

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

Runoff has likewise varied considerably depending upon intensity of rainfall and amount of cover or conservation treatment on the land. A summary of moisture penetration tests over the area reveals depths of 12 to 16 inches with sparse cover, whereas land having good cover is wet 30 to 60 inches. Total runoff for sub-watersheds above flood detention structures has not exceeded 1.5 inches during the past week. 


