HOW WOULD YOU make it if you were limited to a maximum of nine gallons of gasoline per week?

That might be our fate, should congress decide to pass gasoline rationing legislation. It is said that many members of congress are in favor of the rationing approach, instead of the increase in oil taxes, as favored by President Ford.

The President has said that he would veto a gas rationing bill, but we feel it would be dangerous for congress to pass such legislation.

It is hard to know what the answer is to cutting down on the nation's use of oil and gas, but we feel that rationing is not the answer.

As pointed out by many experts, most of whom can remember when rationing was in effect during World War II, a system of rationing brings on a whole new set of problems, and never does accomplish the desired results.

Granted, something needs to be done to cause us to "ration" our use of oil and gas. Perhaps the increased tax would help, although we doubt it. Gas consumption did not go down appreciably last year when the prices took their big jumps. People who need to travel are going to find a way of affording the gas, it appears.

The energy situation appears to be our number one problem, not only for 1975, but for several years to come. This problem didn't just happen overnight, and chances are we won't solve the problem that soon, either.

ALTHOUGH IT is more fashionable to compare the decline of U.S. power and influence in the world with the prolonged decline and fall of Rome, a better comparison may perhaps be found in ancient Athens. Author-journalist William Gill drew the analogy in a recent radio program by the American Security Council. Gill pointed out that America has never really resembled Rome because we are not a militant, imperialist power bent on world conquest. We are more like Athens, which was a mercantile state and which became the most prosperous country in the world of its day and the envy of all other nations. Its Golden Age, under Pericles, came after it led the Greeks in defeating the Persian invaders.

Then came the Peloponnesian War with Sparta. Sparta attacked first. The Athenian fleet prevailed at sea, but every time Athens won an advantage, the Spartans called a peace conference while they continued to build up their own navy.

"It is not difficult," says Gill, "to pinpoint the similarities in Athens vs. Sparta and America vs. the Soviet Union. The three decades since World War II have been our Peloponnesian War, and you can take your pick as to whether Korea or Vietnam was our Syracuse. While America focused on these two sideshows, Russia built a powerful navy and the world's most formidable nuclear striking force. Fortunately, the final act has not yet been played out in the tragedy. There is still tremendous energy in our country. America may never be another Rome, but it need not repeat the folly of Athens."

IN GYM INCIDENT

Arrest Local Men On Assault Charges

Two Bovina men were arrested and jailed at the county jail in Farwell Friday night on assault and disturbing the peace charges following an incident during a basketball game at Williford Gymnasium here.

Monte English, 21, and Rush Looney, 17, appeared before Farwell Justice of the Peace Ray Means

Monday where bond was set at \$1000 each. The two posted bond and were released. The case will be heard in county court at Farwell at a later date.

The incident occurred during the Bovina Mustang-Kress Kangaroo varsity game causing a delay of some 15 to 30 minutes before action could be resumed.

School officials had asked the two men to leave the gym after they began creating a disturbance among the student section on the home side of the gymnasium. A scuffle broke out in the stands and a number of men forcibly ejected the two from the gymnasium where City

TO RETURN MONEY

State License Act Abolished

Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded Texas business operators Saturday that the state store license requirement has been abolished.

Bullock said his office has been besieged with calls and letters this month by businesses which were unaware that the license requirement was repealed as of Dec. 31, 1974.

"Obviously, the past administration didn't get the message out," Bullock said. "I consider it good news that we've been able to do away with the store license."

The store license, which started at \$5 for a single store, was a minor revenue source. Its repeal by phases was ordered by the Legislature in 1971.

Bullock said that some

240,000 stores in Texas had previously been covered by the license act.

He said his office is returning license money still being sent in by businesses unaware of the repeal.

"It's gratifying to see businesses voluntarily trying to do right and pay their taxes, but in this case we are saying 'thanks, but no thanks,'" Bullock said.

Appoint Sherman To Committees

State Senator Max Sherman of Amarillo was appointed Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee by Lt. Governor Bill Hobby during opening day activities of the 64th Legislative Session which convened January 14.

The Natural Resources Committee is generally concerned with legislation relating to oil, gas, parks and wildlife, water, conservation, environment and livestock.

Senator Sherman, a Democrat representing District 31, was also named Vice-Chairman of the Committee on the Texas Constitution. He will also serve on the Senate Committees on Finance and Jurisprudence,

and the Subcommittees on Agriculture and Criminal Matters.

Marshal Ronald Mitchell arrested them and took them to the jail at Farwell.

When contacted this week, Zane Reeves, head Mustang basketball coach, said the incident would probably result in no action taken against the school; however, if the men had continued to create a disturbance and it had been reported to Texas University Interscholastic League officials, it could have possibly resulted in probationary action against the school's basketball teams.

Gary Cox, high school principal, said the incident would have to be reported to the District 3-A Executive Committee.

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In an apparently related incident sometime between 10 and 12 p.m. the same evening, windows at the Bovina city hall and marshal's office and a window in a pickup owned by Mitchell were broken by two rock-throwing men.

Alfonso Delgado, 21, and Zeferino Villarreal, 21, were arrested and charged with destruction of property over \$20 and under \$200, a class A misdemeanor.

The two men appeared in county court this week and were sentenced to 30 days in jail with the sentence probated six months and ordered to make restitution for the damages. Mitchell estimated damages to the city hall and his pickup windows at \$145. Delgado was fined \$1 and court costs with Villarreal fined \$50 and court costs.

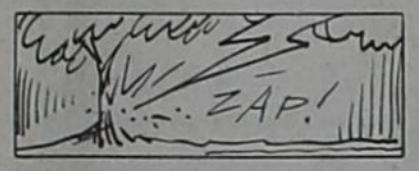
Band Parents Slate Raffle

The Bovina Mustang varsity squad's record fell to eight wins and 12 losses with four losses the past two weeks, two of those by only one point each in heart-breakers for the Ponies in district competition.

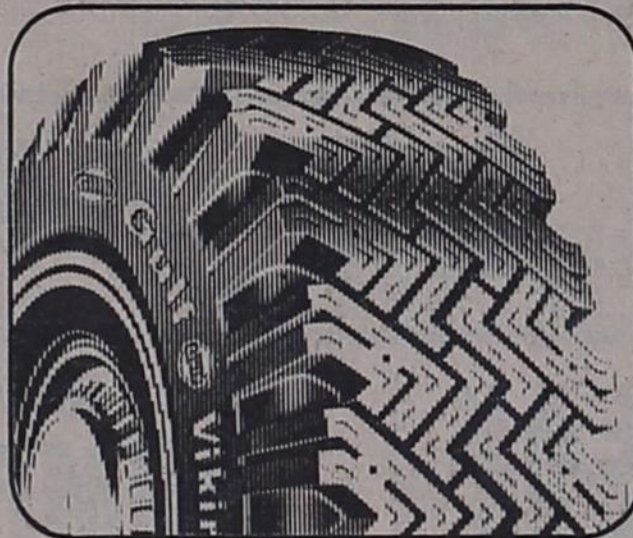
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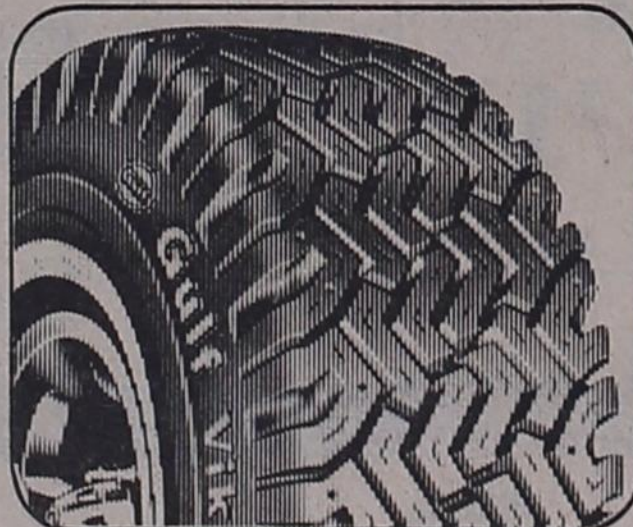
