Mr. Mayfield was born Aug. 8, 1868 in Trook County, Ga. He married the former Minnie Tullia Titt in December, 1892, and they moved to Bell County in 1893. Ford will introduce an entirely new line—the high-styled Fairlane series — as the leader of its four lines of 100 passenger cars to be shown in 6400 dealer's showrooms across the nation on Friday, Nov. 12, announced Paul Honeycutt, local Ford dealer.

Modern styling inspired by Ford's new Thunderbird personal car distinguishes the new Fords. 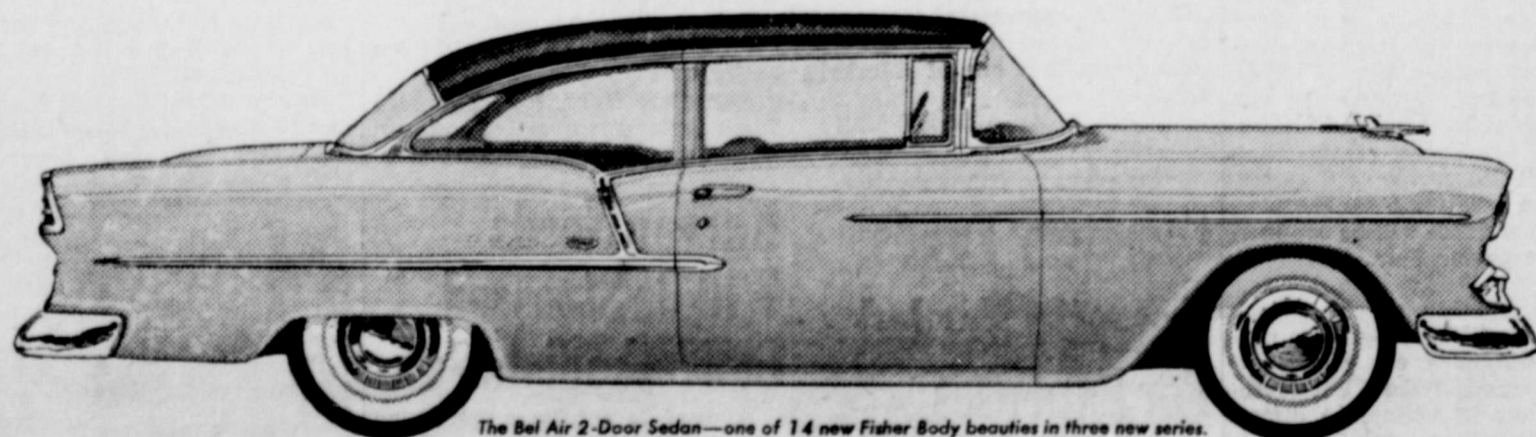

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: Plaintiff and defendant were legally married on or about 15th day of September 1946, and lived together until on or about November 1st, 1952. Plaintiff shows there were no children born of said marriage.

Plaintiff sues for divorce on grounds of cruel treatment and asks that property purchased by Plaintiff, being Lot No. 4, of the Helen Reese Subdivision of the Lot No. 5, Block No. 16 in Edgmont a subdivision out of the N. 1/4 of Survey No. 64, to the City of Abilene, be set aside as her separate property and estate as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this writ shall promptly serve the same according to requirements of law, and the mandates hereof, and make due return as the law directs.
