J. O. Musick general manager of the Texas Safety Association, made the above statement today lawn equipment: as he cautioned Texans to take "extra care" when using power mowers, edgers and clippers.

"Handy as the mechanization of lawn tools may be, they also have at least one disadvantage; that is that they can be extremely dangerous when handled by an inexperienced or careless worker," he said.

Newcomers are a 3 per cent tax on jewelry and furs, a 3 per cent tax on hotel and motel room rentals, 3 per cent on boats, motors, cameras, air conditioners, 25 per cent on tobacco products other than cigarettes.

Taxes on cigarettes will go up 3 cents a pack; liquor and wine, 20 per cent; motor vehicle sales. from 1.1 to 1.5 per cent. Utility gross receipts will go

up 20 per cent, and the corporation franchise tax will go up by 75 cents per \$1,000 capita lfor one year, 50 cents per \$1,000 thereafter.

With the men of the house slipping out to their favorite fishing haunts these days, we should have more of this healthful food to serve. And if the anglers are as successful as they would have others believe, you should have an over supply—which can be an over supply—which can be preserved in your freezer. Fish is extremely perishable and must be handled carefully and quickly if it is to be kept fresh and fit for the table at a future date. **To prepare fish** for freezing, first clean, then rinse in salt water. Drain and wipe nearly dry. Use folded nices of transparent plas-

folded pieces of transparent plas-tic wrap between individual fish so they can be easily separated before cooking. Wrap the fish tightly in the film and seal with freezer tape. A good idea is to mark the tape with the name of the fish and the date it was caught.

The markings not only help Dad and the boys prove what they caught and when, but show you which to cook first.


If you use a special board for fish cleaning, keep it sweet and odorless by washing it with a solution of household lye. A teaspoon in a quart of water makes an excellent odorless disinfect-ant. Rinse thoroughly after you have done your clean-up job. Filter cloths used in coffee

makers can be kept "swcet" by washing them in clear, cool water right after using. Never use soap or other cleaners on the filters. Clothesline props can be kept

Coolinesine props can be kept from falling, even on the windi-est day, by screwing a cup hook into the "V" at the top of the prop. The hook will fit over the line and hold the prop steady. A spring clothespin tacked up near your cleaning supplies or work bench will hold your work gloves in a readily accessible gloves in a readily accessible place and also give gloves a bet-ter opportunity to dry out.
