

#### Highway System Can Be Adequate 20 Years

With adoption of certain legislative and administrative policies, the Texas highway system can be brought to a condition of complete adequacy in 20 years without the levying of any new taxes, the State Highway Commission is told in a report released today by the Texas Research League way needs and financing. The League conducted the survey by request of the Highway Com-

The "condition of complete adequacy" referred to assumes that every mile of road on the entire state system would be adequate to earry the traffic actually using it.

The League staff and consultant started the study in September, 1955. Fact-finding was completed several months ago, when writing of the report of findings, conclusions and recommendations began. League staff members spent several months in the field during the fact-finding stage of

Commenting on the commission's acceptance of the report. Chairman E. H. Thornton, Jr.

"The members of the Highway Commission and the staff of the Research League have discussed the report's findings and recommendations in two recent conferences. We are satisfied that it contains much valuable information which will help the commission in planning the long term highway construction program of

"We intend to give careful con-sideration to the League's recommendations. We have asked the League to assist in giving the widest possible distribution to its findings that we may have the benefit of public reaction to them."

The League reports that anticipated revenue from taxes now imposed for financing the highway program (the gasoline tax and motor vehicle registration fees), plus federal aid, will just about equal the total cost of highconstruction, maintenance, and administration over the 20year period.

However, the report emphasizes that adoption of its recommendations on purchases of right-ofway would create need for \$8 million annually above that which will be collected under present state road user tax laws. This estimate assumes that the program will spread over a 20-year period. It also assumes that the Highway Department not be asked to take on any new functions, tional offsetting revenues are however desirable, unless addimade available to it.

It is recommended that the state, through the Highway Commission, pay 50 per cent of cost of right-of-way on the primary and state systems, including twolane roads, and 100 per cent of cost of right-of-way on the inter-state system within the state.




