





Similar farming practices were being followed on both watersheds at the beginning of the study, Conservation practices were established on one of the watersheds in the spring of 1943. These practices included changing part of the cultivated area to grassland; the use of improved crop rotations; and the construction of terraces on land in cultnvation. No change was made in the farming practices on the other watershed.


