Rural Women In Texas H.D. Clubs Get Information

More than 41,000 organized Texas rural women in 185 counties had opportunity to study and use homemaking information originating with the A. & M. College Extension Service. This information was provided by county home demonstration agents to the 41,282 members of 2,317 community home demonstration clubs who in turn gave it to 344,753 other families. Clubs meet 12 to 24 times yearly for practical demonstrations of homemaking methods and discussion of current topics.

The rural women, through 131 county home demonstration councils in the state, advised with home demonstration agents in planning their programs, carrying home-making information to non-club members, and learning how to function in organizations to get home-making information. At the same time they headed public support, financial and otherwise, for Extension work in counties. An example was obtaining salary increases for home demonstration work in six of the 18 counties in one Extension district largely through the vigorous cooperation of councils.

A. cotton classers and the tag carries the grade and staple length for the bale.

Demand promises to be strong for this year's crop and the grade and staple information will enable the farmer to get the best price for his cotton.

Gainesville Community Circus is a complete three-ring exhibition of arenic artists, including acrobats, aerialists, tight wire performers, trained elephant, horses, ponies, goats, dogs and monkeys and two score clowns, but it is presented entirely by citizens of Gainesville, Texas, who in every-day life are lawyers, doctors, businessmen, clerks, housewives, soda dispensers, school teachers, delivery boys and students.

Despite the fact that it is a non-professional show, it is, nevertheless, the third largest circus in America in number of performers participating in the program, and it is likewise the third oldest circus in this country, having been established in 1930.

The circus will be brought to Abilene in its entirety, and will exhibit at fair park. Tickets for the performance may be obtained at the Mackey Company, 1133 North Second. At the evening performances, the served seats at \$1.80 each. General admission seats are \$1.20 for adults and 60c for children. For the Saturday afternoon matinee all tickets are \$1.20 each. The tax is included on all the quoted prices.

Mesquite Control Of Range Land

Chemical control of mesquite on range land is receiving a great deal of attention by ranchmen and by various agricultural agencies. More than 6,000 acres of range land in Reagan County will be sprayed this spring with ester of 2,4,5-T. According to County agent Nevills, this chemical will be applied by airplane at the rate of two-thirds of a pound of 2,4,5-T to one gallon of diesel oil and three gallons of water per acre.

Most Texas range lands are producing only 50 percent of their former capacity. A. H. Walker, Texas A. & M. extension range specialist has said.

This condition is due to overgrazing over a long period, drought and brush infestation. Sixty million acres of Texas range land are infested with various brush species, of which mesquite is the most important.

Walker has recently prepared a leaflet on controlling mesquite with chemicals. Extension Leaflet 127 gives directions for applying 2,4,5-T by airplane and to individual mesquite trees. It is available from county agricultural agents' offices.

Pink Boll Worm Cotton Enemy No. 1

John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has called for the most stringent measures against the pink bollworm, which has been called the cotton industry's enemy No. 1.

The worm today infests 171 Texas counties and costs farmers millions of dollars a year by destroying cotton and lowering grades. The farmers' expense in infested areas is increased because of treatment required at the gin to prevent spread of the "pink peril".

Diphane Z-78 and Puratized Agricultural Spray, in 1950 tests, show promise as effective fungicides for controlling pecan scab.

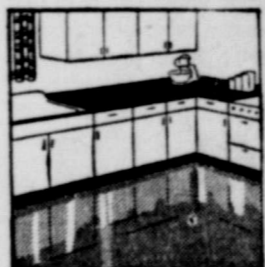
