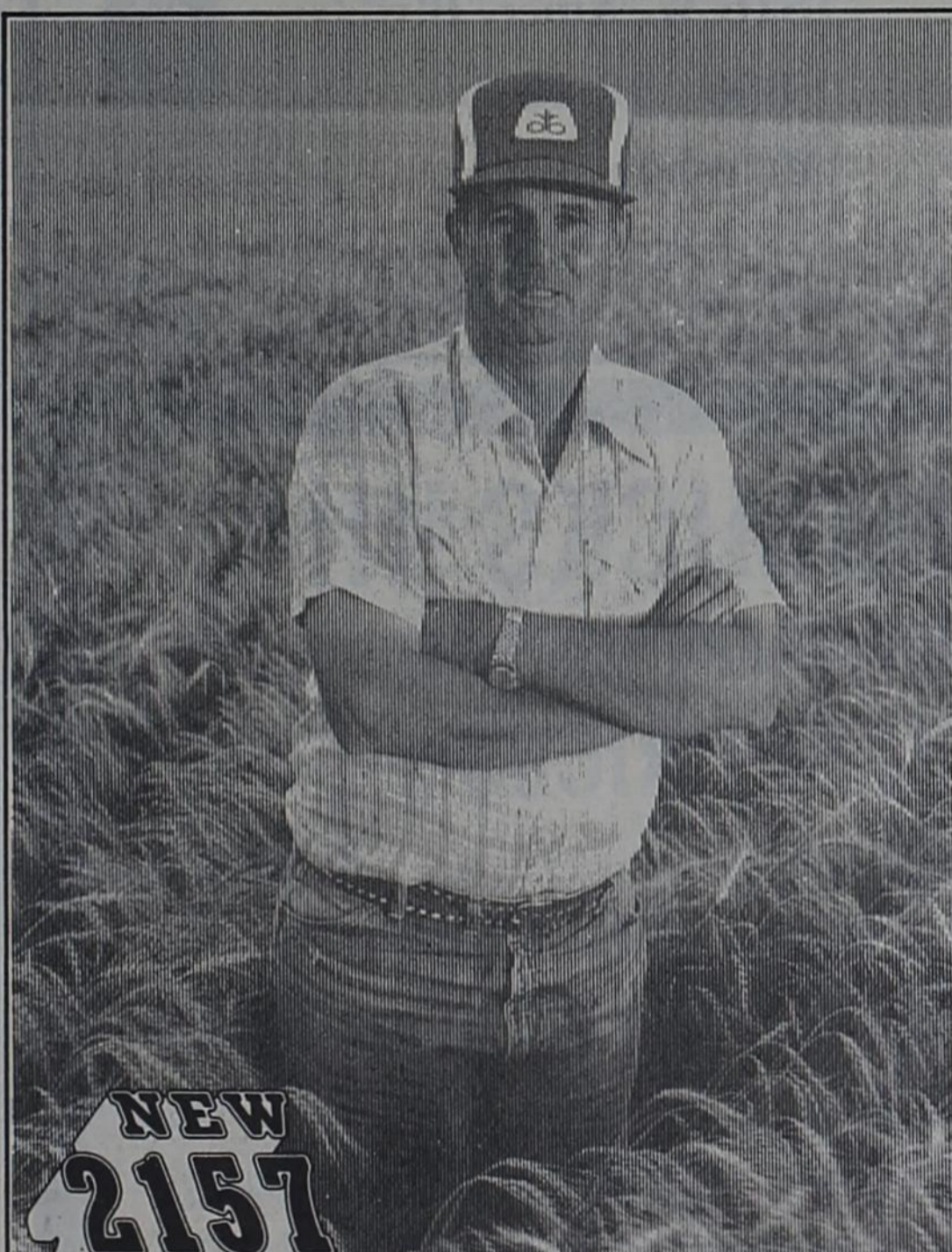
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# Scooter's Scoops
