CONGRATULATIONS to the Bovina Mustang basketball players and coaches, on winning the District 5-AA championship. It's the first district basketball title for the Mustangs in 22 long years.

Just to show you how long it's been since the Bovina boys team has been in the playoffs, the father of one of this year's players, Jon Lin Riddle, was a member of the 1961 district champion team.

Bovina has not been without its good teams in the last 22 years. In fact, the past four years the Mustangs have been runners-up, when the Vega Longhorns were on a winning streak.

If the current year's rule had been in effect, where winners and runners-up go into the playoffs, it would mean that the 1983 Mustangs would be in the playoffs for the fifth straight year.

But this year's team decided not to settle for runner-up status, and went for all the marbles. Their win over Olton last Friday gave the team a 10-0 district record.

The team's 23-3 record overall is one of the best around. Unfortunately, the district which furnishes Bovina's bi-district opponent is a tough one this year, with two teams, champion Morton and runnerup Shallowater, ranked in the top ten in the state for class AA teams this season.

Shallowater is the runnerup, with an 18-4 season record. The Mustangs will play Shallowater Friday, February 25 in bi-district at Plainview.

Let's support the Mustangs as they enter the playoffs. Coach Marks Lanham has also lined up some outstanding warmup games for the team. Teams to be met include Nazareth, Anton and either Post or Slaton.

MOST PEOPLE WITH whom we are associated watched at least a good portion of *The Winds Of War* last week on television. Most of these folks also had an opinion on the series, ranging from "pretty good" to "disappointing."

Those who felt that the series ended strangely, need to realize that Herman Wouk's book takes one only to the brink of the United States' involvement in World War II.

If you want to see how the Henry family came cut in the progress of the war, and whether Byron and Natalie ever made it back together, you'll have to read Wouk's sequel to *Winds, War and Remembrance*.

Voters will be naming three members to the Bovina City Council, plus three members to the Bovina School Board.

As of Tuesday noon, the only action had come in the city council race. Incumbent councilmen, Larry Scott, Dudley Hughes and Joe Jones each had filed for re-election.

No one had filed as yet in the school board race. Members of the board whose terms expire are Tom Ware, Keith Garner and Jon Lin Riddle.

Those wishing to file for a city council post may do so at the city hall, and those wishing to sign for a spot on the school board may do so at Superintendent Bob Owen's office.

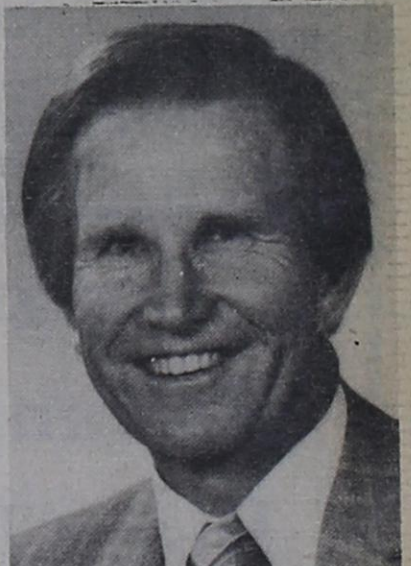
Noted Baptist Leader Preaches Here On Sunday

Dr. Carlos McLeod, who is currently serving as Director of Evangelism for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will be the speaker at Bovina's First Baptist Church at their Sunday morning services (11 a.m.) on Sunday, February 20.

Dr. McLeod is well-known in this area, having served as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Plainview for more than 12 years. Previously, he was pastor of the San Jacinto Baptist Church, Amarillo, 1964-69; First Baptist of Silverton, 1961-63; Hillburn Drive Baptist, Dallas, 1959-60, and First Baptist Church, Halfway, while a student at Wayland Baptist University.

He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Wayland in 1958 and attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. He received an Honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Wayland in 1974.

McLeod is a trustee of Wayland College and has served on several committees of the BGCT. He has been president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, served on the

County Has Fatal Wreck On Report

Luis Flores, THP Trooper in Parmer County, reports that for the month of January the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of eleven accidents in this county. There was one fatal accident with a total of three persons killed, five injury accidents with a total of ten persons injured and five property damage accidents.

On The Farm In Parmer Co.

Heavy snows, wet soils and cold weather has delayed soil sampling for High Plains and South Plains producers. Soil sampling and fertilizing was also delayed by the government finally establishing the PIK program. Do not let these delays raise your 1983 production cost this year, cautioned Seth Ralston, county Extension agent in Parmer County.

"Our farm economics is such that producers cannot afford to blindly add fertilizer for the 1983 crop," Ralston said. "There is still time and the laboratories have computerized their reporting systems for faster sample turn around."

The best time for sampling is just before the field is dry

enough to handle tractor traffic. Later everyone will be in a dead run to get their land prepared, so be ready to start your PIK production acres on the right foot, he cautioned.

To get a good soil test, a good soil sample is essential. Obtain ten to fifteen samples taken from the surface down to six inches deep. Mix these samples in a plastic bucket. Then take about two-thirds to three-fourths of a pint of the sample soil and mail to the soil testing laboratory for testing.

Be sure to complete a crop information sheet on each soil sample, notes Ralston. This aids the soil chemist to generate a better fertilizer recommendation for your farm.

Information sheets, sample bags for mailing and additional information on soil testing is available at the county Extension office.

Mustangs Win With Unbeaten Record

The Bovina High School Mustangs closed out their 1982-83 district schedule undefeated, in the process winning the district championship for the first time in 22 years.

The Mustangs downed Farwell, 63-52 here last Tuesday, and then coasted past Olton, 75-58 in a game at Olton on Friday.

Farwell had played Bovina its closest game in the first half of the schedule, and made it interesting here last Thursday, although the Mustangs were on top all the way.

Richard Shepherd hit seven first-quarter points as Bovina took a 13-8 lead at the buzzer. Dale Gilbreath added six, and Jeff Steelman did likewise, as the Ponies took a 33-19 halftime lead.

Farwell had the upper hand in the third quarter as Anderson scored 11 points. The Steers held a 21-16 scoring edge, to trail by only nine, 49-40, entering the final period.

But the Mustangs responded, and came away with the win, 63-52.

A big second half carried the Mustangs to their win over Olton. The Olton team took a first quarter lead, 15-12, and Bovina held only a five-point lead at halftime, 32-27.

But Bovina outscored their hosts, 43-31 in the second half to put more distance between the two teams. Shepherd rammed in 29 points to lead the scoring, and McClaran came up with 20.

St. Ann's Sets Annual Sausage Meal

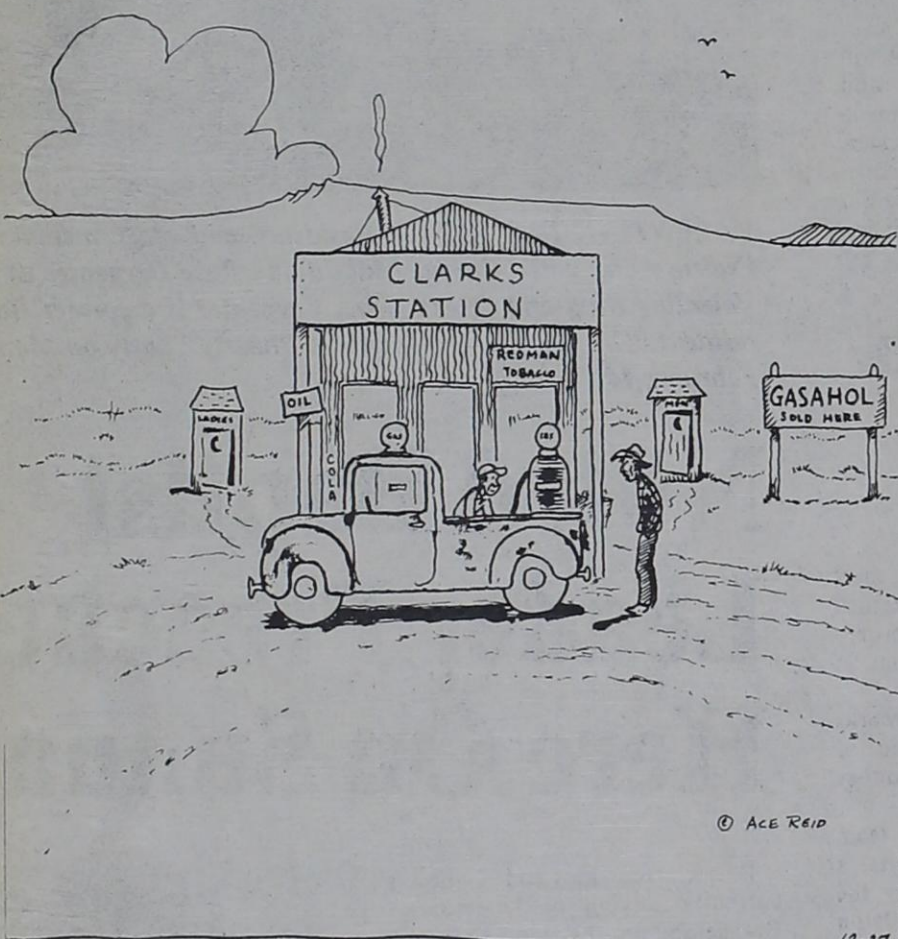

Farwell, Olton Defeat Fillies In Final Games

The Bovina High School Fillies dropped their final two district games, to Farwell and Olton, to close out their 1982-83 season.

The Fillies fell to Farwell here, 69-55 last Tuesday, and then dropped a 56-55 decision to champion Olton. That made two one-point losses by the Fillies in their last three games, both to the teams who will be in the playoffs.

The Farwell team avenged an earlier 58-56 Bovina win by opening with a strong first half. The Steerettes took a 39-23 halftime lead, thanks mainly to free throws. Farwell scored 15 free throws of 20 attempts. Bovina, meanwhile, had only nine attempts, making five.

The Fillies came back to control the second half. Marie Pesch scored ten third-quarter points as Bovina outpointed the visitors, 16-13.

Farwell was treated to three technical foul shots in the latter stages.

Marie Pesch led the Fillies with 22 points.

At Olton on Friday, the two Fillies

teams hooked up in a nip and tuck battle which lasted the duration of the game. Olton held leads of 15-13 and 30-27 at the first two quarter breaks.

The Fillies had a good third quarter, piling up 20 points and getting balanced scoring, to take a 47-43 lead.

But Olton came back with a good fourth quarter to claim the win, 56-55.

Free throws were again a factor, as Olton made 12 of 19, while Bovina made only one of six attempts.

Farmers Are Urged To Seek Breaks

"Farmers who survive 1983 will be ones who cut corners without cutting their jugular," says a leading Southwestern Panhandle agricultural banker.

In speculating on how Southwestern Panhandle area farmers can offset high interest rates and depressed crop prices, Hal Easley, vice president of agricultural loans for First National Bank of Hereford, stresses, "Only producers who find ways to save on production expenses and not put their yields in jeopardy will succeed in making a profit for the coming year."

"Farmers will have to become true bargain shoppers, just like other consumers who have learned to track down discounts and sales," he recommends.

Easley encourages agricultural producers of the Southwestern Panhandle area to seek out finance waiver programs, early payment discounts and other money-saving deals now being offered in the agricultural marketplace.

"Something like a ten per cent discount on good quality seed now being offered by some seed dealers can give the farmer a real price break on a product he's going to have to buy if he farms at all," he says.

"You wouldn't want to jump at just any deal that comes down the pike," he points out, noting that farmers operating on borrowed money must carefully weigh the savings offered by the sellers against the interest to be paid on borrowed money.

"For example, if the savings offered by the farm supplier is big enough to offset the additional interest you might pay by buying early, then it's a good deal," he says. "But if the interest costs you more than you save, it's a bad deal."

Easley concludes that "saving ten per cent on seed costs in February when you're ordinarily paying for seed in April or May actually represents around 40 per cent in annualized interest. Play that against production interest of 12 to 14 per cent and you can see this is a good deal."

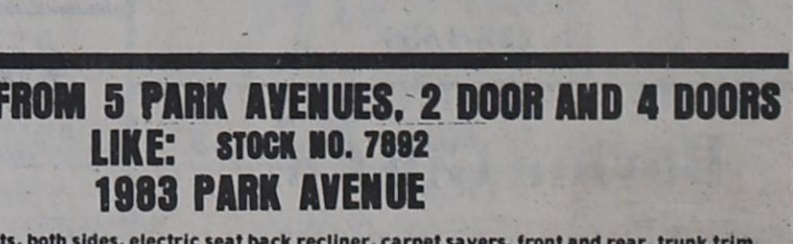
