

"Something should have been done long before now," many district residents are saying. "We have already lost many of our small, independent oil producers, service and supply businesses and thousands of jobs for our workers just because Congress refuses to take any kind of action which will restore some kind of economic sanity to the oil industry."

Blaming Congressman Larry Combest for not taking the lead to impose an oil import tariff, Gerald McCathern, democratic nominee for Congress, said, "It has not been over six months since OPEC took our oil industry hostage, and Larry hasn't raised a finger in Congress to implement any kind of measures which would assure our oil producers that the U.S. intends to put America first when it comes to protecting our most important energy industry.

McCathern said that he has supported a tariff on oil imports from the very beginning of the crisis which would stabilize prices at the average cost of production - somewhere around \$20 a barrel according to most analysts-but that Combest opposed any such protection because it was contrary to the Administration's free-trade policy, changing his mind as the election approached and only after much of the oil industry was forced into bankruptcy.

"There is no such thing as free-trade," McCathern said. "The U.S. is an island of free-trade in an ocean of protectionism, and to pursue a free-trade policy under those conditions will result in the total destruction of all of our major in-





Gerald McCathern on the issues: An in-depth interview

To provide 19th District voters with a sense of where he stands on the issues facing our area and our nation, Gerald McCathern recently sat down and answered a series of questions posed to him by a reporter friend

REPORTER: Gerald, tell us why you decided to run for Congress.

MCCATHERN: Certainly. Most folks in the district know that for over twenty years I have been working in community organizations and farm organizations, both on a local level and a national level, to try to influence national economic policy in a direction which would benefit our local economy and the people of our district. During that time I have been very concerned that we were unable to develop a balanced economy where our local industries, our small businesses, our main street merchants, our workers and our oil and agriculture producers could all share in the nation's prosperity.

We all know that the two basic industries of the 19th district, those which generate the majority of the jobs for our workers as well as the need for all of our service and supply businesses, are petroleum and agriculture.
