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flower early in the spring weather, evergreen or deciduous.

WATERING and FERTILIZING should be done carefully during the hot months. For the most part it is safe to leave off fertilizing. In special instances light fertilizing may be done. Deep watering and heavy mulching will bring many plants through the dry season. Fertilize lightly (1/2 cup of 5-10- to 25 square feet) one shrub.

NEW PLANTS for the home grounds may be found as seedlings growing under, near or down the hill from old plants. Taken up at this time of the year and placed in No. 10 tin can of rich soil and set in the shade outside, rapid growth will be made. Plants up that shrubs and trees may harden to 12 inches or more will survive and grow if kept in the shade for three or four weeks. This is a conservation measure for our disap pearing native plants.

Many seedlings of native plants will die if left alone. This includes bedbud, pink buckeye, fringe trees, cedars and introduced shrubs such as nandina. If the ball of soil is broken turn a fruit jar over the plant for a few days. If some roots are lost, prune top slightly and turn a glass jar over

BULBS and TUBERS: The nar cissus, jonquil and other bulbs with dead foliage may be taken up and replanted at this time Annual flowers can be grown over hardy bulbs such as the narcissus and jonquil. Valuable bulbs and bulbs that are hard to grow should not be replanted but dried in the shade and stored until planting time. Gladioli may be planted in July or August for fall bloom. Varieties vary from 70 to 120 days for producing blooms when planted in the spring.

During hot weather they mature much more rapidly but will be smaller than spring When the gladilious foliage has browned the corms maybe taken up, separated, dried in the shade, treated for thrips with 5% DDT dust and stored until another planting season.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS: July is the last month for pinching back chrysanthemums. Pinching back and pruning may save staking them in the fall. A 3 to 5 inch limb tip will root easily in a pot. If set outside, use a glass jar over it and shade for a few days. Mulch all plants heavily. Water deeply

A light feeding of commercial fertilizer may be given at the rate of 1-2 cup of 5-10-5 to each 10 feet of row or each 25 square feet. Water heavily after fetrilizing. The soil should be wet to a depth of 12 inches. Text with a "sharp shooter" or trovel.

FLOWERING SHRUBS that bloom late on new growth, such as vitex and crave myrtles, may be fertilized lightly and watered deeply. Cutting old blooms before seed is formed keeps them blooming until cold weather.

MULBERRY HOMECOMING

Today is the big Day .. Mulberry Canyon Homecoming.

The big, pioneer hand of personal greeting is extended to everyone. It is a heart-warming welcome to old friends and new friends alike. It is the same old welcome that made the visitors in those early days know that they were among friends.

There is a reason why Mulberry Canyon draws so many folks from near and far. Mulberry Canyon has a fine history, a splendid history, a history that reveals how civilization came to Taylor County and reveals also in a small way how our Country, how America was built.

First came those who blazed the trail. Then came the soldiers, the fights with the Indians. And after them the pioneers came who settled the land and made things grow and brought up their children here and built schools and churches. They developed not only the soil but they also developed character, the strong, rugged character for which America and Texas and especially West Texas are justly famous.

Sam Butman, Sr., was among the first settlers here. He knew what the pioneers had to go through. He was a part of it, a living part, the part that produced not only for the body but also for the soul.

And his memories are good. even though he has reached the a patriarch not only among his own kinfolks but also among everyone in the Mulberry Canyon and the surrounding area.

The history he can tell is a long one, filled with hardships and fighting and friendliness of good neighbors and West Texas hospitality. He has told the tales to his children and his grandchildren. They have cherished that history and one of them, Mabel Butman Scott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Butman, Jr., has put the different stories she has heard down in writing and The Merkel Mail published them in last week's

It is an interesting history. It is a beautiful history, a history we can all be proud of, especially those whose ancestors were a living, vital part of it.

There were the first white settlers who came in the early 70s and saw the Mulberry Creek and later gave the canyon the name of Mulberry Canyon.

And back of that was the building of the line of forts. One of them was Fort Mountain Pass that was in Mulberry Canyon.

Then came the mail route in 1858, the Butterfield Trail, which lasted three years.

There was the story of the stage coach robbers and how they were captured by the Texas Rangers. There was the story of how the indians were driven away from Mt. Pass in 1861 by the soldiers. Then came the 3,700 head of cattle, then later cotton was planted.
