

After our blood-pressure had ends. As Publisher Brumbeau read a story from the original, we began to pick up line for line, ond in the matter of 10 minutes we had all the type right back Aids. in the right place.

About 1 a.m. we were back on the press and in business, but our dogs were b like they'd never ked before. Billie was home making coffee by the pot every hour on the hour for the helpers down here. Bob, our son at Oklahoma U.,. came driving in for a holiday. He got it. Right on top of the press.

Anyway we go, At least that is what we thought. We fed a few papers through the press, and old Brummy, our contrary folding machine, just wouldn't take that extra fourpage insert without getting it in the paper crooked. Being an expert engineer and mechanic, we began to try to find out what the trouble might be. At 4a.m. we finally conquered the folding machine, and -Away we went . . .

Had someone come in and offered us enough money for break fast at 6:30 a.m. we would have been out of the newspaper publishing business. But, as usual, the paper must go on, and we delivered the papers to the air base neadquarters before 8 a.m.

Nope, we didn't come back and ar any complaints that morning, folks. We'll take them up next week.
