HUNDREDS OF residents of this area had the opportunity of hearing the newest star in the recording industry, Olivia Newton-John at her concerts of last weekend.

Olivia presented concerts last Saturday night at West Texas State University in Canyon, and then Sunday night she packed 'em in at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. We were fortunate in being able to catch her latter show.

Miss Newton-John, winner of four "Grammy" awards presented in Hollywood recently for outstanding work in the recording industry during 1974, wowed the crowd of 6,000 people Sunday night, with a full hour's concert.

Recordland's new Queen caused the audience to be a bit uneasy by being 10 minutes late from her scheduled starting time (it was already past 10 p.m. Texas time).

Olivia apologized for being late, explaining that "My zip-puh broke," in her delicate British accent, and an hour later the big throng of folks forgave the Australian transplant with a standing ovation.

THE RAVEN-HAIRED beauty thrilled her audience, made up mostly of college-age youngsters, with all of her hits, such as the song that first gained her fame, "If Not For You," to other million-sellers like "Let Me Be There," "I Honestly Love You," and "You Alone."

The starlet, who was completing two weeks of personal appearances which took her all the way across Texas in a series of one-nighters, drew a round of applause at the beginning by chirping "Hello, How Ya'll doin'?"

Although still new at this "show biz" stuff, Miss Newton-John showed Sunday's audience that she has the stuff of which stars are made. In between songs, she kept up a lively banter. Concerning her unusual name, Olivia said "I went to register in a motel, and they reserved me three rooms."

Unlike stars of many concerts who let their preliminary show fill in the major part of the program so they can run out, do a few songs and leave, Olivia Newton-John gave her audience their money's worth, including a couple of "certain call" numbers.

She may be British-born and Australian-raised, but Miss Newton-John looks very much the part of the All-American girl, and her tiny almost whispering singing voice is a pleasant change from the screaming no-lyric styles that have dominated the scene the past several years.

Miss Newton-John shared the ENMU billing with a preliminary group, headed by Albert Hammond, folk singer and writer known for "I'm A Train," "Little Arrows" and "Oklahoma Sunday Morning."

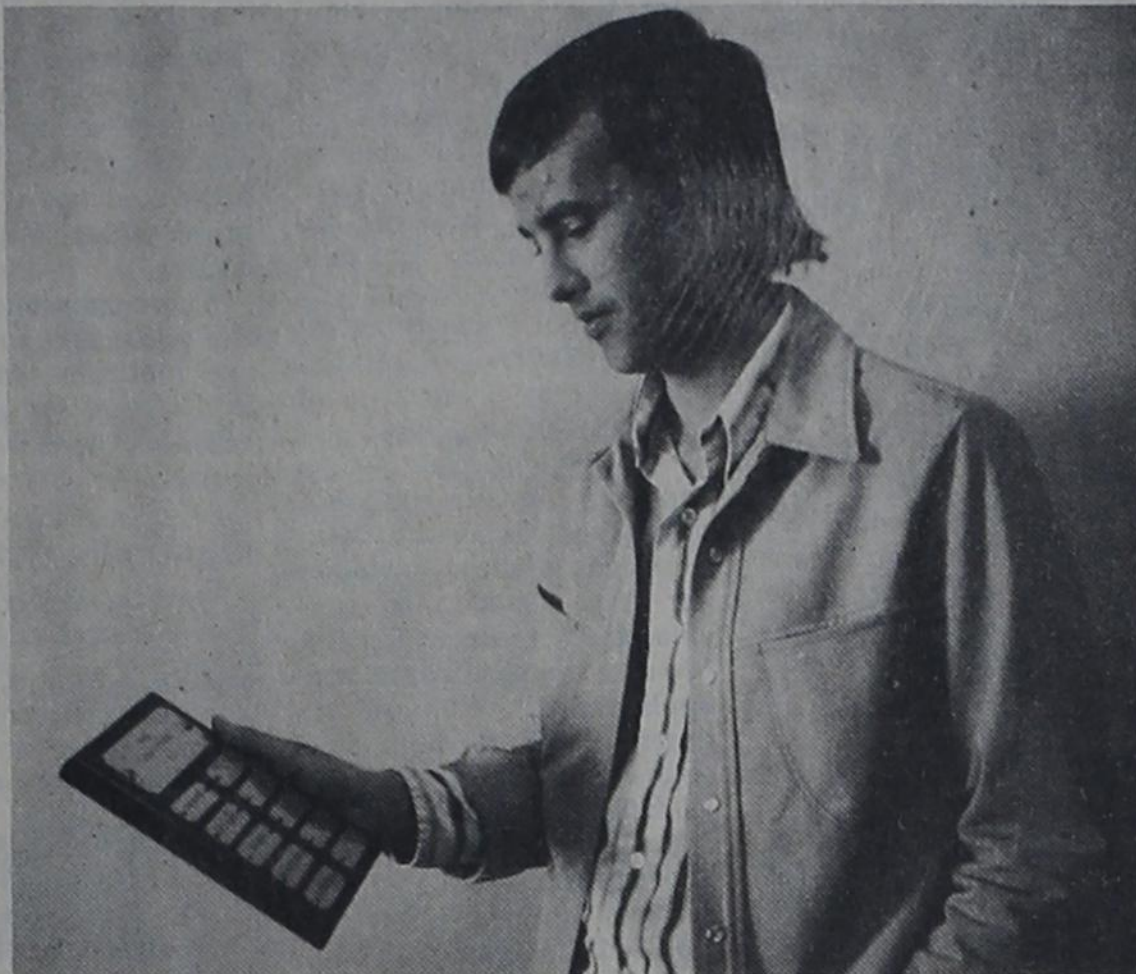

Sewing Fair Scheduled For Four-County Area

Three sewing specialists will be on hand for a two-hour "Sew and Save" Sew Fair Thursday of next week at the Parmer County Community Showbarn in Friona.

A cooperative effort of County Extension Service Agents from 11 counties, Sew Fairs are slated to be held at Dumas and Amarillo in addition to the Friona event.

The Sew Fair will be staged in Friona from 10 a.m. until noon and repeated from 2 to 4 p.m. next Thursday, according to Jana Pronger, Parmer County extension agent. Also attending the Parmer County event will be residents of Deaf Smith, Castro and Bailey Counties.

There will be no admission charge to the event and plans call for displays of fabrics, sewing machines and a variety of sewing notions by area merchants.

A creative southwesterner, Marsha Fredrickson, will demonstrate sewing craftsmanship possibilities

with White and Elna Sewing Machines at the Sew Fair in Friona. Ms. Fredrickson is a home economist with that company and a recent graduate of the University of Texas. She specializes in textiles and clothing and earned membership in Omicron Nu, an honorary home economics society. Prior to joining White Sewing Machine Company, she was a selling supervisor at Scarborough's Department Store in Austin.

Mrs. Becky Culp has a B.S. in clothing and textiles and home economics education and a M.S. degree in clothing and textiles from Texas Tech University. She has served as a teaching assistant at Tech and an extension clothing specialist for the past four years. WITH THE PRESENT moisture, good stands, and anticipated market price for grain, the amount of nitrogen to topdress is an important decision. Evidence available would support the conclusion that topdressing phosphorus and potassium is of little value this late in the season.

Both the rate of nitrogen and time of application are important in obtaining satisfactory results. The rate of nitrogen to use must take into account (1) fertilization to date, (2) yield potential as affected by stand, soil moisture, grazing, and any other condition that can be expected to limit grain production. Generally, 30 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered for grain, using the low rate where nitrogen was applied last fall and no grazing, and the high rate where fall and winter grazing has been practiced. If the grain looks pale green and shows evidence of low nitrogen and the prospects look good, a higher rate may be preferable.

from topdressing, nitrogen should be applied before tillering. Research data show that one way nitrogen increases grain yields is through increased tillering, hence seed heads.

Most nitrogen fertilizers are suitable for topdressing, but it is especially important that the application is evenly applied. Under today's nitrogen cost and grain value, streaking is costly.

Where solutions are used, it is preferable to dribble or use methods that put the fertilizer in contact with the soil, rather than on the leaves.

Sorghum, Corn Are Conference Topic

The nutritional value of grain sorghum versus corn will be the topic of discussion during the March 6 session of the ninth biennial Grain Sorghum Research and Utilization Conference in Lubbock, Texas.

Participating in the panel discussion will be leading nutritionists from throughout the state including Dr. L.S. Pope, serving as moderator, Dr. T.D. Tanksley Jr., swine specialist, Dr. Lloyd Sherrod, cattle specialist and Dr. James Osborn, economist.

Sponsored by Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, the two-day research conference opens at 4 p.m. March 4 and will conclude at noon March 6 with an awards luncheon. All activities will be conducted at South Park Inn on Loop 289. More than 300 plant scientists and animal nutritionists are expected to attend.

I sincerely hope that you see the merits of TEX HELP and that you can run the enclosed public service material to properly publicize the telephone number for the people in your area.

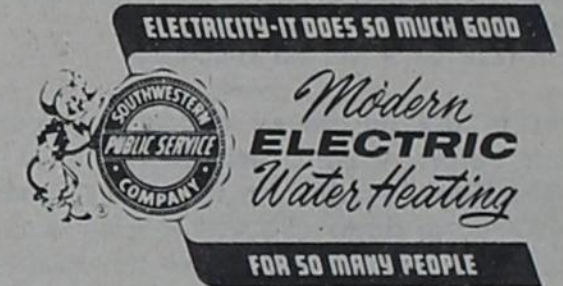

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT PLAINS WEATHER IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, INC. OF P.O. BOX 1627, PLAINVIEW, TEXAS 79072, who holds License No. 15-4 of the State of Texas intends to engage in an operation designed to decrease hailfall by artificial methods for and on behalf of Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc., and will conduct such program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

- The area over or within which equipment may be operated shall include portions of these counties: Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Randall, Deaf Smith and Parmer.
- The target within which hailfall is intended to be decreased is described as follows: The outer boundary commencing at the point of intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb; thence northward along the Hale-Lamb County line to the southern boundary of Castro County; thence westward nine (9) miles along the Castro-Lamb County line; thence due north to State Highway 86; thence eastward along State Highway 86 to U.S. Highway 87; thence southward along U.S. Highway 87 to the northern boundary of Hale County; thence eastward along the county line to Farm Road 378; thence southward along Farm Road 378 to U.S. Highway 70; thence south-eastward 1 1/2 miles along U.S. Highway 70; thence due south to the Floy-Crosby County line; thence westward along the county line to the intersection with Lubbock County; thence southward eight (8) miles along the Lubbock-Crosby County line; thence due west to Farm Road 400; thence northward along Farm Road 400 to the Hale-Lubbock County line; thence westward along the county line to the intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb, the point of origin.



SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

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
