PARIMUTUEL BETTING on horse and/or dog races is a debate which has been held in Texas for over 50 years. The issue comes and goes, usually as some new group or individual tries its luck at promoting the legalized betting issue.

Now, after all of these years of debate, it finally may be a need for additional taxes that helps out the horse-racing crowd's side of the debate.

This week, the state's legislature, meeting in special session, voted to put the issue to the state's voters, as a proposed constitutional amendment. Governor White must approve the measure before it is put to the voters.

Another issue which may face the voters is that of a state lottery, another of the controversial methods of raising taxes which has been proposed to the state legislature.

Letting the voters decide on the issues is no doubt the best approach, but there is just one drawback, as this writer sees it.

It would be fine if the voters could have the opportunity to vote on these vital issues in this year's election, which features the red-hot governor's race, and a number of other state-wide races. A good turnout of voters is assured, which would make for an excellent sampling of the voters' wishes on the betting issue.

However, authorities say it is not possible to get the new propositions on a statewide ballot before November of 1987. We have a one-word reaction to that: Boo!!!

Putting the issue to a statewide vote in an off-year election is definitely a hit and miss proposition.

As an editor and publisher, we have watched the results of these constitutional elections for some 25 years. Whenever they are held on the off years, you get an extremely low percentage of the voters taking part.

Sometimes you see as few as 100,000 people taking part in an election of this sort on a statewide basis—realizing that the city of Houston could for all practical purposes settle the issue for the rest of the state—especially if they should have a hot mayor's race at the same time. And this sort of thing has happened in the past.

We realize that there is a certain amount of legal requirements that have to be met before the propositions can be placed on a statewide ballot. This is the reason that officials say there is no way the propositions can be included on this November's ballot.

If that is true, it is very unfortunate, and will more or less deprive the state of having a true picture of its voters' wishes on such an issue.

Former Governor Bill Clements' campaign charge, that he urged Governor White in February to call a special session, to deal with the problem of the state's deficit, and that the governor said at the time a special session was unnecessary, begins to loom even larger in importance.

If indeed, such a recommendation was ignored for over six months, then this procrastination on Governor White's part may have hurt the state and its voters in more ways than meets the eye.

Cheerleaders Attend Camp

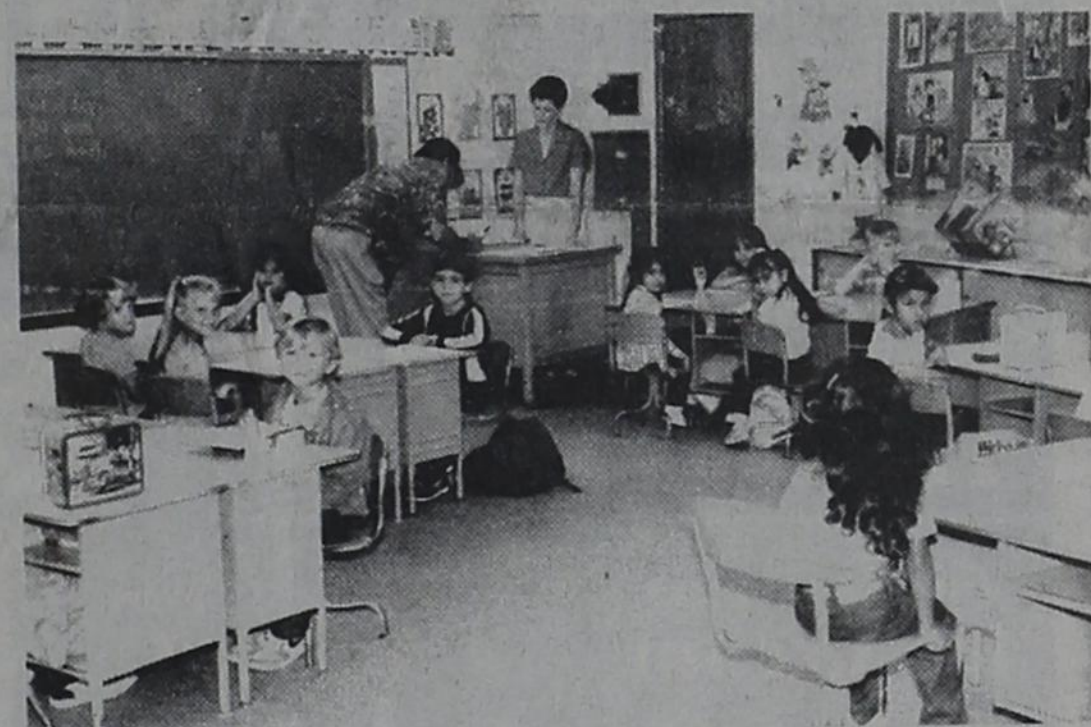
The Bovina Junior High School cheerleaders attended Cheerleading Camp at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales July 7-10.

The Mustangs got off to a slow start offensively in the scrimmage. Meadow scored the first two touchdowns, before Todd Ware broke the ice for Bovina by running 70 yards for a score.

That was Bovina's only real threat to score during the entire evening.

"I felt that our defensive line and linebackers played well," Talley said. Coaches singled out tackles Tom Fuentes and Kenny McLaughlin, and defensive back Vicente Munoz for their good defensive play.

On offense, Talley said Hippy Gomez looked good at the quarterback position, showing some promise.

The Mustangs escaped the scrimmage with just the regular bumps and bruises, which was good news, since the team once again is lacking in depth.

"The boys reported in pretty good physical condition, and have been working hard. Hopefully, this will reduce their chances for injury," Talley added.

The Happy Cowboys will be the opponents for the Bovina Mustangs when the Mustangs play host to the Cowboys in the opening game of the 1986 season Friday at Mustang Stadium. Game time is 8 p.m.

Although the Mustangs would like nothing better than to shake off the frustrations of a pair of years without a win, they have their work cut out for them in the season opener.

Happy downed the Mustangs, 35-0 in last year's game, and has returned back at almost all of the team's "skill" positions. This includes the quarterback position, where Mace Middleton will start for the third straight year.

The Cowboys also have running backs Jimmy Moore and Gaylon Johnson, both seniors, plus ends Jessie Sosa and Justin Clark, all back from their 1985 team.

"I feel we'll give a good account of ourselves. The kids got a good workout in their scrimmage last week, and I think it should help us considerably," said Bovina Coach Bill Talley.

Talley said that the team had some "moral victories" last season, but this time around, they are out for the "real thing." "A moral victory is fine, but what we need is a real win," Talley said.

In addition to some experience, the Cowboys also will have some good size, with junior tackle Chris Cogburn weighing in at 240 pounds, and junior Rowdy Bryan (5-11, 205) giving a lot of beef to their starting line.

The Mustangs should have been loaded with a little more experience for the 1986 season, except for four players who opted not to play football this time around.

But Coach Talley and his assistants have rallied to find a group of willing candidates for the team.

The team's offense will be led by

hard-running Todd Ware (5-10, 180), junior fullback who was the team's leading rusher a year ago. Ware also plays linebacker on defense.

Hippy Gomez and Homer Renteria will see a lot of action in the backfield. Gomez may split time between the tailback slot and at quarterback, where Albert Espinosa has the current edge.

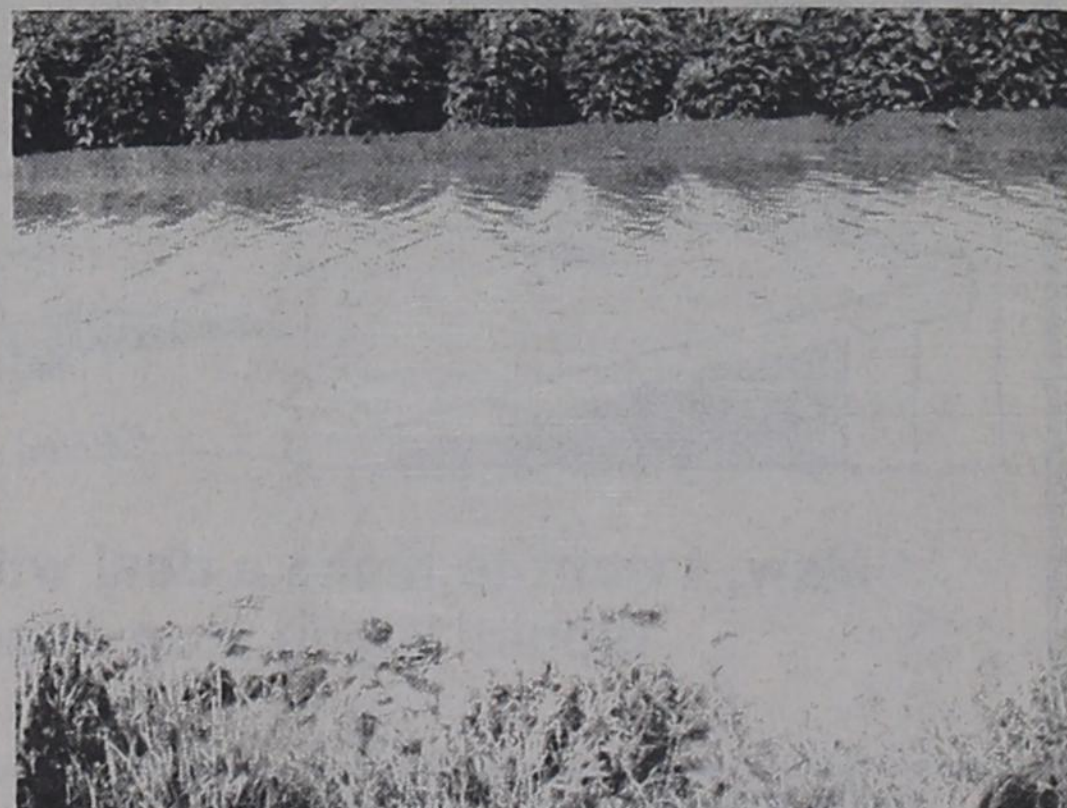
T. Stanberry Is Burned In Accident

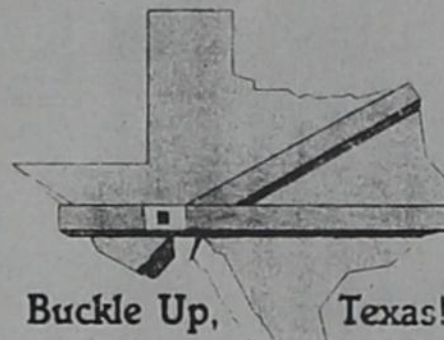

Sesquicentennial Notes

St. Ann's Catholic Church, Bovina, Texas history continued:

"June 16, 1920 was a red-letter day in the annals of the Friars, for on that day Fr. Salvator and Bro. James left Graynoor to make the first missionary foundation of the Franciscan Friars of the atonement. It was under the administration of Fr. Salvator that St. Ann's Church was remodeled with the financial aid of \$500 received from the Catholic Church Extension Society.

Subsequent pastors of St. Anthony's parish, Hereford, ministering also to the spiritual needs of our community in Bovina were: Friars Mathias Gilberg, 1932-37, Nathaniel Madden, 1937-43, Albert Heald, 1943-49, Dominic Kenny, 1949-52, Bartholomew Peytas, 1952-57, Michael Sugrue, 1957-58 and Aloysius Craven, 1958-61.

Assistants during those years were Friars Stanley Crocchiola, John Baptist Shadd, Apollinaris Milano, James Salvi and Andrew Lewis.

May 1959 Fr. Declan Gilligan was assigned to Hereford to assist Fr. Aloysius and began to minister to the needs of the parishioners in Bovina. Recognizing the growing needs and the expanding Apostolate, St. Ann's Parish with St. Teresa's Church of Friona as a mission was erected March 15,

1960. Fr. Declan became the first resident priest and pastor.

Fr. Declan first lived in a rented house in Bovina. October 1960, construction began for a rectory, a two bedroom house was purchased in Lubbock for \$5700 and moved to Bovina. The interior and the painting was completed by local carpenters and parishioners. The new rectory was dedicated March 12, 1961 by Bishop John Morkovsky of Amarillo.

Noticing the need for a meeting place, Father Declan decided to seek a way to obtain a hall. May 1962, a large building was purchased and moved to the northeast side of the church. The parishioners worked together to finish a remodeling program. Equipped with kitchen and wash rooms, it was completed by June 1962. Built, too under his direction, was a new entrance to the church that provided additional room for an expanding congregation and protection from the weather. Mr. S.A. Brito was in charge of the work. In Friona, Fr. Declan directed the construction of St. Teresa's Church, a mission of St. Ann's. The church was finished and dedicated May 1962. Shortly thereafter, Fr. Declan returned to Graymoor for reassignment."
