Construction of a plant in this area to manufacture electrical energy using atomic energy was offered the Mid-Tex Electric Cooperative, Inc., of which the Taylor Electric Cooperative is a part, Lester Dorton, manager of the

The REA in Washington sent an invitation to the Merkel cooperative, along with the coops at Roby, Stamford and Coleman, urging them to consider plans for constructionof such an enormous plant.

Fred H. Strong, assistant administrator of the Rural Electric Administration in Washington, notified the cooperatives of such a plan, and offered them an opportunity to lay plans for the construction of an atomic energy Dorton said the managers of the

cooperative would recommend to their boards the acceptance of the invitation, but there was no indication when such construction, or where, might start. The Atomic Energy Com-

mission had submitted to the REA a "proposal for the development, design, construction and operation of atomic power reactors for small scale plants up to 40,000 kilowatt range suitable for use by smaller utilities such as REA
