Month Ends Very Mild Locally

The month of January, which has been much warmer than usual, was closing out on a warm note in the local area.

The high temperature reached 64 degrees on Monday, marking the 14th time during the month for readings to top the 60-degree mark, and the mercury was expected to hit the 70-degree mark before day's end.

Temperatures reached into the 50s on ten other days in January, marking 24 days of the 31 for the readings to reach at least 50.

The area avoided a shut-out in the moisture department last Friday when a mixture of rain, snow and sleet left a total of .17 inches of moisture. This was the only measurable moisture for the month, and first for the year.



The Hale County State Bank filed a lawsuit on August 20, 1987, regarding the fraudulent misrepresentation of the stock, but the civil case has yet to be tried.







8th Boys Win Title At Sudan


Bovina's eighth grade boys won the championship in the Sudan tournament last weekend.

"An old dented box with sharp cutting edges, or a box that is too small should also be replaced, or mail delivery will be withheld."

"If you have any questions regarding the placement or upkeep of your mailbox, please call the post office," says Mrs. Bartlett, "and thank you for your continued cooperation here in the Bovina delivery area."









Assistance May Be Available

AUSTIN-Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Acting Commissioner Charles Stevenson.


Stevenson said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application from local DHS offices during the enrollment period of Jan. 16 through Feb. 16.


Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a oneperson household having less than \$589.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$781.49 for households of two persons, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five, and \$1,549.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the
