There should be no difficulty encountered in selling the seed on a good market since there has been a market in Anson and Abilene in past years. Guar beans are processed into high protein feed, mucilage (from seed coat) and other industrial uses and there has been a growing demand for the beans from Texas processing plants.

Guar is a tap rooted plant, similar to cotton and sends a long root into the soil. This characteristic makes it a more drought resistant plant and at the same time penetrates into and beneath

Guar can be planted from Mar. to July in normal width rows at from 5 to 6 pounds per acre, at depts of 1/2 to 2 inches. A mininimum of changes are necessary in order to harvest it with the farm type combine.

With the present grain sorghum prices Mr. Brown believes that guar could be expected to bring in an equal net return to the producer plus getting soil building benefits from the legume.


