THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 17 will be observed as the seventh annual "Great American Smokeout" in Texas.

The Smokeout is sponsored by the American Cancer Society nationwide, in order to encourage smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day, if only to prove to themselves that they can.

A survey conducted by the Gallup poll last year indicated that more than 19 million Americans tried to quit smoking for the day. Only about five million people made it the whole day, and 2.3 million of these were still not smoking 11 days after, the survey showed.

A feature of the current year's campaign is called "adopt a smoker," whereby non-smokers are encouraged to adopt their smoker friends and family members for the day in order to offer them support and encouragement. In Maryland, where this concept originated, "adoption" papers are available.

Many Texas communities are participating in the event in various ways, from rallies to parades and school assemblies, and balloon lift-offs and kissing booths.

The campaign should also have received a shot in the arm from the San Francisco area, which last week voted to make it illegal for people to smoke in offices and other work areas.

Of course, non-smoking areas have long been available to airline customers, as well as customers of certain restaurants. In addition, a "Non-Smokers Inn" has opened in certain metropolitan areas.

But the placing of the smoking issue on the ballot in San Francisco was the first time, to this writer's knowledge that the smoking vs non-smoking situation has been brought before the voters.

We would urge our smoking friends to participate in the "Great Smokeout," and to see how long they can go without smoking. Surely, if they can make it a day without a smoke, they can go two, three and more.

Naturally, that's easy for a non-smoker to say.

## Penny Johnson Contest Winner

Third place for the week went to Betty Shepherd, who was one of eight contestants correctly picking 11 games. Betty claimed the third place cash prize after missing the Dallas-San Diego score by only four points. She picked Dallas to win the game, 27-24, and as Dallas fans know, this could have been the score if Septien hadn't missed a point-after and a field goal.

Other contestants correctly picking 11 games, and their tie-breaker differences, were Rick Castaneda, 11; Jan Smith, 11; Hattie Burnett, 12; Jean Morgan 12; Sam Morgan, 15; A.M. Wilson, 18, and Marie Pesch, 22.

## Mike Miller Elected To County SWCD

Mike Miller of Lazbuddie was recently elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on October 4. Miller represents Zone V of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and

private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Miller will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Miller is active in the Farm Bureau and High Plains Research Foundation.

Mike and his wife, Pamela, have four children, Kurt, Kristine, Scott and Jon Colby.

In Texas, there are 201 soil and water conservation districts.

Organized in April of 1948, the Parmer County SWCD has worked jointly with the Soil Conservation Service to serve all landowners and operators equally.

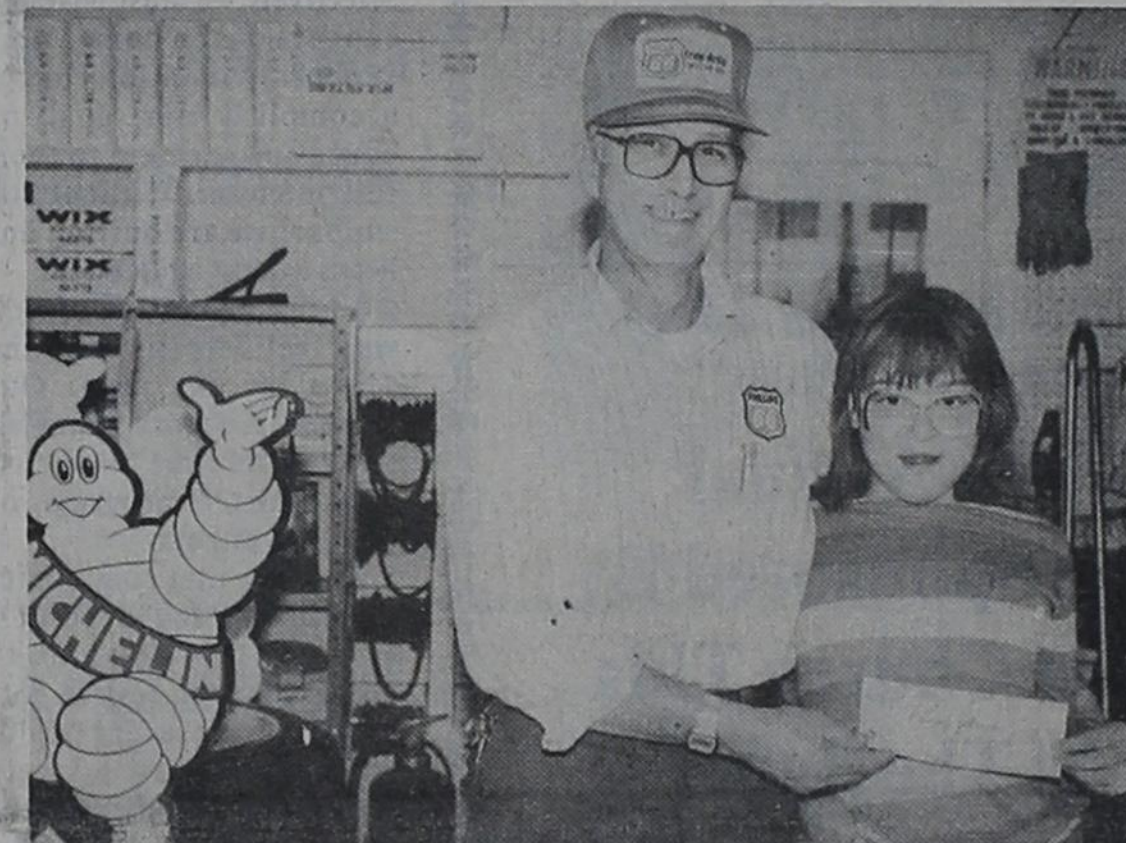
## Bazaar Slated Here Nov. 18

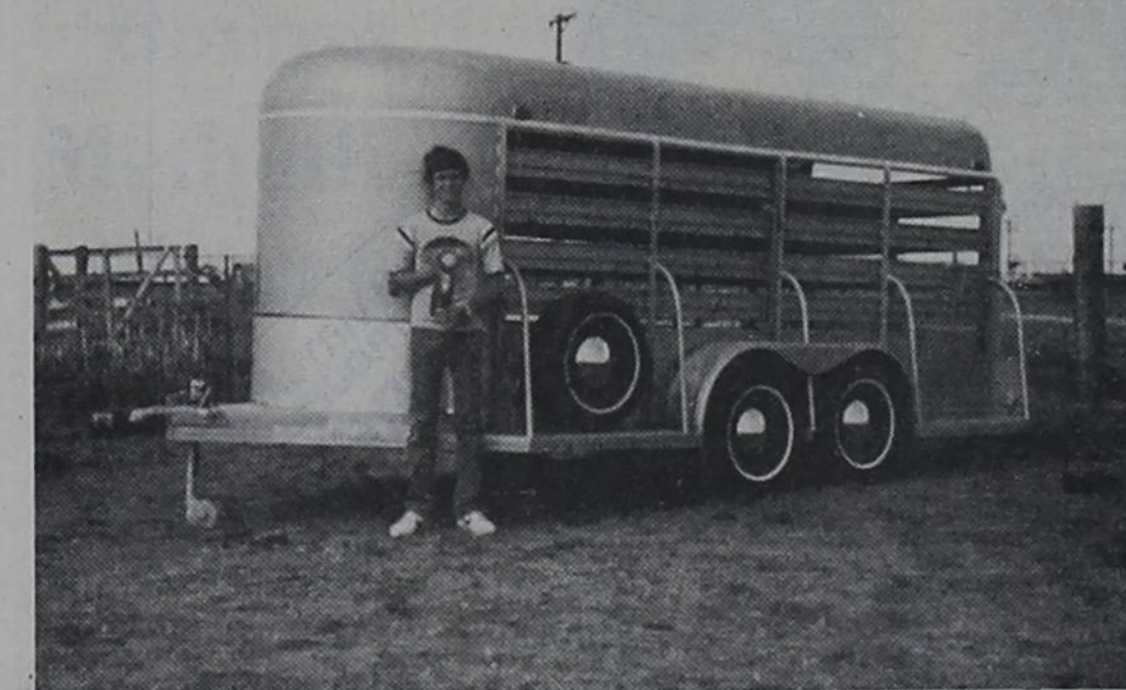
Residents of the community are urged to attend the bazaar and select from the items for sale, which will make excellent Christmas gifts.

The hail area farmers suffered last June almost wiped them out, according to Lawlis, and the early freeze finished the job.

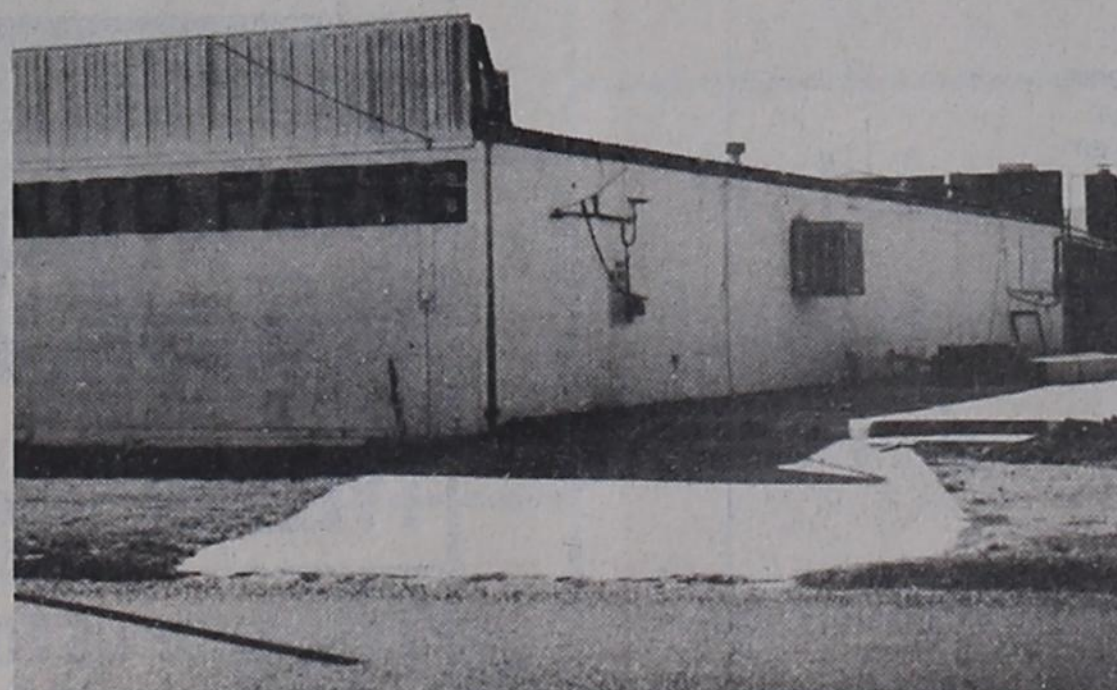
This is the second bad year in a row for cotton growers. An average year for the ginners here is about 5,000 or 6,000 bales.

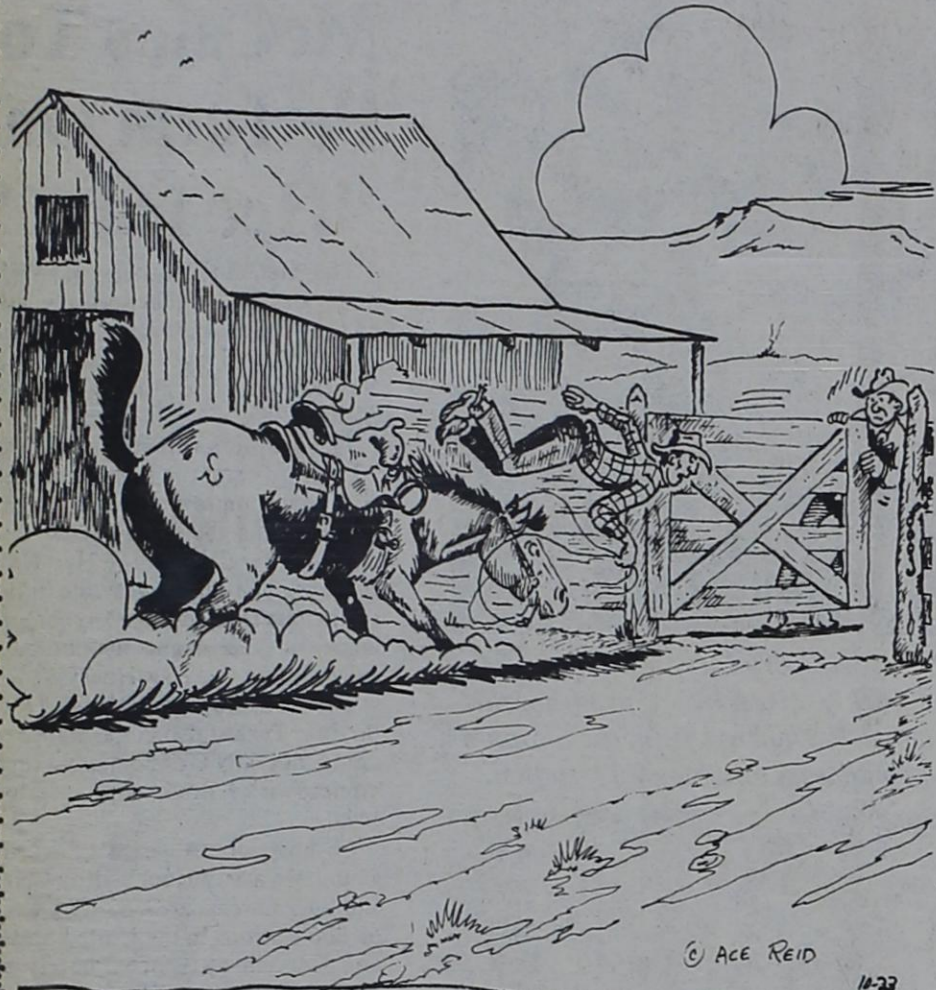

Entertaining the group were the Hereford Senior Citizens band known as the K-Zoo Band, singing and playing songs of yesterday.



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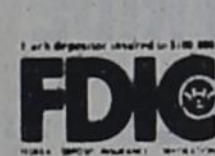

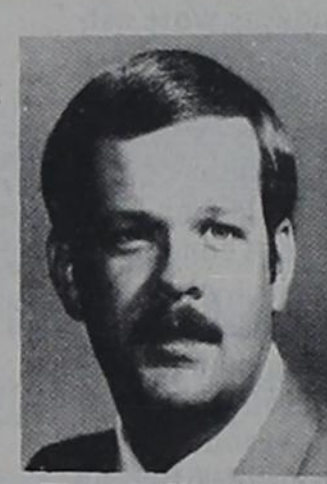

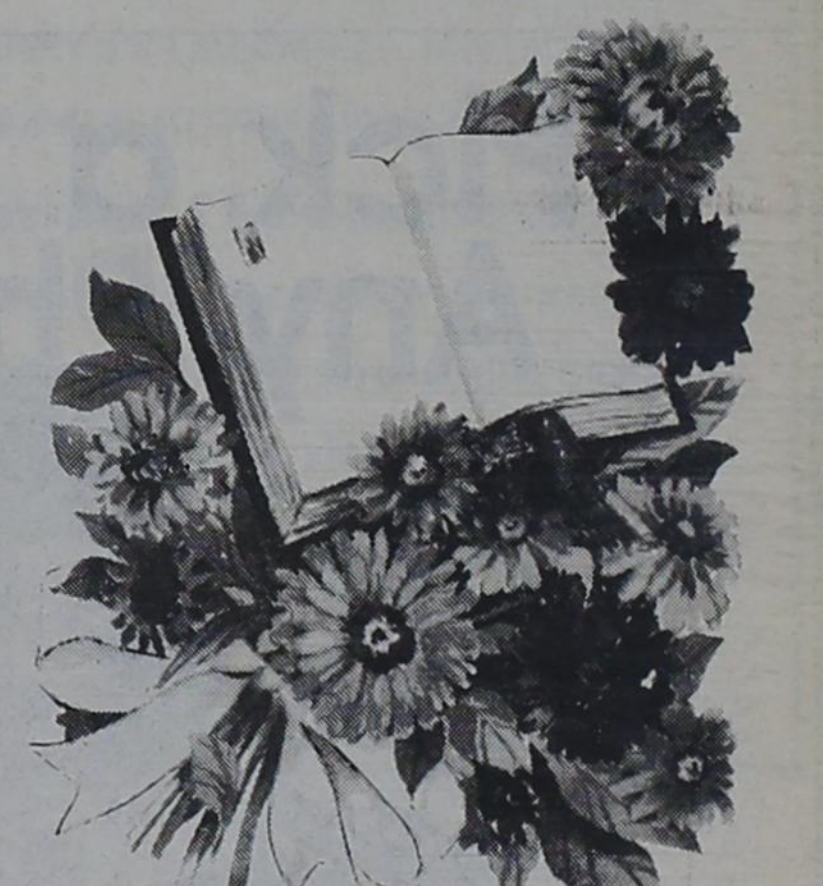

# Clovis Ceremony Unites P. Johnson, R. Carpenter

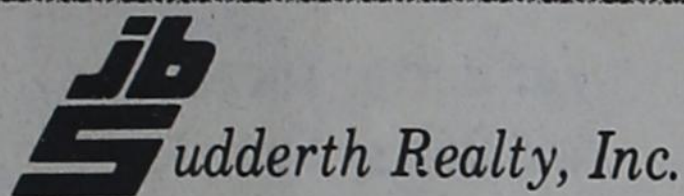

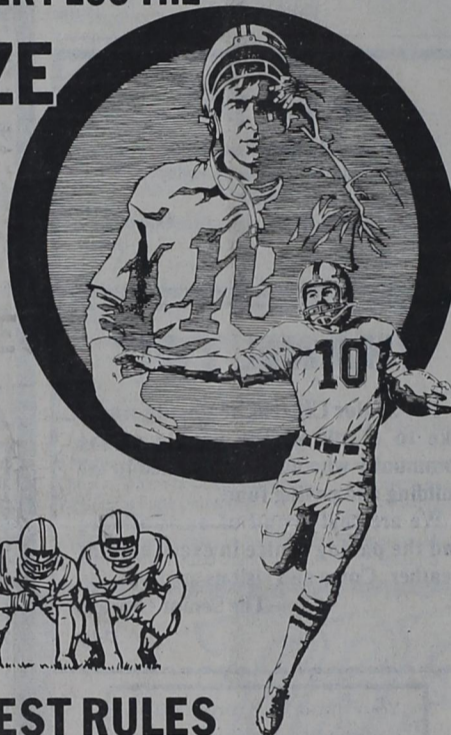
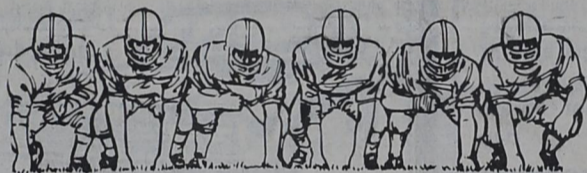
