





Wildlife Service **Restocks Tanks**

The long-dry tanks and ponds of Texas farms and ranches - most of which are now filled with water from recent rains - can be restocked with game fish - Senators Ralph Yarborough and Lyndon Johnson have announced.

The two Texas senators said they had been informed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service that "fish for restocking are available and orders can be filled without delay.'

This is the procedure for securing fish, as outlined to the Texas senators by the Fish and Wildlife Service:

1. The land owner makes application for the fish from the federal fish hatchery nearest him. There are five federal hatcheries in Texas, at Austin, Fort Worth, San Marcos, Burnet and Uvalde

2. The application is sent by the hatchery to a regional office at Albuquerque, N. M., for processing.

3. Upon application approval, the fish are delivered




