ONE OF THE PROGRAMS which congress is struggling to finish before they adjourn for the Christmas holidays is a Tax Reform Bill.

Opinion: It's going to be tough for a congress to vote for reduced tax exemptions, etc., for the general public, after exempting themselves this past week from new pension taxes, which are to affect all federal employees.

Or on the other hand, if the House of Representatives is that self-serving, in comparison with other federal employees, perhaps they could make it doubly tough on the rank and file taxpayer. Personally, ye editor is hoping that the Christmas break comes with no new tax program.

Witness the 1984 special session of the Texas legislature and the so-called School Reform Bill.

ON THE SUBJECT of government, a reader gave us this clipping, which appeared recently in the Ann Landers column. I think part of it has appeared lots of places, maybe even in our column.

"COMMUNISM: You have two cows. The government takes both of them and gives you part of the milk.

"FASCISM: You have two cows. The government takes both cows and sells you the milk.

"NAZISM: You have two cows. The government takes both of them and shoots you.

"BUREAUCRACY: You have two cows. The government takes both of them, shoots one, milks the other, then pours the milk down the drain.

"CAPITALISM: You have two cows. You sell one of them and buy a bull.

"Abby, what happens in a democracy?

"Dear Mrs. McC.: In a democracy, everyone has two cows, then a vote is taken and whatever the majority decides to do, you do, and that's no bull!

"Dear Abby: Our founding fathers did not establish a democracy; they established a republic. Let's use the two cows to illustrate the difference:

"In a democracy, you have two cows. A vote is taken among all the people, 99 percent of whom never saw a cow; they think milk comes from the supermarket. Whatever the majority decides you should do with your cows, you do-unless the government pays you not to raise cows, shoots one, milks the other one, and pours the milk down the drain.

"In a republic, you have two cows. You can sell one and buy a bull, have one or both cut up into steaks, or sell both and move into a condominium because under a republic each person has the inalienable right to do whatever he darn well pleases to do with his property. And that's no bull either. Around here, we call it liberty.

"Dear Abby: I hate to contradict your definition of democracy, but everyone in America does not have two cows. A more accurate description of how the system works would be: You have two cows, one neighbor has 10 cows and another neighbor doesn't have any. The government takes one of your cows and uses it as collateral to get a loan. It uses one-third of the money for "defense"-to protect your remaining cow-gives one-third to a foreign government to keep it from going communist, and spends the other third on research to find out why your neighbor's 10 cows aren't worth as much as your two were.

"Then the government milks the cows, makes cheese and gives it to the poor people, who would rather have a cow.

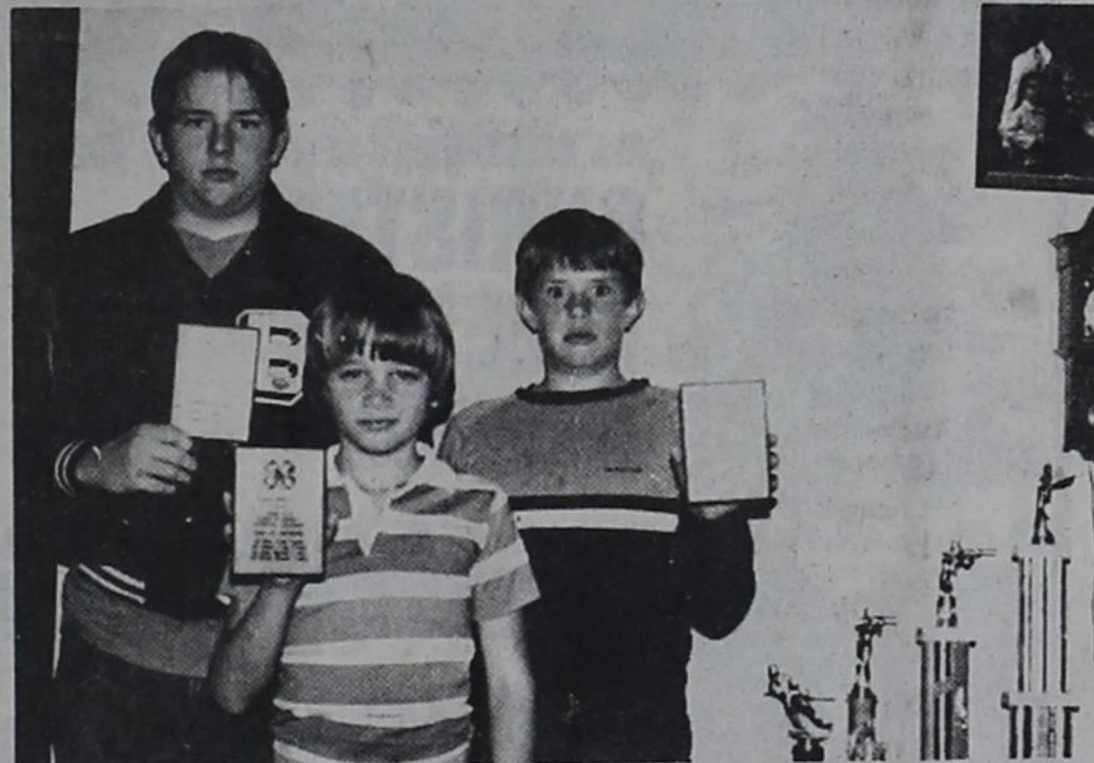

Court Awards Pact For New Backhoe

The Parmer County Commissioners awarded a contract to Yellowhouse Machinery Co. of Lubbock for a new loader-backhoe for use in Precinct 1.

The Lubbock company was the only bidder on the item, at a trade difference of \$33,000, but the court felt that the bid amount was a fair one. The county plans to trade two machines in on the new one.

A motion was approved to pay the expenses incurred by a visiting district judge, in the amount of \$15.89.

Approval was given a bill in the amount of \$136.25 from Panhandle Community Services, as a handling fee for commodities given out by the county.

A request to cross a county road with a water line was approved after some discussion.

A discussion was held with County Clerk Bonnie Warren concerning copiers which had been tried out at the courthouse. A motion was approved to purchase

a Ricoh machine and one 3-M copier, to replace two machines in the offices of the county clerk and the district clerk.

At the suggestion of County Treasurer Benna (Felts) Tarter, a motion was approved to re-invest \$125,000 from the General Fund in a certificate of deposit which will now mature May 30, 1986. The old CD was maturing November 29.

The court voted unanimously to seek bids for a loader-backhoe for Precinct 4. Bids are to be opened on December 9.

Considerable discussion was held on the county's Permanent School Fund. (This item was covered in a story in our last issue.) The discussion centered around an Attorney General's opinion concerning the distribution of the fund.

Soil conservation work was approved for the farms of Harry Sheets and W.R. (Bill) Johnson. The work is performed by county equipment when not otherwise needed, and the cost is paid by the farmers involved.

Boys First, Girls Third In Tourney

The Fillies and Mustangs competed in the Vega tournament last weekend, and brought home the first and third place trophies.

The Mustangs took the tournament championship, breezing to wins over Panhandle, Texline and Vega. But the Fillies, having star player Marie Pesch sidelined with a bruised shoulder, lost to Friona in the semi-finals and had to settle for third place trophy.

The boys beat Panhandle, 57-47; Texline, 72-59 and Vega, 67-55 to run their season record to 6-1 and annex the tourney title.

"They played excellently for the entire tournament. We had 30 turnovers against Panhandle, but played exceptionally well the last two games. We were really clicking against Vega. Everything worked well," said Coach Marks Lanham.

Making all-tournament team for the Mustangs were Matt Howell, Blake and Scott Scaff.

"We just had a dead game against Friona in the girls' division. We hustled, but nothing fell. We came back on Saturday and had a good game against Adrian," Lanham said.

Miss Pesch saw only limited action against Friona, scoring four points. She was recovering from a bruised shoulder when she suffered a sprained ankle in a workout Monday, and was again doubtful against Nazareth.

County 4-H Party Is Set December 14

All Parmer County 4-H members and their parents are reminded to attend the annual county-wide Christmas party this Saturday night, December 14 at the Friona Community Center.

The group will meet at 6 p.m. The 4-H youngsters will go Christmas caroling with Bruce Parr, then return to the Community Center for refreshments.

Pheasant Season Kicks Off

The 1985 pheasant season will kick off Saturday morning, December 14.

Once again, the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 29.

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

This year, for the first time, it will be necessary for hunters to buy a hunting license if they plan to hunt anywhere other than on their own homestead. Game wardens will in all probability be checking for violators on this new law.

A good hunting season is anticipated. Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, said he had seen a good number of pheasants in the Rhea community. Reports from other parts of the area have also been encouraging.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

Trespassing laws have been stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) Oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) Presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) Sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, trespassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

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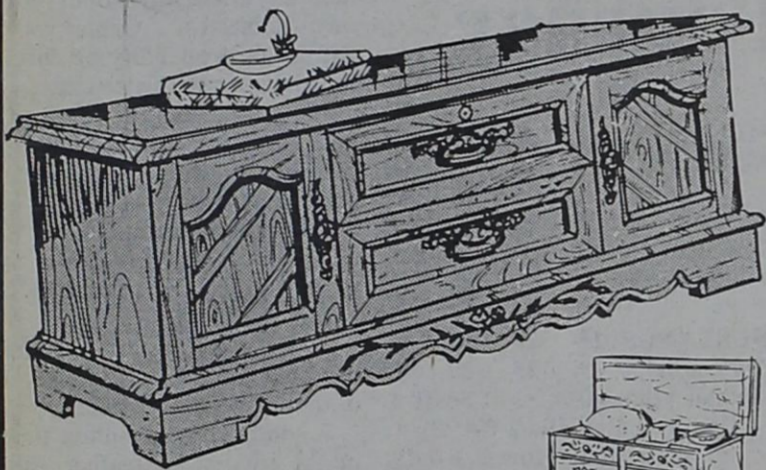


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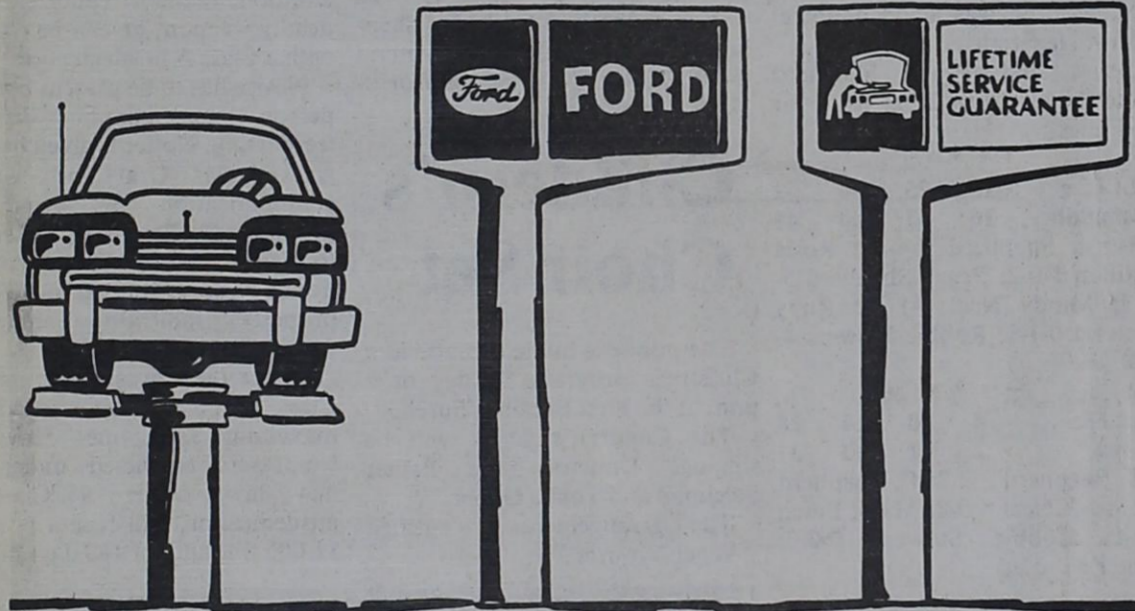

Kevin Owen At National 4-H Congress

More than 1,600 4-H'ers from every state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico will be gathering for the 64th National 4-H Congress, November 30-December 5, at the Chicago Hilton. Some fifty Texans will be in the delegation, including Kevin Owen from Parmer County.

Owen, a Farwell 4-H Club member, is one of 16 from Texas claiming top honors based on 4-H recordbooks. This is one of the largest groups of winners from Texas in the entire history of the awards program. He will receive a national \$1,000 scholarship for his recordbook in Agricultural Careers, during the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Rafer Johnson, decathlon winner, 1960 Olympic Games in Rome and bearer of the torch to open the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, will speak at the keynote assembly of the 64th National 4-H Congress on Sunday, December 1. Johnson's appearance is courtesy of The Southland Corporation. Outstanding 4-H members will be joined by some 500 county, state and federal Extension staff, volunteer leaders, representatives of corporations, foundations and other organizations supporting the 4-H program and National 4-H Council officers, trustees and the Campaign for 4-H committee.

Congress will open officially at 4:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 30 with a musical presentation, "Celebrate Youth by the Minnesota 4-H Arts-In Players." The week will be filled with workshops, educational field trips, assemblies and recognition events. During the Congress, 287 4-H members will be awarded scholarships totaling \$287,000.

Other highlights of this premier event will include the all Congress breakfast, sponsored by Firestone Trust Fund, the National 4-H Fashion Revue, sponsored by Simplicity Pattern Company and White/Elna Sewing Machine Company, the Alumni/Leaders/Donors luncheon, sponsored by Beatrice Grocery Group/Orville Redenbacher Gourmet Popping Corn, and the final banquet when winners of the presidential award, highest honor for 4-H members, will be announced.
