Mock Drumsticks

Broadcast: May 12, 1951

1 lb. boneless lean pork, 1/2 in. slices
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup fine, dry bread crumbs
1/2 cup Fat Milk
3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt
No. 2 can peas
1 cup diced carrots, canned

Cut meat into 1 1/2-in. squares. Sprinkle with pepper and 1/4 tsp. salt. To make drumsticks push meat close together on 4 wooden skewers. Roll drumsticks in crumbs. Then dip in 1/2 cup milk. Roll again in crumbs. Brown slowly on all sides in hot shortening. Add 1/2 cup vegetable liquid. Cover; cook over very low heat 1 hour, or until meat is tender. Remove meat to warm platter. Stir into liquid left in skillet 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Heat slowly until slightly thickened. Add drained peas and carrots, heat until steaming hot. Serve with drumsticks. Makes 4 servings.
