He has had to have four transfusions in two weeks. Funds are being raised by

friends of the family, including Sanders, A. C. Ted Bland and Mrs. R. M. Doggett of Clyde.

Contributions have been made by several policemen, and business firms throughout the city.

Williams recently became a truck driver for W. P. Wright & Son oil distributors. Before moving to Abilene, the family lived in Merkel. Randy was a third grade student at College Heights Elementary School in Abilene before being hospitalized.

Although the fund is not being sponsored by the Police Dept. as a body, contributions can be made to the Randy Williams fund mailed in care of the Abilene Police Dept., N. 2nd and Cedar Sts., Sanders said.

## Womble Is Dist. Head Of Texas Demos For Nixon

John Womble, Abilene business man and civic leader, has accepted appointment as chairman of the 24th State Senatorial District for the Texas Democrats for Nixon-Lodge campaign, it was announced.

Womble's appointment was made by former Governor Allan Shivers, state chairman of the Nixon-Lodge campaign among the Democrats.

Womble said today that heavy emphasis would be laid during the campaign in his district on the socialistic aspects of the Kennedy platform as compared with Texans' philosophy of government.

"The Kennedy platform is for nearly everything Texans are against, and against nearly everything Texans are for," he said.

"I agree wholeheartedly with former Governor Shivers that this country cannot afford to wander off with Kennedy and his 'new frontiers' when the world is on fire and needs experience and maturity at the helm."

Womble said he, like thousands of other Texans were convinced that the platform on which Kennedy-Johnson ticket was basing its campaign would lead to a further concentration of federal government power and a weakening of local and state governments.

"The most sensible approach to our problems today can be found in the State Democratic platform, adopted a few weeks ago in Dallas, which is in direct conflict with and repudiates the Kennedy platform."

"And in accepting this appointment I am happy to be able to say I support the principles and purposes of the State Democratic platform, as directed by our Texas delegates to the State convention."

The 24th district embraces the following counties: Borden, Seury, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Dickens, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan and Taylor.

## RAIN CAUSES SEVERE CROP DAMAGE IN AREA

With the cotton harvest incomplete, the past seven days of wet weather has caused considerable crop damage throughout this area.

Forty minutes of hail in the center of Mulberry Canyon stripped the cotton and caused an estimated damage of \$2,700 to Pioneer Memorial Church and parsonage.

Tom Russom, who farms in that area, reports his crop a total loss with some of his neighbors reporting anywhere from 50 per cent to total loss.

Russom said the storm, which showered hail stones larger than a baseball on the area, was reported to be the worst in the history of the Canyon.

About two inches of rain was gauged at Merkel Fire Station by Chester McWilliams. A gauge one mile north of Merkel, registered three inches for the seven day total, with light rain still falling Wednesday afternoon.

Ranges were benefited from the moisture. Stockmen were assured of a good winter grass crop.

WACO—(Spl.) — The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors has voted to establish a trade development and bargaining organization as a means of expanding markets and increasing incomes of Texas farmers and ranchers. The organization would work closely with the American Farm Bureau Federation's foreign trade

corporation in developing new markets for Texas agricultural products. It would also act as a bargaining agent on behalf of farmers and ranchers in order to obtain better prices and more stable markets in the U. S. Details of the new venture have not been worked out, according to J. H. West, president of the

Texas Farm Bureau. He emphasized that the organizational phase of the state Farm Bureau subsidiary will proceed slowly and cautiously in order to avoid making mistakes.

The American Farm Bureau Federation, parent national organization of the Texas Farm Bureau, has already established two separate organizations, one dealing with trade development and the other with bargaining in the domestic market. The state organization to be established by the TFB would be affiliated with the AFBF trade and bargaining organizations and would complement and supplement the work of the AFBF subsidiaries within the state of Texas, West said.

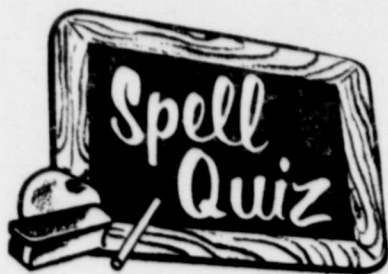

## Home Demonstration Notes

By LOKETA ALLEN

Ever see a jersey dress that sagged at the seams or seemed stretched out of shape? Proper cutting and construction technique can help prevent this condition.

Here are some factors to keep in mind.

Correct grain line on every pattern piece is most important in assuring the right drape and hang of the garment.

Jersey is a knit fabric with yarns looped together rather than interlaced as in a woven fabric. To find grain line, locate and mark a continuous lengthwise rib on the right side of fabric. Use chalk or a basting line to mark Lay fabric smoothly and easily on flat surface and place grain line markings of all pattern pieces straight with rib of fabric.

If the jersey fabric slips or stretches very easily, pin to heavy paper before cutting out pattern pieces.

Stay-stitch all curved and bias edges with matching thread, using short stitches to hold edges true and prevent stretching.

When machine stitching, use a fine sharp needle and keep tension loose. Best thread to use is silk, nylon or dacron as all have "plasticity" to match the stretch of jersey. Cotton thread can be used. Stretch the fabric a little as you sew to keep the seam elastic.

Sweet potatoes offer food value and fuel for energy. Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A & M College, reminds us that the TEXAS FOOD STANDARD calls for a serving of potatoes—sweet or Irish—every day.

Baking sweet potatoes retains much of the flavor and food value, and saves time for the cook. All you do is to wash and dry the potato; greasing before baking serves no real purpose. Bake one

hour in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for medium sized potatoes.

Potatoes may "leak" if baked too long or with too high heat. Test for doneness by pressing rather than puncturing with a fork.

Left over sweet potatoes will keep several days in the refrigerator. Serve them mashed, fried or candied. Citrus juices, tart apples and nuts combine well with the flavor of sweet potatoes.

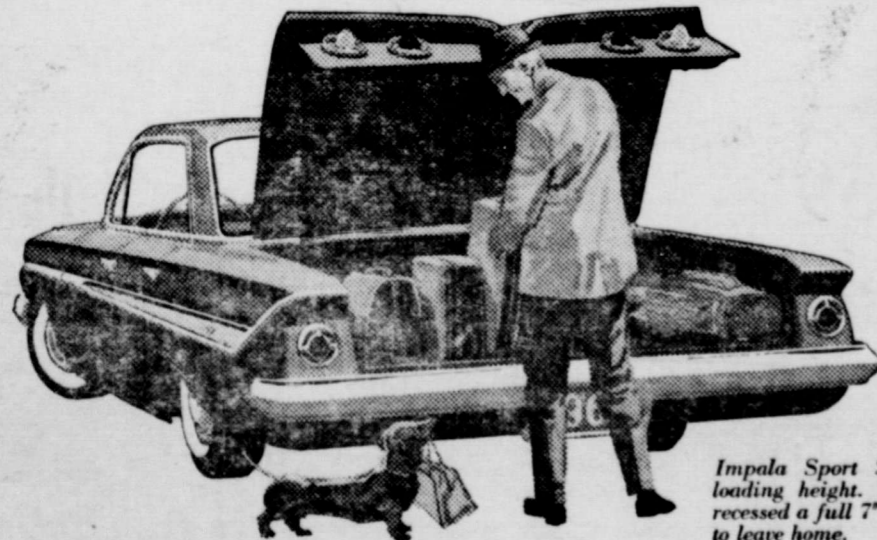

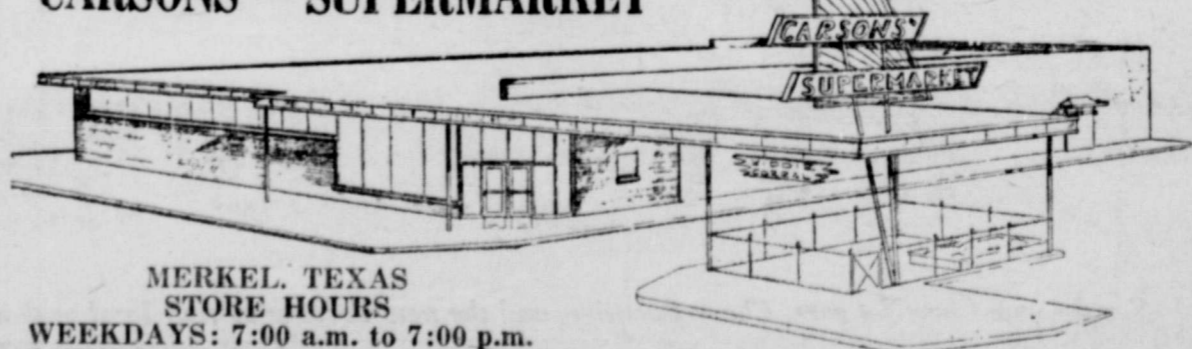
