County Tax Rate Is Set at 50c Same As Last Year

The Taylor County tax rate for 1953 was set Monday at 50 cents on the \$100 valuation by the Taylor County Commissioners Court.

This does not include Special Road District No. 1 tax, which includes the Treadway Boulevard improvements and traffic circle. Presently this is 18 cents, but will be reduced to 15 cents for 1953, the court decreed.

The 50-cent tax rate is the same as this year's and regarded as the lowest in Texas.

The court also adopted the 1953 budget of \$640,066.30 recommended by County Auditor Sam Piller. It is about \$15,500 more than this year's. It allocated \$4.50 to the Abilene-Taylor County Child Welfare Board, which had asked \$6,222.90 of the county.

Approved the County Treasurer's report for July. It showed a balance of \$283,961.33 and \$4,199.96 in warrants outstanding. Receipts were \$18,993.82 and disbursements \$61,725.35.

Authorized formal request to the State Comptroller for \$12,000 as this county's part of the gasoline tax for lateral county road.

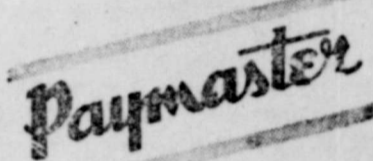

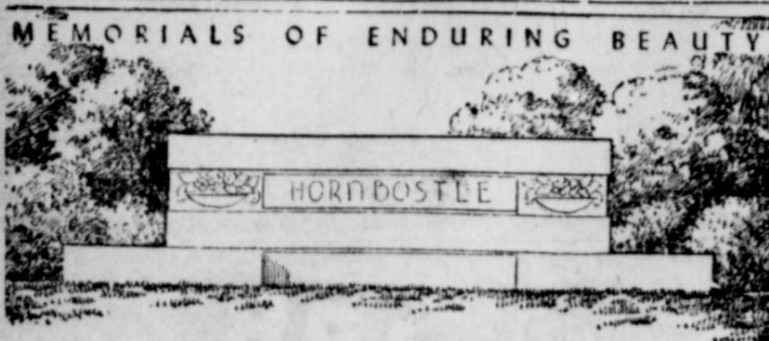

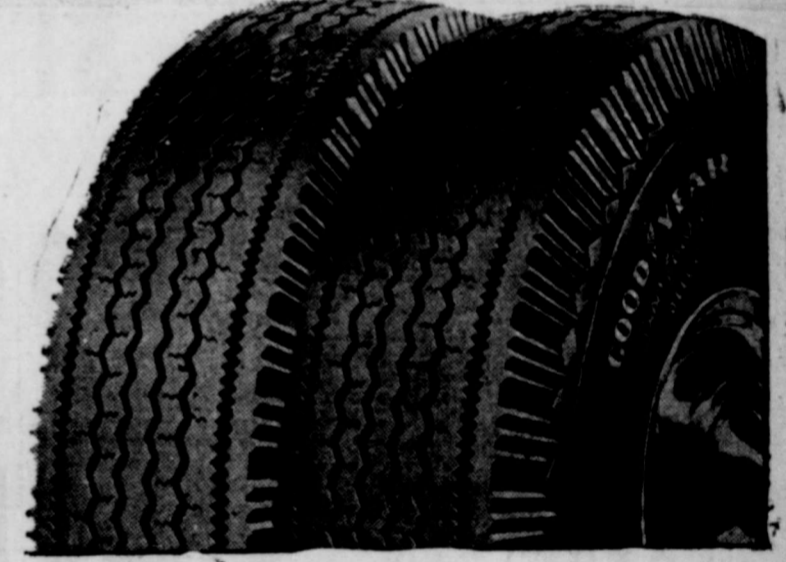

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Dairy Herds Need Good Hay or Silage To Produce Milk

Dairymen will lose efficiency in production of milk if they fail to supply their dairy herds with plenty of good hay or silage. If the hot, dry weather has upset hay and silage plans on your farm, make a special effort to obtain these necessary roughage feeds elsewhere.

Suggestions Given To Prevent Trouble In Feeding Swine

Swine producers who feed their animals on rations deficient in minerals and vitamins can expect trouble. The trouble will show up in the form of stunted pigs and in the case of severe shortages, death of the affected animals. Mineral supplements and good green pastures will help prevent the trouble.

Are You Packing Too Much Fat For Your Size?

Are you packing too much fatty beef for the size of your frame? If so, you're probably one of the 100,000 or so Texans contributing to what State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox calls a "significant public health problem."

If you are carrying too much fatty tissue you're twice as apt to get diabetes, and three times as likely to have heart trouble. Furthermore, if you get arthritis it will hurt you a good deal more because of your obese, overweight, condition.

Many other conditions are made worse by person's being too fat. "Obesity is just as serious a form of malnutrition as starvation in the long run," the health officer will tell you. Ask why some people get fat while some don't and he'll tell you the plain and simple reason is that usually the fat ones eat more than their systems need or want.

"Obesity is exactly the opposite of starvation. Overweight people eat too much. Emaciated people don't get enough. Both types are malnourished."

But why do they eat too much? There may be many causes. The glands may not be working just right. They may be having emotional trouble.

"Dietary habits perhaps established in childhood. Part of the reason might be that an overly full stomach gives them a sense of emotional relief. They might be trying to satisfy an emotional hunger as well as a physical one."

The best way to fight obesity is to cut down the caloric intake, he says. But to do this you've got to have a real desire to have normal weight.

"This means," he explained, "the underlying emotional factors which created the obesity must be corrected by a greater urge, such as avoiding an early death."

When you get this desire you'll be willing to have your doctor prescribe a reducing diet and medicine if necessary and you will follow his advice.

"If you don't," Dr. Cox cautioned, "you'll probably find an early grave."

Fat people should get a good physical examination by their doctor before they start on a rigid reducing diet.
