Tarleton Relays Set For March 21

Athletic Director H. A. (Sandy) Sanford revealed this week that the date for the eighth Annual Tarleton Relays has been set for March 21

The meet will include high schools in the 4A and 3A classification in one division and 2A. 1A, and B schools in the second division.

The Tarleton Relays have proven to be one of the most popular high school track events in central Texas and the TSC stadium has been the site of several outstanding performances in the schoolboy events. Last year hundreds of spectators and contestants watched John Cooper, Technical High School student run the mile in 4:30.7 to break his own record for the Relays at the same time clocking one of the fastest times ever recorded by a Texas high school runner. Cooper is now at North Texas State College.

Sanford, who has become something of a specialist in the scheduling and conduction of largescale track meets, said this week that two special awards will be made this year. He said that a watch will be given to the winning coach from the high school scoring the most points in each division.
