



### In Congress Forty Years; Again Ist Candidate at 88

If you have trouble getting ice rays out of the refrigerator, fold a piece of wax paper under them when placing in the freezing unit. They will then slide right out. Wax paper under cookies on a baking tin will enable you to lift them out easily, without breaking or sticking. The best way to oil your door

lock is to put the oil right on the key and turn it several times in the lock. For a door with squeaking or stubborn hinges, lubricating oil is best applied with a feather.




