Joe Cypert Wins Commissioner's Race By 43 In Saturday's Runoff

Rufe Tittle, veteran Taylor county Commissioner, lost his bid for reelection Saturday.

Tittle, who first was elected to the Precinct 2 commissioner's post in 1948 and has held the job ever since, was defeated by Joe Cypert by a 43-vote margin in a hot run-off contest.

Voters from the five boxes in Precinct 2 turned out in droves to run up a larger total in the second primary than in the first.

Elsewhere in Taylor County, where voters were to decide on a Supreme Court associate justice race, voting was light.

Of the 1,337 ballots cast in the whole county, 1009 of them were in the Merkel area. This was 88 more votes than were counted in the commission's race in the July primary. Then, Cypert collected 386 votes, Tittle 376, and Joe Seymour 159.

Robert J. Hamilton of Midland, polled a total of 362 votes to 279 for J. Edward Smith of Houston in the Supreme Court justice race.

The new Precinct 2 commissioner currently is in the real estate business in Merkel. Previously he has been a grocer, worked for a number of years in the county tax office and for Taylor Telephone Cooperative.

Merkel Woman's Brother Dies

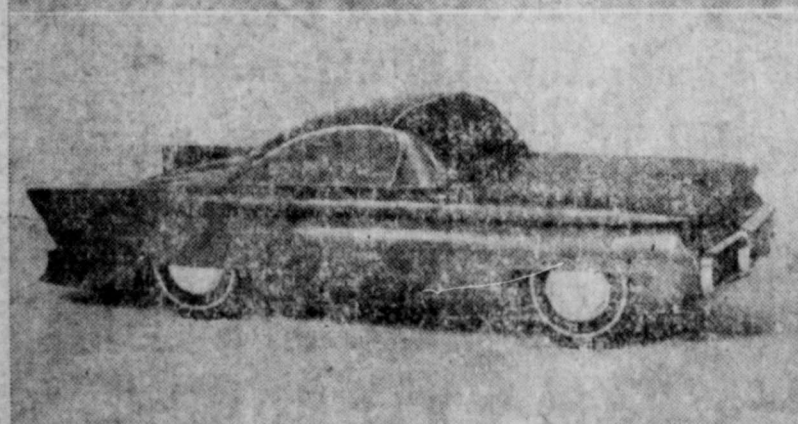
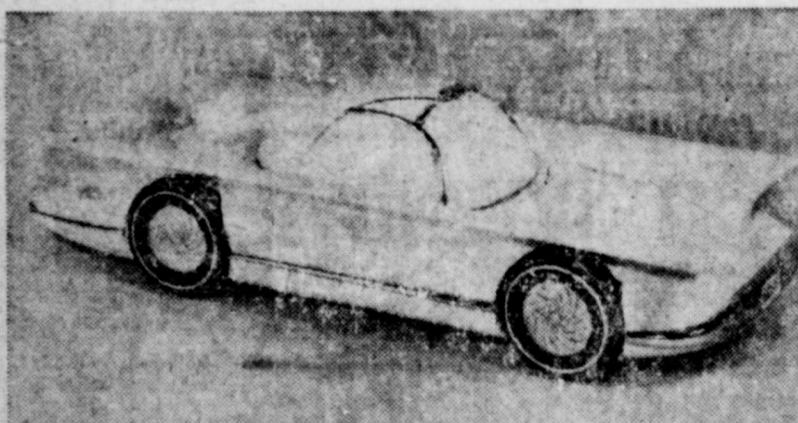

From the Lincoln Times, Lincoln, N. C.: Recent surveys have shown that the population of the world is increasing by some 45,000,000 citizens a year. The boom in world population began after World War II and is continuing steadily.

Because there are no longer many large areas of productive land open for migration, and because the world has shrunk and population increased daily, a problem is to be faced, eventually, concerning the feeding, clothing and housing of our steadily increasing population.

Birth rates, of course, are the highest in under-developed countries, where people are never adequately fed, clothed or sheltered. In fact, it is reported that more than half the people on earth today are hungry.

Unless scientific and technological improvements can keep pace, and then some, with the growing population, millions and millions of babies and young people will continue to go hungry, and the figure might even increase. This aggravates an already pressing population problem, especially in countries like China and India.

All of which brings us around to the question of outer space. There are some who wonder why scientists and defense officials are

making plans to travel to outer space in time it may be that we will need the undeveloped lands or productive surface areas of some of the planets that surround us.

From The Independent, Laguna Springs, N. C.: Too many government officials display an alarming desire to conduct public business in private. The American Society of Newspaper Editors and other newspaper groups recently appealed for action which might make it more difficult for federal officials to ignore the right of the people to know.

The Society has urged passage of a pending bill which would assure that a law passed by Congress 109 years ago cannot be used to keep information secret today. As might be expected, the change is opposed by government departments. In a sense this is understandable. The ability to decide what information should be made public is a kind of power, and officials surrender power with reluctance.

No reasonable person will dispute the necessity of keeping some information secret. When our national security is involved, most people are willing to suspend their right to know.

About Your Health

A special eight-member committee within the State Health Department is now at work trying to unravel one of the knottiest problems of the day: What causes accidents and how can they be prevented?

Accidents are the fourth leading cause of death in Texas and the nation generally. Of all the patients in America's 6,000 hospitals, almost seven percent are victims of accidents. Thirty-two of every 100 patients seen in hospital emergency rooms are accident cases. The care of accident victims in hospitals cost upwards

of \$350 million every year.

If it were not for preventable accidents, our shortage of hospital beds would not be nearly as acute as it is. At least 50,500 beds are presented devoted to accident patients—beds desperately needed for sufferers of non-preventable chronic diseases.

There is one bright spot in the accident picture, however. State Health Department records show a noticeable decrease in death rates from motor vehicle mishaps for the past few months. Perhaps this is due to state and national educational campaigns.

As for accidents of other types, little improvement can be seen, despite the time and money spent on mass educational drives to alert the public to hazards of their environment. Accidents still happen with appalling frequency even where no hazards exist.

We know the ages most susceptible to accidents, the most prevalent types, and that males are more liable than females. We know the results—how accidents main and kill—but much of their cause and methods of prevention remains puzzles yet to be solved.

This is the mammoth task assigned to the new health department committee. With each member an authority in his own field, the committee is composed of specialists in nursing, health education, occupational health, vital statistics, engineering, mental health, maternal and child health, and foods and drugs.

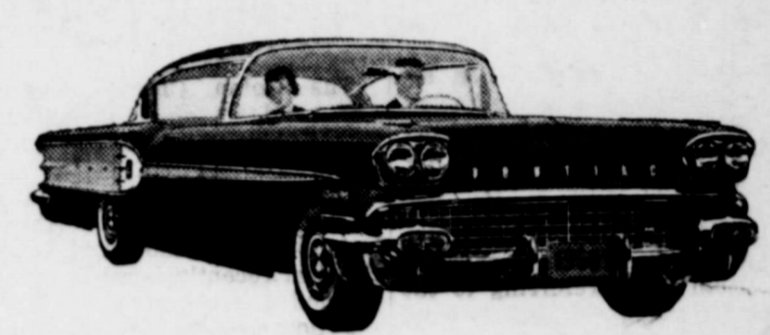
Studies by competent researchers show that only 15 of every 100 accidents happen purely by chance. The rest are products of human failings—haste, inattention, preoccupation, distraction—all of which may result from the emotional strain of anxiety, anger, fear, frustration, hate aggression, or guilt.

As a strat on their enormously complex task, the new health department committee will attempt to correlate accidents with biologic conditions such as fatigue, temporary stress-produced inattention, impaired vision or hearing, or underlying disease.

Their findings may open up a whole new approach to the control of accidents.

TO repair ruts made in floors by moving heavy furniture, sand the ruts to remove paint, shellac or wax. Fill ruts with plastic wood, building them a little higher than remaining floor surface. When dry, sand down and touch up with paint or shellac.

Cheese-Vegetable Bake
(Serves 12)

- 4 cups cooked rice
- 2 packages quicken frozen green beans
- 2 1/2 cups shredded American cheese
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup minced onion
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Mix rice, beans and 2 cups of cheese. Combine with remaining ingredients. Place in 3-quart buttered casserole. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for 40 to 45 minutes or until firm.

have become dingy looking. This is effective in a room where one wall is papered. Coat the paper covering with two coats of lacquer.

Before painting outside stairs, fill in all cracks with caulking material. Let dry and go over that portion with the paint before painting the whole stairs.

If you have patched cracks and holes in plastered walls, build the patch out a little more than the wall so it can be sanded with fine paper to be smooth and level when it dries.

Install attractive glass or metal shelves in the bathroom to hold jars of cosmetics if you lack space in the medicine cabinet.

When sewing a very lightweight fabric like silk or organdie you can prevent puckering by placing a piece of tissue paper underneath the material and sewing right through it. It's easy to tear off when the sewing is completed.
