

These have been accomplished at some large expense, yet this has been brought about with the same Tax-rate now as it was when I first went into office.

Our precinct was one of the first to use the fogging machines to control mosquitoes and flies which carry Polio and other diseases.

Precinct 2 was the first to contract with our city for "Fire Protection" for the rural area.
