One of Merkel's First Citizens Writes Letter To Editor; Recalls Early Days of This Area; Extends Sympathy on Death of Old Friend

The following letter just received from an old time resident of Merkel will, we believe, be of interest to many of our readers. We are therefore printing it in full just as received by us.

Merkel, Texas

Dear Sir:
My copy of the Merkel Mail always reaches me on a Monday morning. This Monday I was saddened by the news of the passing of my old friend Wm. A. Campbell. Although I have not seen Will face to face for upward of sixty years I still see him in memory as he sits in the choir in the old college building, and I can still hear his voice, clear and true, above the others of the choir, most of whom, I have no doubt, have long since passed to their final reward.

I wish to extend my sympathy and condolence to his bereaved wife and family. I remember Will as I took his picture in my little studio, just south of the depot, to place with other members of the Presbyterian Session in a group setting, a copy of which now hangs in the living room of the residence of Sam Butman Sr. in Merkel. The members of the session, as I recollect, were — Rev. A. A. Baker, J. L. Vaughn, Mr. Warnick, Mr. McMillan, Mr. Childers, Doc. Marten, W. A. Campbell, Mr. Clinton and W. W. Wheeler.

Mrs. Campbell will remember the photo I took of her while she was yet Miss Sally Hall. And now you will want to know who in the heck I am. Well!

Early settlers will remember me as "Trobe Vaughn. I was the first boy to ever live in Merkel. We came to Merkel in 1862. My father was station agent for the T. & P. My mother, Abbie G. was night operator. Because the nearest house, excepting the depot, was the old stone Story house some miles to the north-west we had to live in the depot. We children were — Madge, (later Mrs. Sam Butman Sr.) Edna, Evadine, George and myself.

Merkel had a population of several thousand prairie-dogs and ground squirrels. Coyotes and antelope were frequently shot at from the depot platform. A band of roving Indians passed through between Merkel and Trent but were not sociable enough to call, for which we were duly thankful. The only people we saw were those on the daily trains, two short, three-car passengers and two freights, and any cowboy passing by would stop and have a meal with us.

As my father was fond of company and was also the real-estate agent, he would stop every covered wagon

going through, the hopeful ones headed west and the disillusioned ones headed for back home. We soon had a little town building up around us.

My memories of the pioneer days of Merkel are very vivid and many are the tales and anecdotes I could tell of those wonderful times but the ones that might interest you most are those when the first editor of the Merkel Mail dropped off the train and said he was going to start printing a paper there.

I believe it was in 1884 and we already had quite a few stores, a church and school building, etc. (A painting by my father of the town can be seen at the residence of Sam Butman Sr.)

Many were the suggestions turned in for a name for the paper and it was about a week after his arrival that Mary Jane Cox approached my father and announced he had decided on a name for his paper, THE MERKEL MAIL. We all waited with impatience for the first issue, which was not long in coming, and needless to say, everyone bought a copy and perused it to the last word.

Now, sixty years later, I still look forward to the coming of my copy of the Mail both with sorrow and with pleasure. Sorrow to note the passing of the old settlers and pleasure to read of the improvement and prosperity of the town which I can truly say was my home town and that I was Merkel's first boy. I like to see the new face of the paper and wish to say you are doing a grand job.

Of the things I love to recall are the religious services which were held in the depot freightroom. The Reverends Norris and Strickland, drove to Merkel from their homes in Mulberry Canyon to deliver their long-winded but reverently listened to sermons. Not having had a chance to preach for months these sermons would go on and on. As our cook-stove was in the freightroom Mother often had to call a halt so she could cook dinner for the many visitors who had come miles in their covered wagons to hear the sermons.

Sunday school, with Father as superintendent, was in the afternoon with everybody, young and old, attending. The cowboys hunkering down with their backs against the wall seemed to enjoy it as much as anyone.

So much for the first days of Merkel and Mr. Editor, please say "Howdy" for me to any of the old timers who may remember

Foreign War Vets Hold Meeting In Stamford Oct. 21-22

Semi-annual meeting of District No. 8 of the Department of Texas, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will be held in Stamford Saturday and Sunday, October 21 and 22, with Stamford Memorial Post No. 9179, as host.

J. T. Rutherford, Odessa and Austin, commander of the Department of Texas, will attend this meeting. Justin Morrow, Rotan, is commander of the 8th District, which is the largest in the state.

Commander Rutherford will outline the national and state V.F.W. program for the current year, with special emphasis being placed on the nation-wide community service program being sponsored by the world's oldest and largest organization of overseas veterans.

On a state-wide basis the Department of Texas is sponsoring a fund raising campaign for the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, the state's own center for treatment of victims of polio and other crippling diseases. 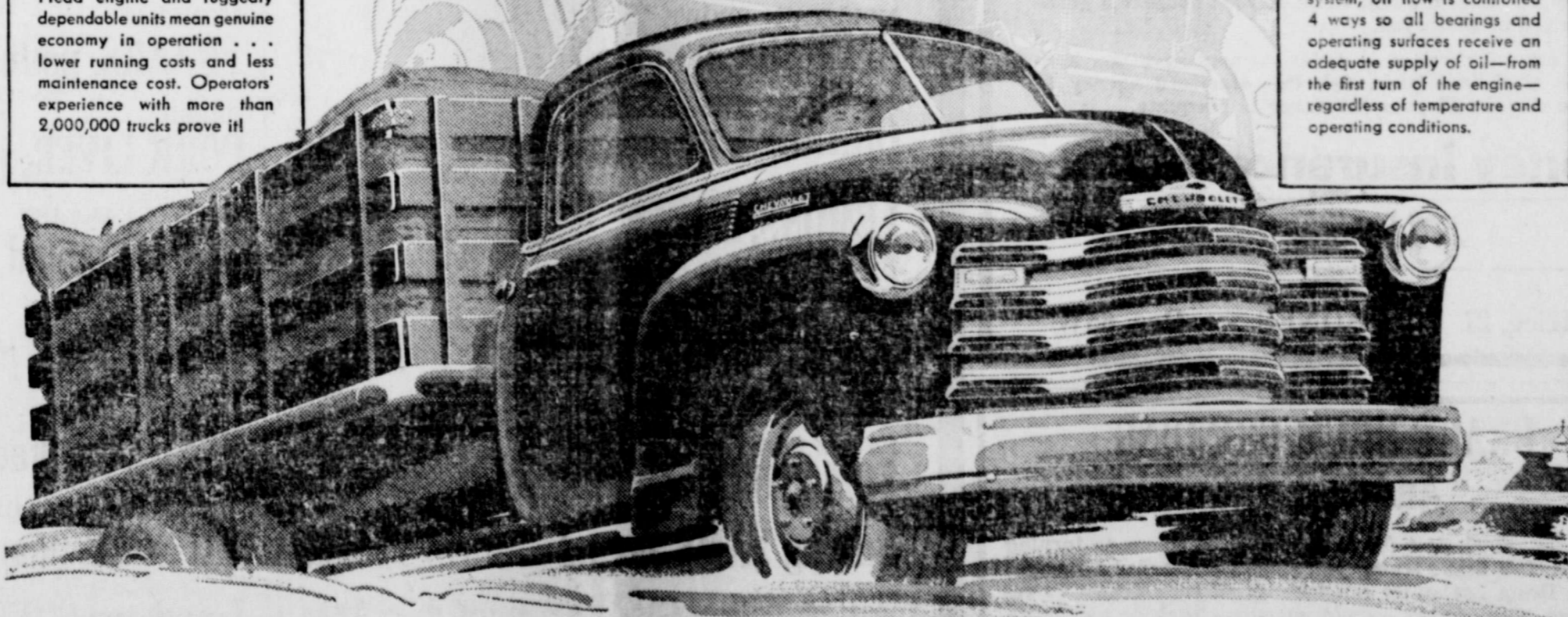

Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation News

The White Church conservation group held a group meeting Monday night, Oct. 2, at the church building. A fine group was present and good interest shown. Technicians from the Soil Conservation Service met with the group and showed conservation movies and local pictures featuring good conservation practices. The central theme of the meeting was the use of good conservation measures in controlling wind erosion. The use of crop strips and winter legumes was outlined.

C. B. Rogers, cooperator in the North Stith area, has planted 35 acres of winter peas and will plant 5 more acres when the present crop on the land is harvested. This is the second year for Mr. Rogers to plant winter peas on his sandy soils. He is planting these peas following maize. He prepares his seed bed in a manner to leave all the maize stalks on the surface soil. This large amount of litter protects the soil and the young pea plants until they are established. This combination of crop litters and winter peas is proving to be a sound conservation practice on that type soil.

N. D. Teaff, cooperator with the district in the Cross Roads area, has constructed a large waterway on his farm this past week. This work involved the leveling up and filling in of a small straight sided ditch which was inadequate and had grown up in trees, and the shaping of a large oval shaped waterway 150 feet along the natural course of the drainage way. This waterway area will serve as the water course on run-off water for about 300 acres of outside water and as terrace outlets for a 139 acre field. Mr. Teaff plans to seed this area to small grains at once to serve as temporary cover to prevent washing. This work was done with the county maintainers.

C. M. Brown, cooperator in the Ramsey Group, has harvested his 8 acre patch of first year King Ranch bluestem grass for seed. He harvested this with a combine directly off the stalk and drug a tarpaulin to catch the seed hay. This seed hay was dumped in windrows and will be run back through the combine after it ma-

tures. The remnants of this seed hay after running through the second time will be scattered in thin spots of the present patch and on another area to be reseeded. Yield figures are incomplete at this date but it is considered very good in light of the fact that he figured he had a weed patch all spring and summer until about 6 weeks ago when the King Ranch bluestem begin to show up above the weeds.

Buster Horton, cooperator in the Salt Branch area, harvested his 5 acre patch of King Ranch bluestem last week using a similar method to that described for C. M. Brown. Mr. Horton's patch should make about 50 pounds of seed and he plans to use this in reseeding another area. Mr. Horton has been practicing deferred grazing on a 60 acre pasture this summer and it has helped wonderfully to improve and strengthen his grasses. He has grasses showing up now that you could not find last year. The grasses have made a good top growth this summer and have increased their vigor. He will have good surface litter this fall and winter to protect the soil and to add organic matter to the soil. Spring and summer deferral of farm pastures is the best conservation practice a farmer can use in improving his pastures.

C. F. McCoy, cooperator in the Hope Church group, has completed about 3 miles of new terraces on his farm this week. These terraces were built with a disc belt type terracing machine.

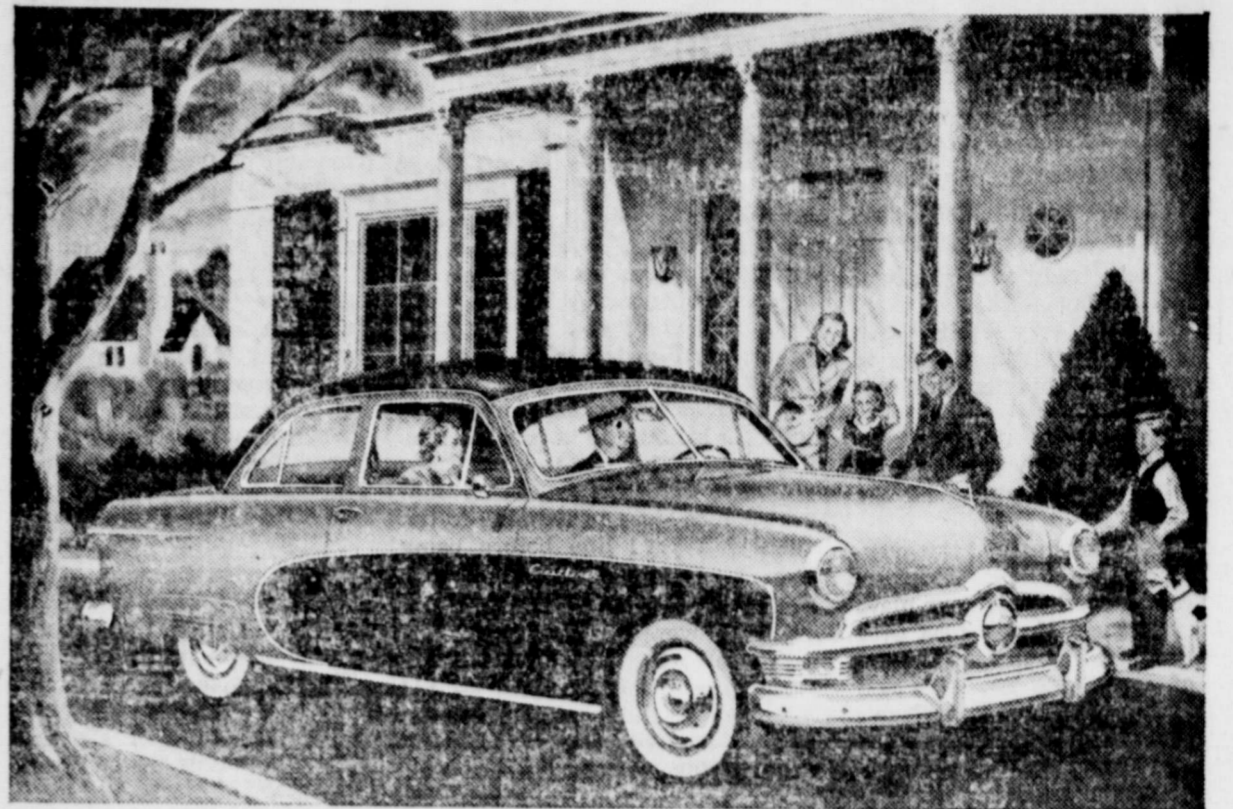

Recipe of the Week

SWEET POTATO CUSTARD PIE

- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 cups mashed sweet potatoes
- 1 1/2 cups top milk
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice

Beat eggs slightly; add sugar and mix well. Add flour, salt, and spices; then add potatoes and blend until smooth. Gradually add the milk.

Turn into unbaked pastry-lined pie pan. Bake in hot oven 450 degrees F. for 10 minutes; then in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 40 to 50 minutes or until a silver knife comes out clean when inserted in the filling. Makes one 9-inch pie.
