

# Medical Clinic Now In Sight

In four hours Sunday afternoon almost 100 workers in the general campaign of Bovina Clinic Fund raised cash contributions and pledges totaling over \$14,000. Monday and Tuesday pledges brought the amount now on hand to \$38,500.
