Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation News



The above photograph shows R. E. Clemmer, Jr., in a field of K. R. bluestem grass growing on the Louis Butman place, 14 miles southwest of Merkel.

This photo, made on October 9, gives some idea of what adapted grasses will do in dry years.

Mr. Butman, a Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation District cooperater, planted a 98 acre field in K. R. bluestem on Feb. 20, 1951, planting 2 pounds of seed per acre in 40 inch rows. He planted with a district-owned grass

drill, overseeding on a heavy sorghum stubble grown the previous year. The stubble gave young grass plants protection from wind and sun and helped hold more moisture near the ground surface for use of small plants.

This grass has not been grazed Both growing seasons since it was planted have been extremely dry, yet a small seed crop was made in late 1951, and two light crops were made in 1952. Seed was not harvested as owner preferred to leave seed on land to increase density of stand.

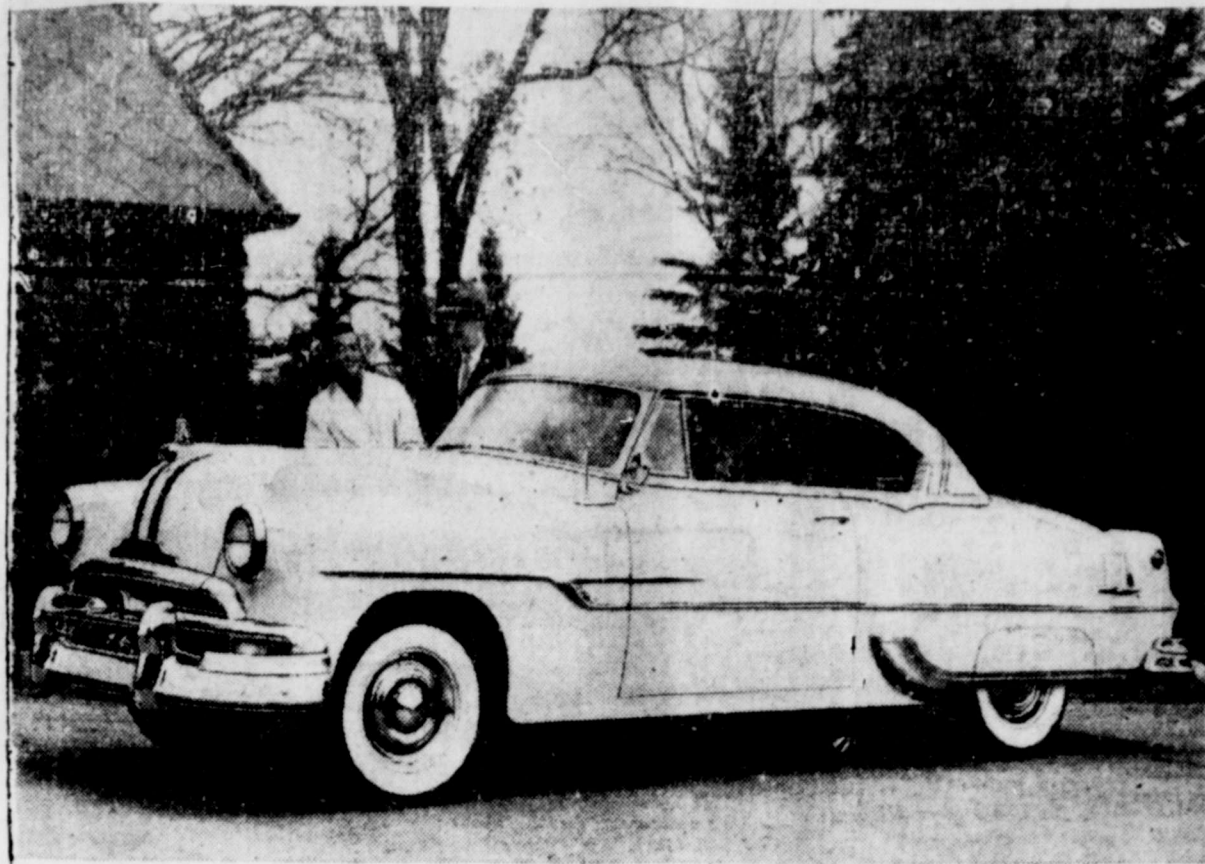

winter, because the stock will have a hard enough time getting through and making a calf and lamb crop anyway.

Mexican trade in cattle is still in relatively small volume, but imports seem to be picking up and more trade talk is heard. As the Fall crush of cattle movement to market tapers off and the numbers of stockers and feeders coming to market dwindles in the months ahead, we may well see the Mexican imports rise sharply.

If the predicted strong Spring stocker market develops, you can bet that Mexican imports will be as large as the law allows.

So far no imported cattle have shown on the market at Fort Worth and we understand most of them have been moving into Arizona and California.

LIVESTOCK MARKET

By TED GOULDY

Receipts of all classes of livestock were considerably larger at Ft. Worth and around the market circle Monday. Twelve major markets reported over 123,000 cattle and over 137,000 hogs. It was one of the largest hog runs of the season.

At Fort Worth cows were around 50 cents higher and bulls brought strong prices. Some early sales of fed yearlings were steady but most packers took a very bearish stand and before the day was over, many fed steers and yearlings cleared at 50 cents to \$1.50 lower prices. Shortfeds fared the worst. Choice fat calves ruled firm, but others were weak. Stocker trade was again featured by some strong sales on cows and on lightweight yearlings and calves of choice grades. However, demand was still very narrow and plainer kinds draggy.

Fat lambs were steady to strong with some choice fat lambs around \$1 to \$1.50 higher. Slaughter ewes opened 50 cents higher. Other sheep were fully steady. Hogs opened strong and topped Monday at \$17 to \$17.25. Sows sold for \$13.50 to \$16.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold for \$22 to \$30. Plain and medium butcher sorts sold for \$14 to \$20, with ratty yearlings around \$10 to \$13. Fat cows sold for \$14 to \$16, heiferettes \$16 to \$20, and canners and cutters cashed at \$10 to \$14 in most cases. Bulls brought \$10 to \$18.50. Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$19 to \$25, with some 500 and up upwards to \$28-50. Common and medium slaughter kinds sold from \$14 to \$18, with culls around \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocked calves sold from \$18 to \$23.50 and stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$23 down. Feeder steers sold mostly from \$21 down. Stocker cows drew \$10 to \$17. Heifer calves and heifer yearlings usually brought \$2 or more less than comparable steers.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$23, a load

at 92 pounds from Hill Brothers, Stanton, at \$25, a new top for the current crop. Shorn lambs with No. 1 pelts sold at \$21 downward. Feeder lambs cashed at \$10 to \$16. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$10 to \$17. Aged wethers drew \$10 down. Slaughter ewes sold from \$5.50 to \$8 and some breeding ewes sold for \$9 down. Old bucks sold around \$5 to \$6.

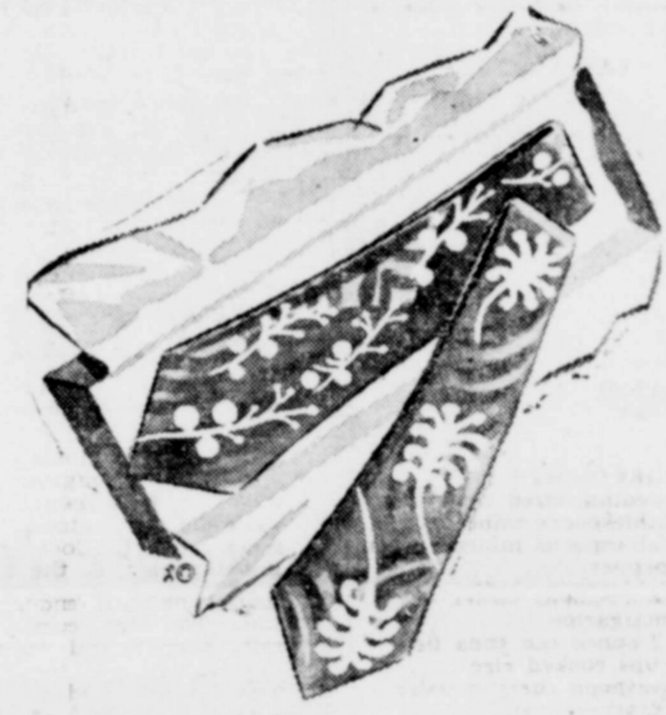

It is the clever addition of one little bay leaf that transforms just a dish into WHAT A DISH—and causes the bottom of the soup kettle to appear in a mighty big hurry.

INGREDIENTS:
 1/2 lb. ground, uncooked meat (cooked may be used)
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 4 cups water
 1, No. 2 can tomatoes (2 1/2 cups)

- 1 cup firmly packed grated carrots
- 1/3 cup coarsely grated or diced onions
- 3/4 cup uncooked rice
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cup finely grated or chopped cabbage

METHOD: In a large saucepan or soup kettle brown the meat in the butter or margarine. Add the water, tomatoes, carrots, onions, rice, salt pepper and bay leaf. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover with a lid and leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Add the cabbage and cook 5 minutes, or until the cabbage is tender. Remove the bay leaf. This recipe makes 8 cups of chowder.
