

Clinics are currently operating in Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston. Houston, and San Antonio. The address and telephone number of each is listed in the city telephone directory.

The first comprehensive look at the services rendered by clinics has recently been completed by the State Health Department's Division of Mental Health. It shows that in one year more than 2,400 people95 per cent of them from urban areas-were given psychiasultation and returning home aft erward. And since each patient was a member of a family, the relief of his distress meant happier relationships for the entire family.

Most children patients in the 5-9 age group were diagnosed as having personality problems such things as social conduct and habit difficulties. The bulk of mental deficiencies were also found in this age group.






