

57 Second Graders Take Final Dose Of Polio Vaccine

Fifty-seven second graders of Merkel, Tye and Trent were presented Polio Pioneer Membership Cards and buttons here last week on Wednesday as they took the third and final doses of the Salk Polio Vaccine.

Only one second grader who started the series of three doses in the national field trials failed to complete the series.

Merkel had 39 second graders to take all of the doses; Trent had 13; and Tye had 5. These figures represent about 70 per cent of all the second graders in all three of the schools.

The definite results of the national field trials will not be known for about a year. The experimental vaccine was given to about 750,000 second graders throughout the nation in 170 different counties, 10 of which were in Texas.

Truett Latimer For Re-election As Representative

State Representative Truett Latimer has authorized The Merkel Mail to announce his candidacy for re-election, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary July 24. His statement follows:

If we are to continue to be one of the fastest growing and progressive areas in Texas, it is imperative that we do this. If Abilene and her neighboring cities are ready, I will do everything possible to obtain the passage of this piece of legislation in the next regular session of the Legislature.

Your opinions and ideas on all issues are always welcomed. When I can be of service to you in any manner, please call on me.

It is my sincere desire to represent all of the people of Taylor County again in the State Legislature. I hope my last record will make me worthy of your support in the July 24 Democratic Primary.

Trobe Says Pancakes May Taste Good But Be Hard to Swallow!

In an issue of the Mail you mentioned pancakes. I'd say you had special service and all, but don't feel so bad about it. Wait till you've heard what happened to me.

I would say you are somewhat of a "raconteur" yourself, using the kinder interpretation of a word that can be taken two ways.

In 1885 while I was on a hunt for a lost mine in the State of Chihuahua, Mexico I had with me a Mexican, Modesto Jimenez, whom I had known as a boy in Merkel. All day we had searched in the mountains, made a cursory search of an abandoned mine and at sunset were both tired and hungry.

We found a tiny Indian adobe (Jacal) where dwelt an old Tarahumare (cliff dweller) couple. After they were assured we meant them no harm they prepared us a meal which consisted of frijoles (brown beans) and cakes, or you might call them pancakes, only they were cooked on a flat piece of earthenware over coals. They were about a quarter inch thick and of a brown, mottled color.

As I said, we were hungry, and being accustomed to eating strange objects when dining with the aborigines we attacked them with gusto. They were not bad tasting but I had trouble when it came to swallowing. They just wouldn't go down.

After several big bites were lodged all along my esophagus I chokingly asked Modesto, "What on earth are we eating?"

He guffawed and said, "Chapulín."

"Grasshoppers!" I gasped. I had heard how these cliff dwellers, when grasshoppers were plentiful, dug trenches into which they drove the horde of "salt-tartaric orthoptarians" to capture and store them in hermetically

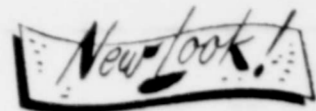

Congress is headed into one of the greatest legislative log jams in its history.

The administration's leaders — Senator Knowland in the Senate and Speaker Martin in the House — are still shooting for a July 31 adjournment. But many old-timers think this target too ambitious. They set August 15 as the minimum.

Military leaders of several nations have been conferring in Washington. The situation is very dangerous. We do not know what is going to come out of the Geneva Conference. The Administration has not made any recommendations to Congress and the President says he is not going to act without Congressional approval.

A Presidential request would precipitate a Congressional debate that would take many days, even weeks.

Among the items to be tackled is:

Agriculture — Neither the House nor the Senate yet has a bill ready for consideration. But if no action is taken, flexible price supports will go into effect automatically. The American people are entitled to a clear vote — for or against — on this issue. Congress cannot — and should not — adjourn without expressing its will — without standing up to be counted.
