

## SCHOOL BONDS WIN APPROVAL

### Preliminary Plans Are Now Being Made by Architect

The school bonds for \$300,000 carried last Saturday almost 3 to 1. There were 158 votes cast for the bonds and 59 against, announced Presiding Judge Andy Shouse. By 9 a. m. 15 had voted. At 10 a. m. 35, 11 56 votes, noon 76, at 2 p. m. 113, by 4 p. m. 153 and at 5:30 p. m. 190 had been cast, stated Mr. Shouse. There were 217 votes cast in all. The date for bids on the bonds has as yet not been set, stated Supt. Mack Fisher. The architect is working on preliminary plans. The state has agreed to refunding of the old bonds, amounting to \$116.00, he said.

### 2 New Arrivals Are Introduced At Lions Club

Two new arrivals in Merkel were introduced at the Lions Club luncheon Tuesday. They were Onis Crawford, the new manager of the Chamber of Commerce, and Editor Bill Frye, the new publisher of The Merkel Mail. Isadore Mellinger, president, presented the audit report, showing a net balance in the treasury of \$163.06. President Mellinger analyzed the report stressing the loss the Community Center sustained last year in the rental of the building. "The chamber of commerce is an organization for the greatest good for the greatest number of people in civic business, industry and transportation affairs," asserted Mr. Crawford. He pointed out the need for all the members to cooperate and to work in unison. The editor offered his cooperation to the club and to the town.

### Dr. Don Warren Named Director Of F. & M. Bank

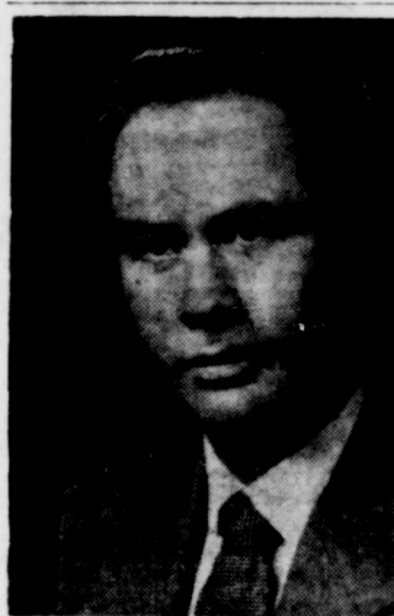

In 1941 he enrolled in the Texas A. & M. College.

He was in the Air Force from 1942 to 1946 as B25 bombardier navigator and discharged as first lieutenant. Then he returned to A. & M. College and graduated in 1947 with a degree in marketing and finance. While a student at A. & M. he was an employee of the College Station Bank. Following graduation he was an assistant national bank examiner under Chief W. A. Sandlin in this district. In 1947 he enrolled in the Medical Branch of the University of Texas at Galveston and graduated in 1951. While in Medical College he was a summer employee in 1948, 1949 and 1950 of the City National Bank, Galveston. He substituted for regular employees in every department while they were on vacation. Dr. Warren interned in the U. S. Public Health Service from June 1951 to June 1952 when he came here to be associated with Dr. W. T. Sadler in the Sadler Clinic-Hospital. The new director married Miss Patty Gantner of Galveston and they have three boys.

### Oscar Adcocks, Sr. To Observe Golden Wedding Sunday

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar J. Adcock, Sr., will hold their golden wedding anniversary on May 8 at their home, 1112 South 9th street. They were married May 7, 1905, in Oglesby by Parson Norton, a retired Primitive Baptist Church minister.

Mr. Adcock was born Cora L. Bankhead in Coryell County on Dec. 3, 1880. She attended high school there. Mr. Adcock was born in Navarre County on Feb. 25, 1880, near Dawson. He lived in Hill County in 1881-1882, in McLennan County in 1883-1884, moving to Coryell County in the fall of 1884. Mr. Adcock attended Wedemeyer Academy, also known as Belton Academy at Belton and received a Latin-Scientific diploma. He taught country school for 4 years in Bell County from 1901-1905, and then came to Taylor County in 1905. In 1907 he began delivering mail on rural route 5, Merkel, in December. On June 1, 1926, he became post office clerk and on March 27, 1927, he became active postmaster when the old postmaster, Taylor Davis, died. His permanent appointment as postmaster was effective Dec. 16, 1927. He retired January 31, 1936. Five months later he returned as money order clerk and served until the last of February 1946 when he again retired.

Mr. Adcock served as chairman of the Merkel School board from 1926 to 1936. He has been an active church worker. When he was 15 years old he became a member of the Church of Christ. He served as song leader and made some public talks in his younger days, became a deacon in the Merkel Church about 1909 and an elder about 1915. Though he never claimed to be a preacher he has filled pulpits in a number of West Texas towns, baptized quite a number and preached funerals for others, most of them old timers whom he had known for number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Adcock have four children: three sons and one daughter, 18 grandchildren, including two great grandchildren. The oldest son, Elmer, is minister of the Church of Christ at Mertzton; the second son, Oscar, is an elder of Oaklawn Church of Christ in Fort Worth; the youngest son, Waymon, is a faithful worker in the Merkel Church of Christ. The daughter is Mrs. A. A. Betterton of Midland.

# Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation News



Guar again promises to be an important crop in the Merkel-Trent area this year.

The above photo shows a group examining a field of guar growing on the Roy Kelso farm near Stith in October, 1954. This "soybean of the southwest," tried for the past two years in this area, has been received with varying opinions by growers. Kelso and a number of other growers reported that the money income per acre was several times that of sorghums last year. In fact, Kelso had several acres of milo in the same field with his guar and did not harvest any for grain or fodder. The guar, despite drought and "high cutting" owing to gravel on the land, averaged about 225 lbs. per acre and brought \$3.25 per hundred in Merkel.

O. B. Leach and Fred Baker, Jr., said that lacking \$25.00, 14 acres of guar made as much return as 150 acres of maize.

Ernest McCreight produced about 900 lbs. of guar per acre in 1953, with only a little over 2 inches of rain after planting. He found that the guar land did not blow near so readily and plowed much easier. Although he did not run a controlled test on cotton production following the guar, he feels certain that cotton production was increased considerably.

Kelso, like numerous others, regards guar more as a soil building and soil conditioning crop than as a cash crop. He has bedded his guar land in the middle, throwing soil up on the stubble and will plant cotton this spring directly back into the guar root zone. He will have a check area of cotton following cotton in the same field in order to check any

benefits resulting from the guar growing ahead of the cotton.

Kelso, who has heard Clinton Harbers discuss his program for building and conditioning soil, agrees with Harbers that land in low organic matter and in poor physical condition cannot be brought back to high production in one or two years. Kelso said recently that he believed from five to seven years of intensive legume cover cropping, stubble mulching and good mechanical treatment would be necessary to get land back to its virgin state. He has a program worked out to plant winter peas in the fall in part of his cotton and feed, guar on part of his land each summer and he is increasing his blue panic acreage by double. He expects to eventually double production by good soil and water management by increasing organic content of soil, developing good soil condition and by keeping a good cover on the ground.

Kelso, along with his neighbors, has demonstrated in the past two years that good stubble mulch will control blowing and add to the moisture retaining ability of the land.

Soil Conservation Service employees of the Merkel office report that a large acreage of guar is in prospect for 1955. Many farmers are preparing to plant non-allotment acres and small grain acreage that has gone out due to the drought to guar. Many are working the crop into a long-time soil building and soil improving program.

Local seed dealers have plenty of guar seed and inoculant available. Inoculation of seed is advised as the best means of getting maximum nitrogen fixation on the roots of the growing guar.

When Mr. and Mrs. Ed Merritt left here after visiting relatives and were returning to their home in Eastend, Saskatchewan, they ran into 32 degrees below zero weather and trouble. In her letter to Mr. and Mrs. David Tarpley, Mrs. Merritt tells about her ex- perience. David is her brother.

They got to Willow Creek Can- adian Port about 4 p. m. Friday, stayed with Ed's sister Verna un- til Saturday afternoon and left about 11:30 p. m. for home, Ver- na and her husband went along in their car. They got stuck in the snow about 2 p. m. and sat there until 6:30 p. m. when the wind went down."

Verna's husband walked about

two and a half miles and got a man with a team to take us home (back to the Port)," she wrote. "He got back to the car with the team at 9:30 and we were until 11:30 get- ting the shelter. By this time it was 32 below zero and talk about being cold!"

"We shook for an hour after- wards. While we were sitting in the car waiting for the wind to go down, so they could get help, there were times that the chrome on the top of the hood of the car was barely visible. It was a real old blizzard."

"We figured we had enough gas to keep the cars warm until noon of the next day if we just ran one at a time, so we all sat in one car and would turn off the motor as soon as the car was warm. We still had better than a quarter of a tank at 9:30 that night."

"The sitting and waiting for we knew not what was almost unbear-

able. We were lucky to get back to shelter without anyone having frost bites. The man who brought the sleigh put in a bale of hay for us to sit on and hay on the bottom of the sleigh and brought an Army overcoat and an old fur coat, lots of blankets and a horse hide auto robe, else we would have had some frozen spots.

"The men didn't get the cars out of the drifts until Tuesday noon and we got home Tuesday night about 9."

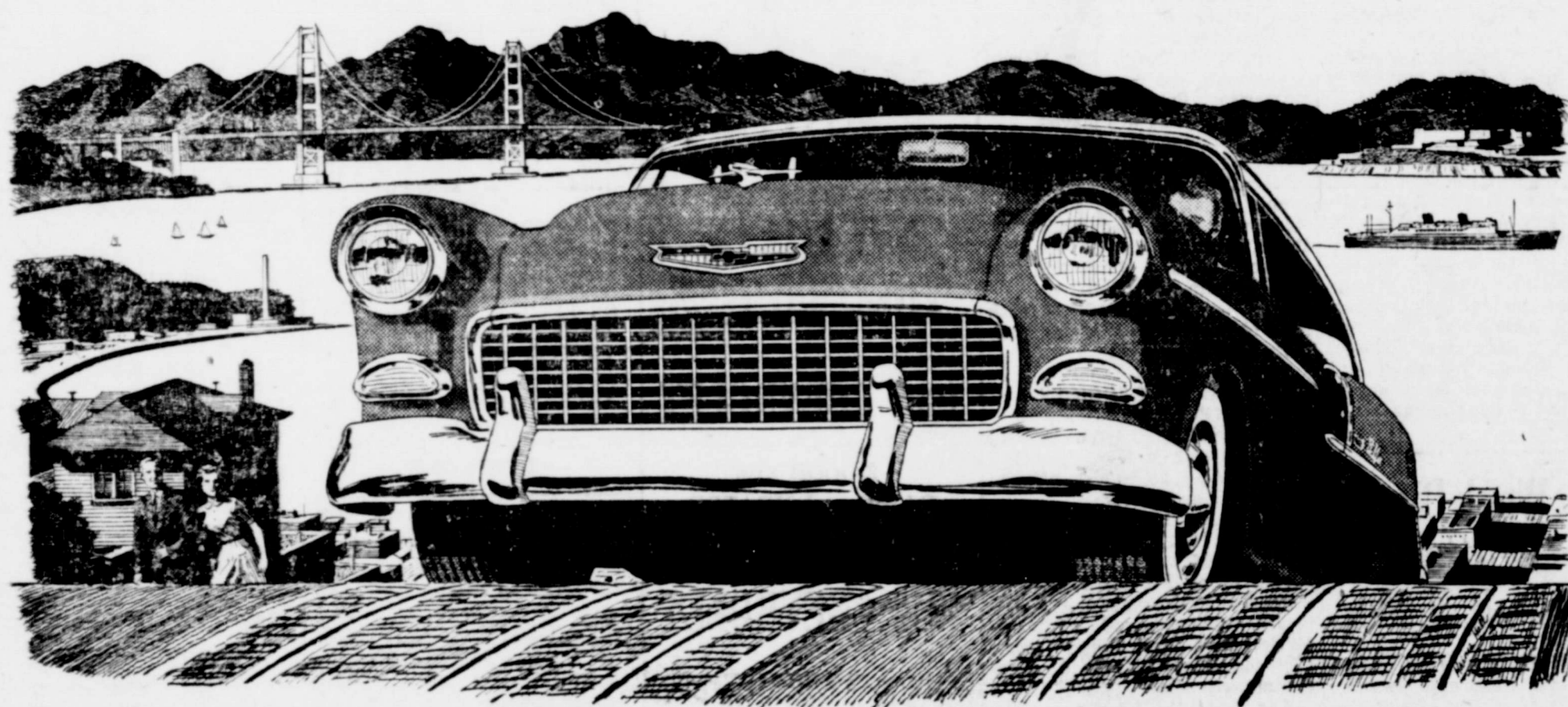

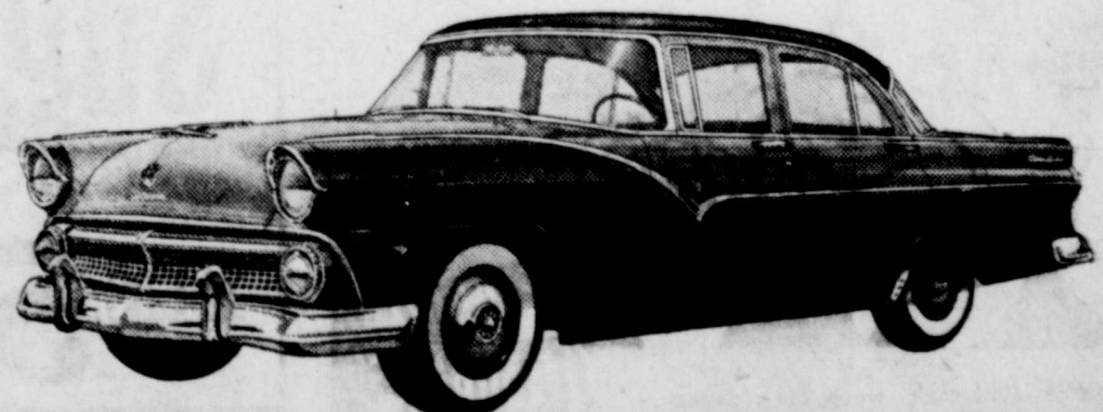
