and falling prices. On February 2, 1956, in Portland, Oregon, Mr. Benson said, "I did not become Secretary to stand idly by wringing my hands while our farm families continue to suffer year after year of economic decline.

But the big packers haven't shared the farmer's plight. Profits of the big meat packers are up between 33 percent and 50 percent in 1955 over 19544.

IN 1952 THE REPUBLICANS . were saying, "The first thing we intend to do is to take the emphasis off of Washington. Our goal will be sound farmer-run programs that safeguard agriculture, but do not regiment you, do not put the Federal Government in charge of your farms,"

Under the Administration's farm bill as submitted to the Congress, the Secretary of Agriculture will be the absolute boss. of theso-called "soil bank."

Many Texas Firms Come **Under New Act**

Almost 2,800 firms in West Texas - those who hire four, five. six or seven workers - are reminded again by Wayland Krizan, district director of the Texas Employment Commission, that they may have been brought under the Texas Unemployment Compensation program on January 1.

Kritzan advises that these West Texas employers heed a recent public statement by Weldon Hart, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, and contact the state TEC office at once.

Krizan quoted Hart's statement to the effect that "i would be to their advantage to do so immediately, so that penalties and assessments of back taxes can be

Ki izan estimates that some 11.-000 West Texas employees gained the benefits of unemployment compensation this year. The TEC district director further quoted Hart as explaining that following amendments to the Federal Unemployment Tax Act last year, the Texas Legislature changed the state unemployment law accordingly. Any business which has as many as four employees on 20 days in 20 different weeks after July 1, 1955 becomes liable for unemployment tax on its payroll during 1956. Beginning January 1 any firm which has 20 such weeks during a calendar year in which four or more persons are employed on any day, will pay un-

employment taxes. "Not only firms which regularly employ as many as four employees will be affected." Hart explained, "but also a small business which has four people working only Saturdays, or one which ing the day and two others at regularly has two employees durnight, will owe the payroll tax at the end of each calendar

Any employer who has employed four persons in 20 weeks during 1955 should notify the Texas Employment Commission in Austin now, Hart added, so that an explanation of how to comply with the law can be sent to him

'We have little experience yet with the 35,000 firms that have four to eight employees," Hart said, "but we think that the group includes many, many stable firms that have very low turnover the drug store, grocery, barber shop, service station and cafe.

This stability suggests that unemployment insurance claims may be made very rarely, and consequently tax rates can be

through the "experience rating" system in the state law is one of the reasons why the Legislature brought in the smaller firms. Had the Legislature not done so, these employers of four to eight would have had to pay a full 3 per cent federal tax. Under the Texas "experience rating" plan, tax rates after a qualifying period of from 1 1-2 to 2 years can range from a maximum of 2.7 percent to a minimum of 1-10 of 1 per cent. The TEC collects the State Tax and the Federal Government collects 3-10 of one per cent for ad-

ministrative purposes. This feature of state operation of the unemployment insurance program saves Texas businessmen millions of dollars each year.

LEGAL COLUMN

CHECK YOUR INSURANCE POLICIES

One of the most familiar types of contracts is the insurance policy, as nearly everyone carries some sort of insurance protection. Yet, few people take the trouble to read their policies and lawyers have to answer many questions regarding insurance

Here is a problem frequently presented: "I have a hospitalization insurance policy. Will the company pay all of my hospital bills if I become ill?

It may or may not. Insurance is a contract between the insurance company and the policy holder. In the usual contract the policy holder agrees to pay a certain sum of money for the policy of insurance, and the insurance company agrees that should the policy holder incur hospital expenses that the insurance company will make payment to the policy holder of stated sums, as out in the policy of insurance.

The insurance policy itself must state the complete contract between the parties. The oral statements of agents not in harmony with the policy are not binding on the company. The company is bound to pay only such sums as are specifically set forth in the policy of insurance.





Soil-Water Loans Reach 319 Million

More than \$19,800,000 has been borrowed by farmers for soil and water conservation since this type of credit was made available a little more than a year ago, Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director for Texas said today.

Farmers used the loans to improve their farms and increase the efficiency of their operations.

A report recently made by Secretary of Agriculture Exra Taft Benson shows that about 79 percent of the funds were used for irrigation, including the purchase of pumps and piping, the drilling of wells and the construction and repair of irrigation ditches and laterals. Irrigation systems were developed or improved for about 282,000 acres.

In Texas, through December 31, 1955, 85 percent of the \$2,280,000 loaned was used for irrigation. ed or improved for more than 34,-






