### **Badgers Lose** To Clyde, 54-40

The Clyde Bulldogs won the District 10-A cage championship by beating Merkel's Badgers, 54-40. there Tuesday night.

The win gave Clyde the right to represent the district in the championship playoffs. Their first opponent will be 9-A champ Llano in bi-district action, with the time and place of the forthcoming tilt to be determined at a later date.

The loss put Merkel in third place in the final district standings with a 4-4 mark behind Albany (5-3) and the champion Bulldogs, who finished with a 6-2 league mark.

The Badgers from Merkel held a brief lead in the first quarter but the Bullodgs overcame the deficit near the end of the stanza and from then on were never

Johnny Paylor, 5-11 guard, paced Clyde's scoring with 17 points but had plenty of help from center Joe South who tallied 14. James Bible with 13 and Ronnte Reeger with 12 were the big guns in the Badger attack.

Clyde's girls finished district play undefeated by climaxing their 8-0 league mark with a 36-33 victory over Merkel. Linda Kemper was high for the winners with 22 and Sue Modroll led the losers with 19. The girls from Clyde will play the winner of a bi-district play.



The other son, Childress, was two years old at the time.

Their mother taught school and later became county superintendent, always taking the two boys with her as there were no baby sitters in those days.

To help get his education, Dr. Sadler taught mathmatics in Palestine High School for two years. He graduated from the Texas School of Medicine in 1925.

When the doctor came to Merkel, Noodle Dome was a big oil field and industrial work alone was enough to keep several doctors busy. In 1929 he married Mary Cleo Booth of Merkel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. R Booth. She had been an English teacher in Merkel High School for three years.

In 1933 the Sadler's daughter, Sandra Lu, now Mrs. Bill Haynes, was born.

In 1941 Sue Mayfield moved into her aunt and uncle's home because of the serious illness of her father. When he died, Sue, now Mrs. Oris Revnolds, continded to live with the Sadlers and to be reared as a second daugh-
