VOTERS IN OUR state and area witnessed one of the closest political races ever conducted in the state of Texas last weekend, in the battle for the nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Congressman Kent Hance led the voting, by the slimmest of margins. The final totals gave the Dimmitt native a total of 455,583 votes, to 454,610 for Lloyd Doggett and 453,559 for Bob Krueger. Hance received 31.25 per cent of the vote, Doggett 31.18 per cent, and Krueger 31.11 per cent.

Krueger, the South Texas native who before the primary was expected by many political observers to lead the voting, missed out on the runoff by only 1,051 votes.

Early in the evening on election night, Krueger was interviewed on television, and was asked what he thought about the early returns, which had Hance in the lead. Krueger came up with one of those statements we all make at one time or another, that we wish later we could erase.

"Well, the early returns are evidently from West Texas. If they were from South Texas, I would be in the lead. I am positive I will be in the runoff; I just don't know at this point who I'll be running against," was the statement, which turned out to be wishful thinking.

Krueger's missing out on the runoff by the margin of 1,051 votes underscores the value of a vote. When you consider the fact that less than one more vote for this candidate from each of the state's voting precincts would have put him in the runoff, then the thought that "my vote doesn't count much" doesn't carry much weight.

By the same token, if just one voter from each precinct across the state, who voted for Kent Hance had thought "Hance will win this election without my vote" and not bothered to go to the polls, his campaign would have been over.

The West Texas area gave Hance a remarkable majority of the vote in the May 5 primary, and this was another factor in the close state-wide finish. It will behoove every Hance supporter who voted last Saturday to return to the polls on the June 2 runoff.

"I don't think they will give me the nickname of 'Landslide,'" joked Hance on Monday. However, longtime political observers may recall that the late president Lyndon B. Johnson won a race by a similar small margin, prompting a reporter to call him "Landslide Lyndon." He went on to become a U.S. Senator, vice president, and then president.

WE HAVE HEARD considerable support for our suggestion for the elimination of the precinct caucus, in favor of a binding party primary, in selecting presidential delegates.

At the precinct convention this writer attended, a resolution was adopted calling for such a change, and will be presented to the county convention on May 19.

In Amarillo, Potter County Democratic chairman Mel Phillips said he thought the caucus method of selecting delegates was the most unfair aspect of politics, and he plans to submit a request for a change to the state democratic leaders.

When you stop to think about it, all of the party conventions, from the precinct to the national level, could be eliminated by a national primary date, after which the party nominees would be known (or perhaps have a runoff system).

Considering all of the progress which has been made in various phases of American life, with the advent of computer technology, it's amazing, and somewhat frustrating, that in areas such as our political organizations, we still have methods which resemble the horse and buggy era.

Bovina Voters Favor Hance, Don Richards

Voters in the Bovina precinct joined their neighbors in Parmer County in giving area resident Kent Hance a big boost in his successful effort to gain the Democratic party runoff in the race for U.S. Senate.

Bovina's precinct gave Hance 146 votes of the 164 votes cast in the senate race, a rousing 89 per cent majority.

At Rhea, Hance was even more popular, as the Dimmitt native received all 41 of the precinct's votes.

In the county totals, Hance received 1184 votes, a smashing 92.4 per cent, which was about as neighborly as you could be in a political race.

Vital Meeting Set May 15

A meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday, May 15, for the purpose of formulating ideas on the revitalization of the community.

It is planned to form a committee to meet with various facets of industry, and try to bring business into the Bovina community.

"We encourage all businessmen to attend, as well as any person who might have any input or ideas. This is a community-wide effort and we would appreciate the ideas and the support of the community," said a spokesman for the meeting.

The meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 15, at 8 p.m. in the Community Room of First State Bank.

Lions Set Meal For Mother's Day

The Bovina Lions Club's Mother's Day chicken dinner will be held Sunday, May 13 at the high school cafeteria. The meal will consist of fried chicken and all the trimmings. Serving will be from 11:30 a.m. until 1 p.m.

Proceeds from the dinner will benefit the Lions Club's summer baseball programs and for repairs on the ball park.

Everyone is cordially invited to attend. The price will be \$5.00 for adults and \$2.50 for children under twelve.

In the race for Hance's old seat in the U.S. Congress, Bovina voters favored Don R. Richards, Hance's former aide, with 92 votes, to 16 for Thomas Richards and 15 for Dr. John Selby.

Don Richards likewise led the Parmer County voting with 687 votes, to 170 for Thomas Richards, 165 for Gary Condra and 97 for Selby. Delwin Jones, the fifth candidate, received 71 votes.

M.C. (Bill) Morgan was re-elected as county sheriff, receiving an even 900 votes, to 353 for challenger Steven K. Hillock.

Hillock won his home precinct of Oklahoma Lane, 73-41, but that was the only voting box he carried. The challenger was close at Lazbuddie, where Morgan won by a single vote, 47-46, and he ran a respectable race in the Bovina precinct, where he received 40.4 per cent of the vote.

But Morgan ran strong in the other voting boxes, including the three Friona precincts, Morgan's former home, which combined to give the incumbent sheriff a whopping 361-53 lead.

Bovina voters went for John L. Hill in the race for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, with 103 votes, to only 18 for Sears McGee.

In the Supreme Court, place 2 race, Bovina voters cast their ballots like this: Shelby Sharpe, 45; Texas S. Ward, 18; and C.L. Ray, 44.

For judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, place 1, local voters gave Sam Houston Clinton 64 votes, to 28 for Oliver S. Kitzman.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals, place 2 race, the tally was: Roy Greenwood, 26; George Martinez, 7; Buddy Stevens, 20; and W.C. (Bill) Davis, 41.

For the judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, place 3, this was the result: Kerry Fitzgerald, 15; George Ellis, 10; Harry Heard, 5; Thomas Thorpe, 22; William Phillips, 8; Bill White, 27; and Walter Boyd, 8.

In other races on the county level, longtime county commissioner and former county judge Archie Tarter was defeated by Robert White in Precinct 3, 267 votes to 182. White won at Farwell, 156-137 and at Oklahoma Lane, 92-23. Tarter won the absentee box, 22-19.

On the other side of the county, Ernest Anthony, Friona area farmer, successfully held off challenger T.A. Kelley, 251 votes to 98.

Lakeview, and led the absentee box, 14-0.

The county's total voter turnout of 1311 was considered light considering the intensity of the state and congressional races.

In Bovina's precinct, J.G. Sherrill, Jr., received nine write-in votes for precinct chairman, to seven for Larry Mitchell. Others receiving votes were Patricia Sherrill, Joyce Read, Steve Sherrill, James Clayton, Dale Gober and Doris Strawn.

In the presidential delegate vote, conducted in the various precinct conventions, Gary Hart received 14 votes, to three for Walter Mondale and nine for Jesse Jackson. The bulk of the county delegates, 36, will attend the county's Democratic convention as "uncommitted" voters.

Bovina's caucus opted to put their six delegates in the uncommitted column.

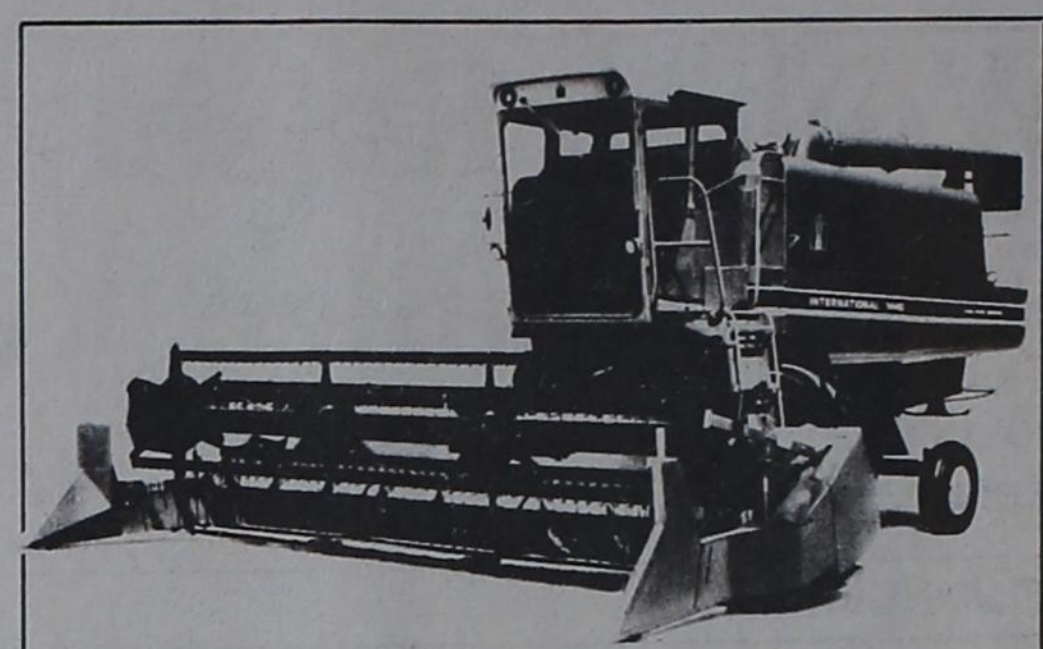

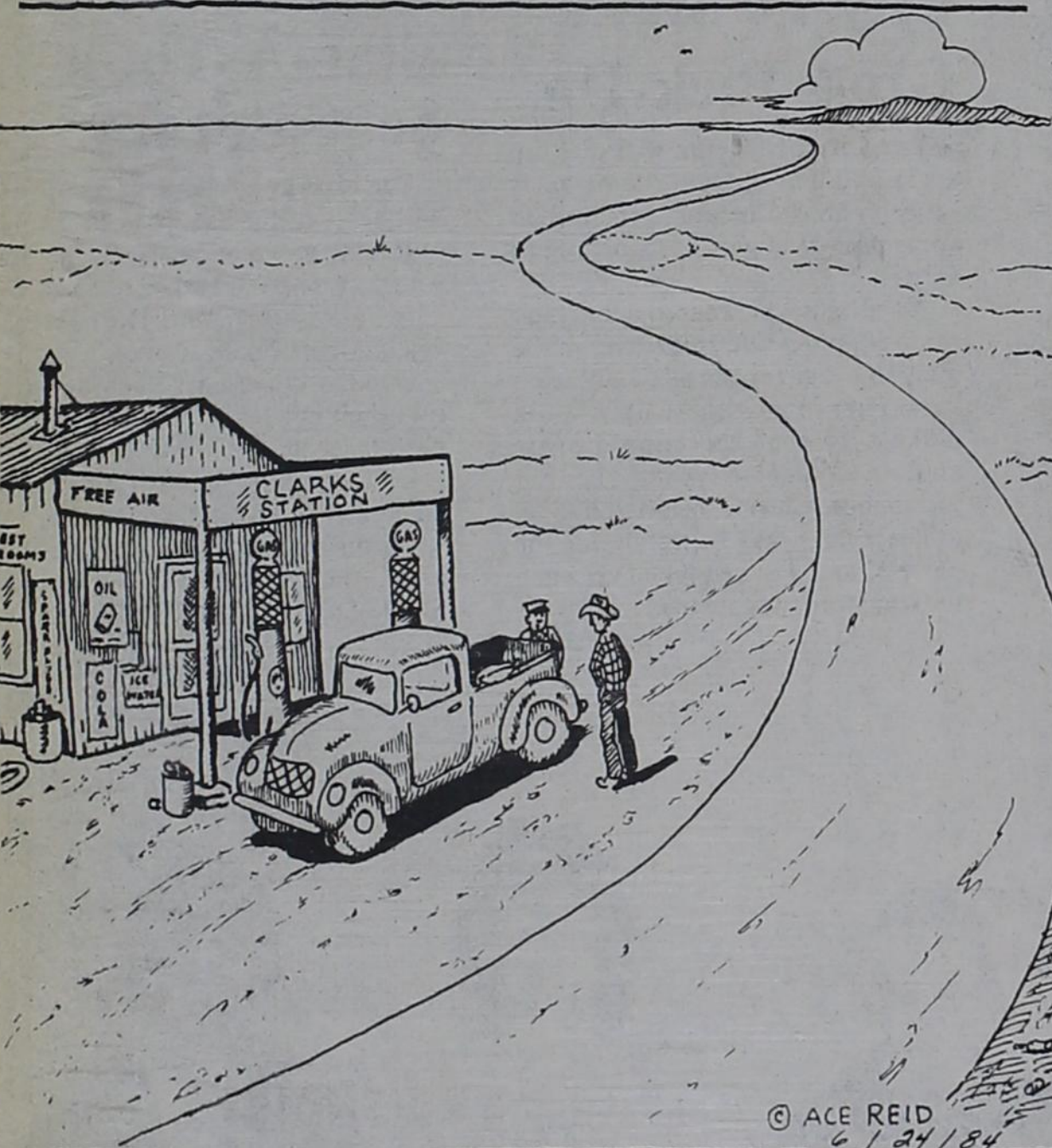

Woman Raising Money For Disabled Veterans

Jennifer Roy left Mount Whitney in California last November, and is now enroute to Washington, D.C. She stopped for a visit in Bovina this past weekend and during the interview she told us the purpose of her journey was to benefit veterans who are paralyzed and amputees, and she is providing home-like atmospheres for them.

She says, "Our hospitals are so full of fellows with arms and legs gone, I could not help but let them know how I appreciate them. She said sometimes she feels the whole country has forgotten these men, for the price they have to pay, leading the rest of their lives being partly or completely

helpless.

Jennifer has set up a tax exempt fund to build something called "New Life Camp." She explains, "It will be a place for paraplegics and quadruplegics, in the mountains, out in the wild but will have the facilities they need. "The veterans are important to our country and we should all be made aware of this fact," she said.

Mrs. Roy will be going to Washington, D.C. and will present President Reagan with a scroll containing signatures of people she has met along her journey who support "a president getting us back on the basics and back to the Bible,"

which was Reagan's stand back in 1983.

Another purpose is to raise money for the new organization, "New Life Camp." New Life Camp promises to be a home for disabled veterans, who can find a new joy and meaning in the outdoors.

"I walk for the veteran who can't walk and who paid such a price for our freedom," Mrs. Roy says.

She hopes to be in Washington by the end of the summer.

Jennifer has walked through Death Valley, the back country of Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico since she began in November. She will be leaving Bovina, traveling through Amarillo, Oklahoma City, Nashville, Tennessee and on to Washington, D.C.

In 1976, she made a 2,000 mile walk with the spirit of pioneer women and walked to Houston from California in 150 days. She walked this distance to see a new grandchild and to prove the spirit of the Old West still lives.

Mrs. Roy leads Walter, her 12-year-old burro over mountains, across deserts and hundreds of miles in wide-open country. The burro pulls a two-wheeled cart loaded with food, sleeping bag, water jug, heater, a trunk containing Walter's feed and she even carries a pistol, which she's never needed.

She says on her trip, she sees "up close" the country she loves.

She never keeps contributions but mails them back to California so she never has money on her person.

Jennifer has four children, all who work and help support her cause.

She expressed appreciation to the nice people of Bovina. She spent the nights at Glasscock Studio and was provided free meals at the Dairy Freeze. A Friona woman hosted a group of ladies Sunday evening for a prayer meeting and Jennifer was a special guest. Many gave contributions and signed the scroll that is now on its way to Washington, D.C.

Procedures Given On SS Checks

Any bank, merchant or business-man cashing a fraudulently endorsed social security or supplemental security income check will be held accountable for the proceeds according to Carl Thompson, social security manager in Clovis, New Mexico.

Following the identification procedure described on the back of these checks is the institution's best protection when cashing them, Thompson added.

Although the social security administration authorizes issuance of both types of checks Thompson said, they are actually issued by the treasury department.

"The treasury department looks to the institution cashing these checks for recovery of funds when the checks are fraudulently negotiated," Thompson stated.

Many beneficiaries avoid the risk of having their checks stolen by using the direct deposit system. Their checks are sent directly to their banks or other financial institutions for deposit to their accounts. Forms for authorization of this procedure are available at the financial institutions.

Around The House

Keeping Your Household In Order

Around this time of year we are keenly aware of household records and getting organized. Tax time does that to us. Many of us make a vow to keep things organized, but are unsure what to keep and what to throw out. Most people have papers all over the house in no certain place or order. Do you know where to look for your records?

You don't have to save every piece of paper to have good family records. Here is a review of what is important to keep.

A notebook and drawer specifically for family records is most helpful. Start with a list of each family member as shown on social security card or birth certificate. Then list family advisors such as attorney, banker, insurance agent, accountant and how to reach them.

Next come the papers, you should keep:

Birth Certificates or adoption papers. These are necessary for everything from starting to school to qualifying for social security. **Death Certificates** may be needed for legal or financial purposes.

Marriage Records include license or certificate. Also include divorce papers with these.

Military Service Records are needed for benefits both for self and dependents or survivors. Be sure to include any documents related to medical treatment or disability.

Passports--even expired ones are helpful--to satisfy some of the application requirements for a new one. **Social Security, Employment**

records will expedite payment of benefits.

Wills are essential for most satisfactory settlement of estates. Keep them updated! Keep one copy in the safety deposit box, one at home and one with your attorney.

Tax Records--it's best to keep five year's returns--four back ones plus the latest one filed.

Other papers to keep include contracts, property deeds, guarantees, mortgage papers, citizenship papers and church records. Don't forget current insurance policies.

More Lists! Keep a list of credit and debit cards that each family member uses. Include the account number and who to contact should it be lost or stolen.

Keep a record of debts outstanding as well as money owed to the family.

Investments--Complete up to date records of bonds and stocks.

Real Estate records help you analyze your assets from time to time as well as helping to identify the specific boundaries of your real property.

Household inventory is as easy as taking a picture of the four walls of each room, open drawers and doors and photograph the contents in cabinets, shelves and dressers. Keep these in a safety deposit box to safe guard them from being destroyed should some disaster strike your home.

As you set your household in order, involve family members--you may not always be around to answer questions or help make decisions. If you would like more help, call this office and request the booklet "Setting Your Household In Order." It will guide you through the steps outlined above.

Official Says His Revenue Will Hold

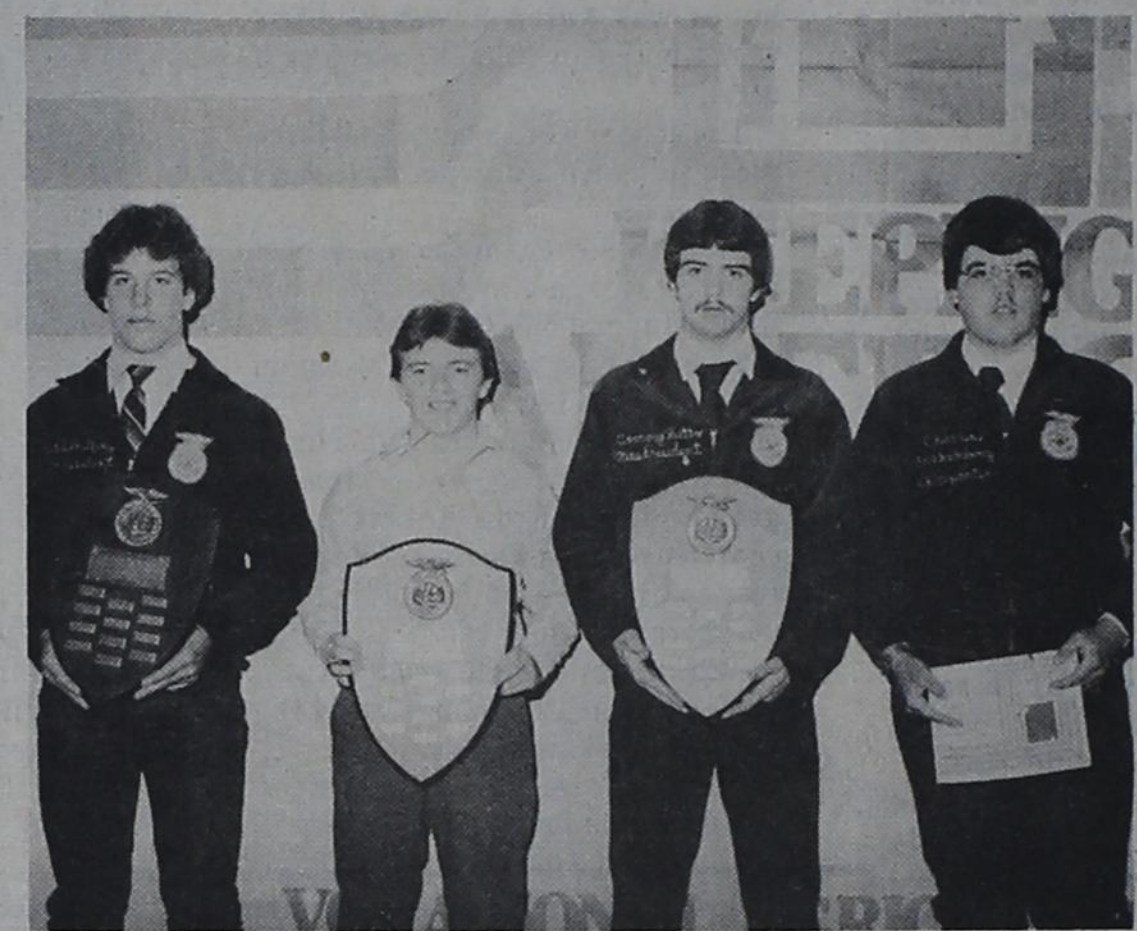
State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that if and when there is a special session of the State Legislature, his estimate of available revenues will not change.

Bullock predicted last year the current state budget of \$30.9 billion would leave \$15 million available for spending at the end of the budget period running September 1, 1983 through August 31, 1985.

"Today, with eight months of actual experience in this budget period, actual revenues are running within four-tenths of one per cent of what we estimated," Bullock said. "That means there is absolutely no reason for me to adjust the bottom line up or down."

"Fifteen million dollars isn't much, compared to the price tags attached to the spending proposals being talked about. Every education reform package proposed so far will cost more than a billion dollars. That means every nickel of spending over \$15 million will be followed by a tax increase as surely as night follows day."

"And, even if our lawmakers do pass a tax bill in a special session, it will only be a dress rehearsal for the grand finale next January. That's when the Legislative Budget Board says we'll need at least another \$2 billion just to maintain state government services at their present level."

Acting on a request from Petty-Ray Geophysical Division of

Geosource, Inc., a motion was passed to allow the company to conduct a survey on the county's public school land, League 316, in Gaines County.

A discussion concerning the Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corp. board was held. It was pointed out to the court that in order not to have such a large board, and make it easier to form a quorum for meetings, Parmer County needed to appoint someone to represent them on the board. A motion was passed to appoint Michael Carr of Deaf Smith County as the county's representative.
