Cage Brothers Get Contract For Farm Road

A contract for the construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing on Farm-to-Market Road 1085, 604 and 382 in Taylor County was awarded in Austin last week, J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene has announced, The firm of Cage Brothers San Antonio submitted the low bid of \$243,384.22 on the project which runs from 2.0 miles south of Trent, south to FM Rd. 126; from FM Rd. 382 east to Lawn; and frem Ovalo south to Runnels County Line, a distance of 15.258 miles.

Resident Engineer E. L. Harris of Abilene will be in charge of the project for the Highway Department, and it is estimated that the work will take 125 days to complete.

Protect Public AUSTIN-"What would you do if all traffic signs in Texas were suddenly removed?"

Traffic Signs

That question was asked today by J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, in an attempt to focus the public's attention on TSA's Signs of Life program.

"Traffic signs placed at carefully selected locations act as silent policemen to protect the public and help move traffic safely and efficiently," Musick said.

He stressed that in addition to urging the public to know and obey traffic signs, traffic officials, police and engineers make regular checks to see that the signs are in good condition. Sometimes, he reminded, the weather, vandalism or other conditions make the signs difficult to read.

"We urge motorists and pedestrians to learn the meaning of signs by their shape alone," the TSA manager said. "They should know their shapes and learn to use this knowledge instinctively in city traffic or on the highway." Musick said that the over-all attack on traffic accidents is built around safety's original three E's-engineering, education and enforcement. "First," he explained, "the eng-
