Cold storage holding of turkeys have recently been unusually heavy and supplies should continue liberal during the month.
Production and stocks of milk and dairy products are heavy for this time of year and may be expected to continue increasing as the peak production period approaches. Butter, cheddar cheese and skim milk products, cottage cheese and buttermilk will be plentiful.

THE COOPS

The joint annual meeting of the Taylor Electric Cooperative and the Taylor Refrigeration Cooperative was an impressive affair.

First of all, look at the number of folks that attended the gathering. There were over 1,600 that came to the annual meeting. That is a great lot of people in any town, and when you figure the size of Merkel, that is a huge number of folks. It can be said that it burst the bounds of Merkel.

When you stood outside of the gymnasium where the meeting was held you could easily guess that there were close to 2,000 persons at the gathering. Wherever you looked you could see cars. The autos were parked not only in front of the building but on the other side of the street and on both sides of the street all around the block. More, there were cars parked on both sides of the streets approaching the school.

It was a tremendous number of cars and a tremendous number of folks.

Then too remember that the co-ops had 3,500 members. Over 1,600 persons that attended the meeting mean that about half of or over half of the membership were present! That is a great record, it is a record that is hard to beat, it is a record to be proud of.

Another record that the Taylor Electric made last year was that it did over a quarter of a million dollar business, said Manager Lester Dorton. That is a lot of business. And when you note that this business went through the office here, we as citizens of Merkel can be proud that this business is here. It is a great boost to the economic structure of our town.

The coops had a successful meeting, they had a successful year. They can look forward to a successful 1953 under the guidance of the same directors and manager who broke the records in 1952.

That is exactly what Bryan Bradbury, prominent attorney of Abilene, did in the address he gave at the annual meeting of the co-ops. Mr. Bradbury caused us to stop and think of the good things of the American Way of Life.

We are prone to consider the bad things that communism has to offer. This is well enough in its way. But it does not go far enough. It is a negative point of view. The positive manner is to think of the good things that we ourselves have under the democratic system.

As Mr. Bradbury so well pointed out, the democratic way is the in-

dividuals working together for the betterment of everyone.

Democracy sees the individual. It gives value to the individual. It seeks the glorification of the individual. But it does not do it at the expense of any other individual. It strives to lift up each one. It strives for a better way of life for all. It strives to ennoble each person.

The words of Benjamin Franklin are as true today as they were in the days of the constitutional convention, pointed out Mr. Bradbury. It is for us today as it was in those pioneer days to work together, neighbor with neighbor, for the betterment of our homes and for the betterment of our country.
