Doctor To Begin Practice Thursday

Bovina will be getting a doctor and he will begin his practice locally Thursday, December 11.

Dr. Mike Woollends, 42, is a medical doctor and general practitioner. He was born in England and graduated from the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada.

He interned at Calgary, Canada, providence of Alberta.

Dr. Woollends had a family practice in San Antonio for seven years and was family practitioner at Lutheran General Hospital in San Antonio.

He worked for the past year and a half at the Fort Sumner Hospital.

His wife's name is Alice and the couple has two children, a son Alexander, five years old and a daughter, Sarah, who is four years old.

He and his family presently live in Clovis, but as soon as it is possible they will be moving to Bovina.

The doctor says he will make house calls for elderly and shut-ins.

Billy Whitecotton, chairman of the Medical Board, said they would allow the doctor to work out of the clinic rent free for the first year. The doctor will pay utilities and the board will pay for any maintenance and will have the yard work taken care of. After the year is up, the doctor will be charged enough rent to cover the insurance and maintenance of the building and the yard's upkeep.

Office hours for the clinic will be: Monday, 9 a.m.-6 p.m.; Tuesday, 1-7 p.m.; Wednesday, 9 a.m.-6 p.m.; Thursday, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.; and Friday, 9 a.m.-6 p.m.

There will be a reception held in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Woollends and everyone is invited to come meet and visit with the doctor and his family. It will be held at the clinic Sunday afternoon from 2-4 p.m.

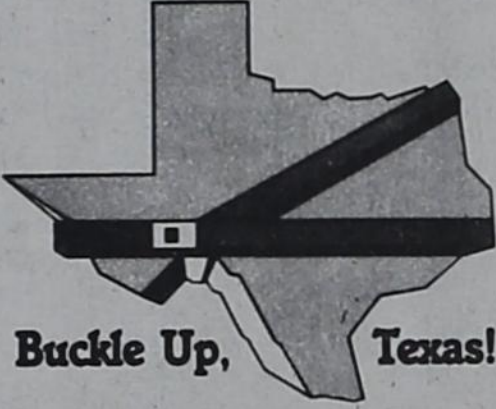

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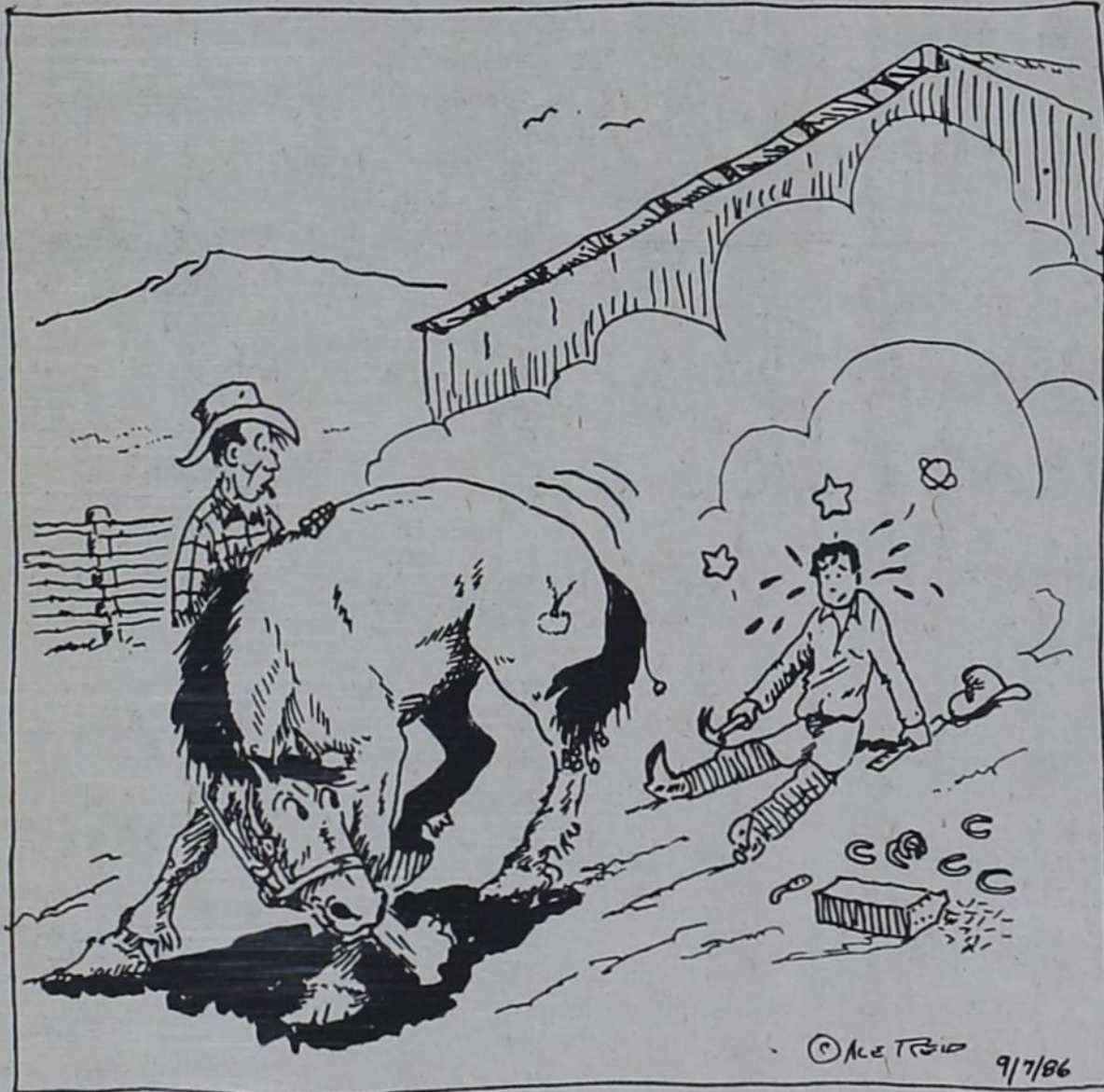

Aging Agency Receives Grant Award For '87

The Panhandle Area Agency on Aging has received \$910,237 in federal funds to support nutrition, transportation and other essential programs for the elderly in 1987.

These funds, which are part of \$33.7 million that Congress recently authorized for Texas through the Older Americans Act, were allocated by the Texas Department on Aging.

Charles T. Hubbard, who was named earlier this month as the Department on Aging's new Finance Director, said the Older Americans Act fared somewhat better than expected in Congress.

"Nationwide, the increase over 1986 was \$68 million, which raised the total OAA allocation to slightly over \$1 billion," Hubbard said. "That's more than we had anticipated, given the current economic situation, and we're committed to seeing that Texas' share of these funds is used responsibly and effectively."

Texas received about \$2 million of the total increase.

Hubbard noted the \$68 million increase restores an earlier cut of 4.3 per cent under the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law and adds \$16 million for Title III OAA programs like senior centers, home-delivered and group meals, transportation and supportive services.

Sue Fowler shared the following, hoping it would help those planning to have poinsettias for the holidays.

Hints to give your Poinsettias a longer life:

1. Place in a bright area, 60-65 degrees Fahrenheit. Do now allow the sun to shine on them.
2. Check plants daily. Water with tepid (barely warm) water. Water when the soil is dry to the touch.
3. Bracts (colored leaves) are sensitive to bruising. Handle

carefully.

4. Do not place plants on a T.V. or any area subject to hot air or draft.

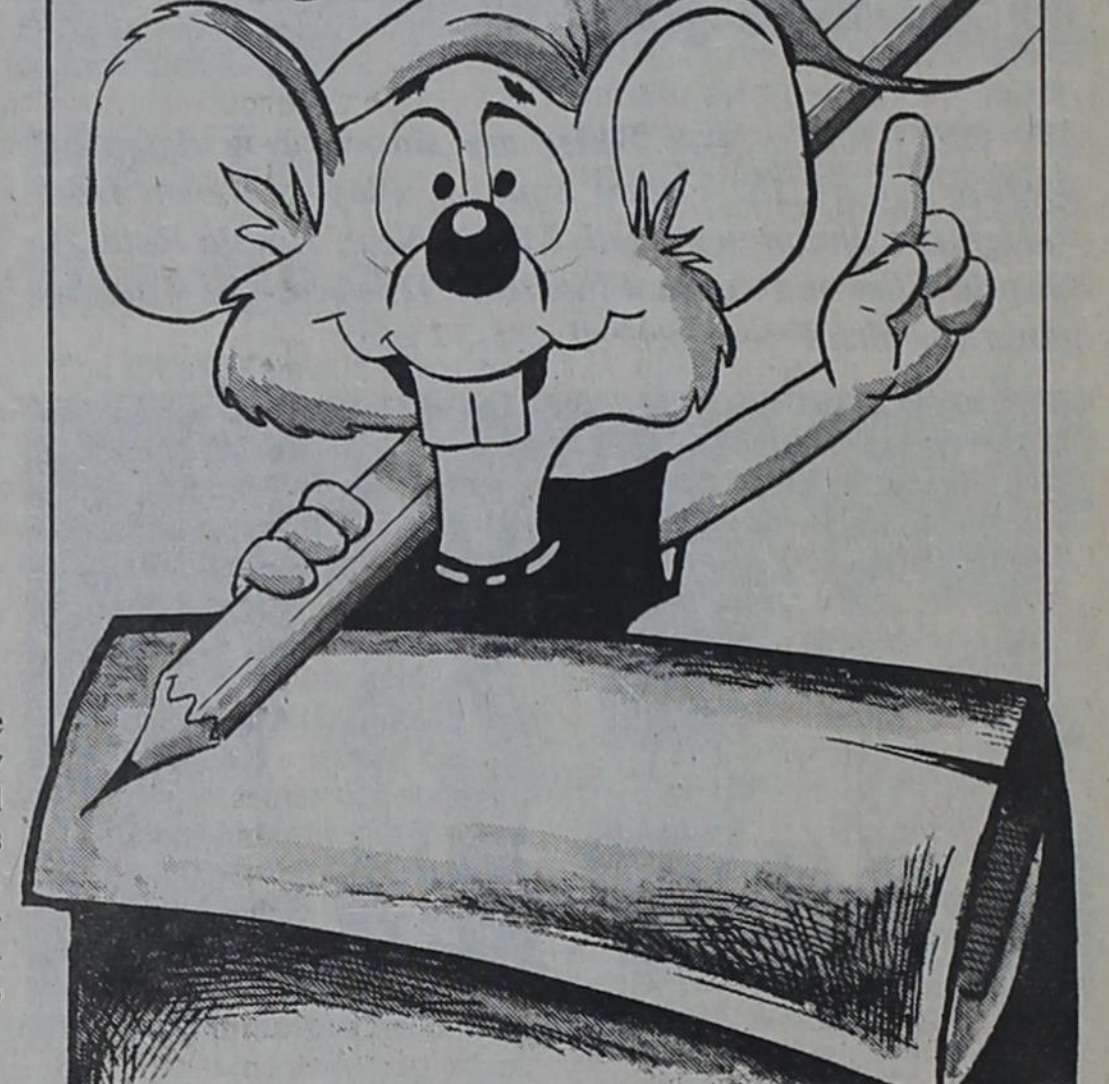
5. Remember, poinsettias are a tropical plant, and like the humidity.

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Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

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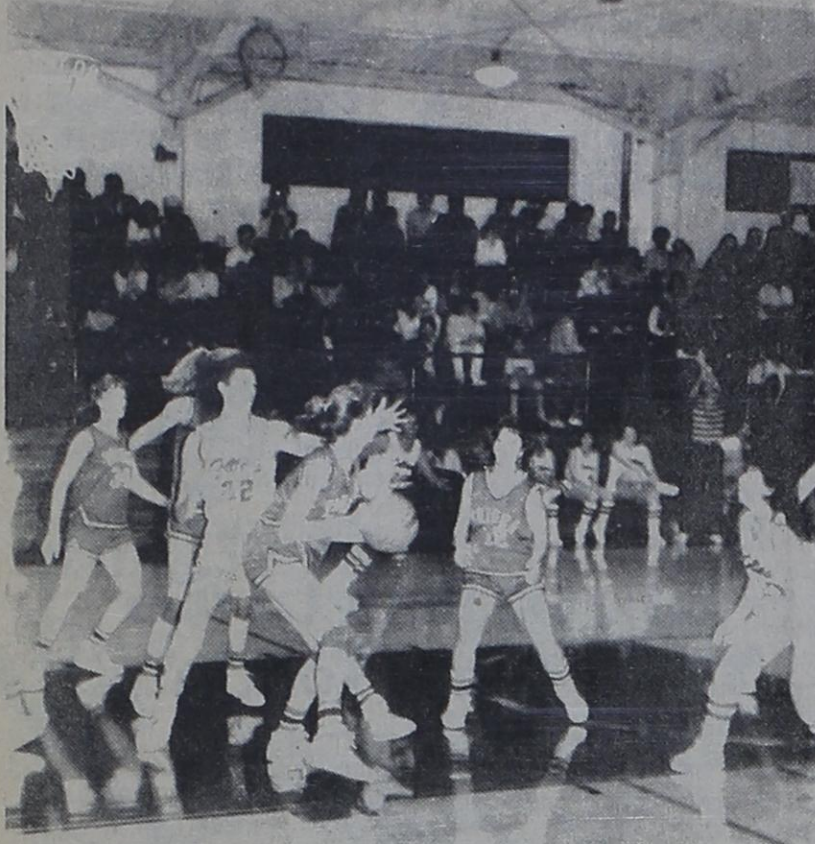
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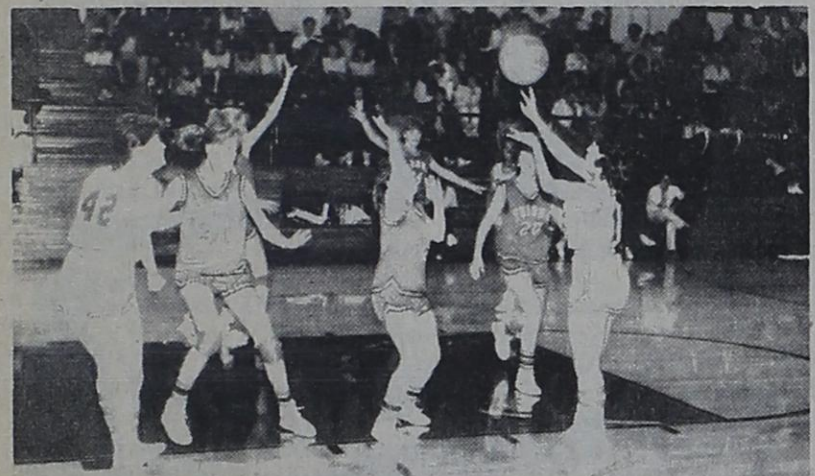

Mustangs, Fillies Lose To Friona

Both the Mustangs and Fillies dropped hard-fought games to visiting Friona last Tuesday night. The Fillies, who had beaten Friona in their season opener at Friona, lost by 45-37, and the Mustangs led most of the way before losing, 73-69.

The Fillies started off like they might blow the Squaws out, scoring the first eight points of the game. Mindy Neal scored two baskets, Peggy Shepherd connected on a jump shot, as did Anna Villarreal, as Bovina grabbed an 8-0 lead.

But Friona regrouped and scored the next 12 points to take the lead. Miss Neal's jump shot tied the score for Bovina at 15-all after 1:22 in the second quarter, and Miss Shepherd tied the count at 17-all a minute later.

However, Friona took the lead to stay on a layup by Ronda Ratcliff, and went on to a 29-20 halftime lead. It was 37-29 after three quarters, and Friona scored the first eight points in the final quarter.

Mindy Neal was held to 11 points, her lowest total of the season, and Miss Shepherd took game scoring honors with 12.

The boys' game saw some hot shooting on the part of both teams. Scott Scaff had a good first quarter, to pace the Mustangs to a 20-12 lead with 51 seconds left in the quarter. Friona scored three more baskets, including a half court shot by Shy Burney, to cut the margin to 20-18 at the buzzer.

Scaff and Denver Riddle paced the Mustangs to a 34-26 lead 3:53 before halftime. Friona cut the margin to 38-34, but Riddle's shot with 12 seconds left made it 40-34.

Friona scored the first six points of the third quarter to tie the game, but Bovina continued to hold the upper hand.

Byron Neal's jump shot gave Bovina a 49-44 lead, and he connected again as Bovina pushed its lead to nine points at 55-46.

But Friona kept hacking at the lead. Scaff gave the Mustangs a 64-61 lead with 5:21 left in the game, and Noah Villa hit one of two from the line for a 65-63 Bovina lead.

After Friona had taken a four-point lead at 69-65, the Mustangs made a bid to pull out the win. Billy Scott Sudderth made a layup shot after a steal for a 69-67 deficit.

Then, with the score 71-67, Sudderth scored again on a long jump shot with 40 seconds left for a 71-69 score. He had apparently scored the tying basket with 13

seconds left, but officials called an infraction prior to the goal, and Friona escaped with a 73-69 win after a pair of free throws with four seconds left.

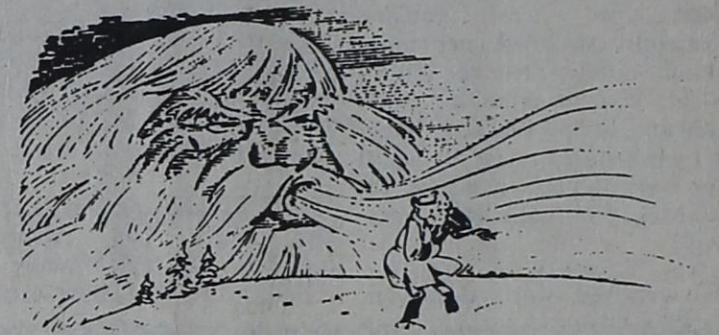

School Corner

In October, the eleventh graders all over Texas took the exit level TEAMS test. This test is a requirement of the school reform bill, and must be passed before a student can receive a high school diploma. The test is administered in two areas--math and language arts. The language arts section includes reading, writing and grammar.

Twenty-five Bovina juniors took the test and twenty-four of them mastered all areas tested. This computes to 96 per cent of students passing the test. Converting this to national percentiles indicates that our students are as good or better than 67 per cent of the students nationwide in reading and as good or better than 74 per cent of the students in writing. We can only predict national percentiles in the language arts section of the test.

We are very proud of our students for this performance. It is indicative of the fact that they are applying themselves, and that they have teachers who are doing a good job of teaching the basics.

There are many good things going on in Bovina Schools. We are very fortunate to have the excellent teachers that we have. I would encourage you to come sometime and visit so that you can see first-hand what is going on.

I am personally very proud of our school and our staff. Please join me in expressing gratitude to those who serve our students in Bovina, because without them our school would be nothing.

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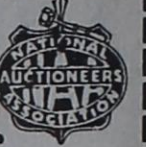
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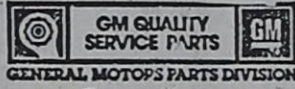
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
