There is a great deal that is not known about this disease, but we do know that it is most com-

mon in people who are overweight, and that it is associated with long, continuous nervous strain, high tension and constant worry. Medical treatment of high blood pressure is fairly successful in many cases.

Rheumatic heart disease, the most common type of early life, occurs as the result of one or more attacks by the streptococcus germ. It isa public health problem for which much can be done in light of recent knowledge. Prophylatic use of penicilis a pulin when streptococcal infections are present will prevent

heart involvement. Syphilitic heart disease can be prevented by early and adequate care of the patient with syphilis. This problem has been simplified by the use of penicillin.

Research in the medical sciences is constantly improving the outlook for the cardiac patient, yet each individual must assume the responsibility for obtaining the benefits of this knowledge from his physician for himself and family.







Rather than federal aid, one leader suggested "relief from the stupendous federal tax burden" to allow states more latitude for school financing. A re-examining of the state's total tax structure in search of additional school revenue was proposed.

Other problems on which the Texas Conference on Education exchanged ideas were: 12-monthsa-year or six days-a-week use of buildings; attracting and holding good teachers; keeping curricula up-to-date.

A concensus of their findings will be compiled into a report to be taken to the White House Conference.
