DEMOCRACY AT WORK!

GOVERNING BODY

Taylor Electric Cooperative enjoys a true democratic form of Government. Each member (consumer) of the Co-op is allowed one vote, and only one, regardless of the number of meters he has connected.

Th directors are elected by a vote of the members (consumers) and must themselves be consumers of the cooperative. These directors, being nine in number, are the legislative body of the Cooperative and have the responsibility of the policy making. The executive duties are the responsibility of the general manager who is appointed by the directors. The general manager appoints his staff and they are responsible to him.

COMMUNITY

The 36 employees at Taylor are obtained for the most part from the local community. Approximately 75% of these folks own their own home here, pay their taxes here, shop here and glady share in the Civic work of the area and town.

Taylor's payroll last year was in excess of \$135,000 and Taylor's consumers have furnished a market and a demand for goods that are sold by the merchant on main street.
