
CONGRATULATIONS TO the Bovina Fillies, on one of the most exciting playoff games it has been our pleasure to watch in many a moon.

Mustangs Get In Action Thursday

The Bovina Mustangs get their shot at the playoffs on Thursday at Sundown, when they meet the Seagraves Eagles in a game beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The Mustangs take a 24-6 record into the game. They were 8-2 as champions of district 5-2A for the second straight year.

Seagraves, 22-4, won the runnerup position in District 6-2A, after a 59-47 win over Shallowater last Friday to settle the second playoff team in the district. Bovina had played and beat Shallowater last February in the bidistrict playoffs.


Coach Marks Lanham says the Eagles will be a tough team, with their excellent size and quickness.


They have a 6-3 senior, Owen Floyd (number 30 last Friday), who takes care of the rebound department for the Eagles. Darin Griffin, a 6-0 senior (number 10) has excellent quickness. Russell Davis, a six-foot junior, is described as an excellent shooter. Davis was the leading scorer against Shallowater with 21 points.

"The outcome of the game will depend on how we battle them on the boards, and if we can keep from turning the ball over on the press," Lanham said.

The Eagles like to press, and Coach Lanham said the Mustangs got a good workout in that department Saturday night when they met the Dimmitt Bobcats, a class AAA playoff team, in a practice game.

If Bovina wins its game Thursday, the Mustangs will meet the winner of the Clint vs McCamey game next Tuesday. Clint was Bovina's opponent a year ago in the area playoffs.

The team was playing without Henderson Griggs, who had a conflict. His absence hurt the team on the boards, Lanham said. Richard Shepherd scored 25 points on Saturday and another 29 on Monday.

Fillies Win Cliff-Hanger Over Morton, 46-45

It had been almost 20 years since the Bovina High School Fillies had appeared in the basketball playoffs, so when they finally made it to a postseason game, the team gave their fans something to remember.

The Fillies outlasted the Morton Indian Maidens, 46-45 in a pressurepacked bi-district playoff last Friday night at Texan Dome in Levelland.

The game rocked back and forth with first one, then the other team being in the lead, neither ever having a secure advantage (although Bovina had a seven-point lead early in the second quarter).

And the game's outcome was not safe until the final buzzer sounded with the Fillies holding onto the slightest of leads for the win.

The Fillies, as they have done throughout their successful season, relied on the play of some talented underclassmen.

Underclassmen like post-girl Marie Pesch, who banged in 22 points and did a creditable job on the boards, despite Morton's large players, and despite drawing three fouls early in the game.

And then there was Terisa Shepherd, another sophomore, who came in to give the team a lift on both offense and defense. Miss Shepherd ended up as runnerup in scoring with ten points, but one of her defensive plays may have saved the day for the Fillies.

Freshman Mindy Neal also performed well in the clutch, doing a good job on the boards while replacing Miss Pesch. She also hit three of four free throws down the stretch, when every point was vital.

"We started off real tight," said Coach Marks Lanham. After Marie Pesch gave the Fillies a brief 2-0 lead, Morton scored three straight baskets

for a 6-2 edge midway through the quarter.

But then Miss Pesch sank a pair of free throws, and after Randee Cupit made good on one of two tries from the line, Marie sank a jump shot from the circle, was fouled, and converted the extra shot for an 8-6 Bovina lead.

Another Pesch basket made it 10-6, and after Morton scored, Miss Shepherd hit two for two at the line and Bovina had a 12-9 lead at the quarter's end.

Shana Gober took the tip to start the second quarter and drove for a basket; the Fillies then stole the ball for a Shepherd jump shot which gave Bovina its longest lead of the game at 16-9.

The celebration was short-lived, when Pesch received her third personal foul with over five minutes left in the half. She immediately came to the bench.

Morton used the occasion to trim a 17-11 Bovina lead to 17-15, and after Cupit hit a free throw, Morton's Reena Lynch scored for an 18-17 score.

Miss Shepherd sank a lay-up for a 20-17 Bovina lead with 40 seconds left, but Morton finished with a flurry, scoring five quick points. Kim Lyon's free throw tied the score at 20 with ten seconds left, and Jo Ann Joyce's hook shot banked in with a second left, gave Morton the halftime lead, 22-20.

It looked bad for the Fillies when Morton scored the first three baskets of the third quarter, quickly taking a 28-20 lead, their longest of the game.

But then it was Bovina's time to score eight unanswered points. Stacey Whitecotton got it started with a jump shot. Then Marie Pesch, in quick succession, canned a jump shot, drove the lane for a hook shot, and clicked on a turning jump shot

Suddenly the score was tied, 28-all.

"When we had that eight-point rally, I felt like we had a chance to win. If we hadn't done that, it might have been a different story," Coach Lanham reflected.

Pesch's two free throws gave the Fillies a 32-30 lead with 38 seconds left in the period, but Gracie Grigsby's shot with two seconds left tied it, 32-all.

The fourth quarter was a series of momentum switches. Free throws helped Bovina take a 34-32 lead, but Morton rallied to tie the score at 36 and then led on baskets by Joyce, at 38-36 and 40-38.

At this point, Miss Shepherd knocked the ball out of the hand of Morton's Zarla Ray, who was about to drive the lane, saving an almost sure basket. As it was, the Indian Maids scored their next trip down, and Morton had a four-point lead, 42-38.

But the Fillies didn't crack. Shana Gober sank a long jump shot for a 40-42 score, and Miss Shepherd was perfect from the corner to knot the score at 42, with two minutes to play.

Morton led 43-42 after a free shot, but Miss Pesch's turning jumper gave her team the lead, 44-43. With 1:01 left, Pesch sank a free throw for a 45-43 score, and with 28 ticks remaining, made one of two for a 46-43 lead.

But the outcome wasn't a lead-pipe cinch yet. Jo Ann Joyce scored from close in for a 46-45 score with 15 seconds left, and the Indian Maids managed to steal the ball in the last ten seconds, but a desperation shot bounced off the rim of the basket and Gober grabbed the rebound. Bovina held onto the ball the last five seconds.

The Fillies won the game on free throws, hitting 16 of 25 (64 per cent). Morton outscored them from the field, 38-30. The Indian Maids hit only seven of 13 shots from the foul line.

It was a bruising game, not necessarily reflected in the foul totals, where Bovina had 15 and Morton 18.

Grid Honors

Three Fort Hays State football players received All-American Honorable Mention for the 1983 season. One of these was Richard Lowe, senior offensive tackle.

In Lowe's two years at Fort Hays State University, Hays, Kansas, he was a first team starter and was named All-District and All-Conference first team both years.

Fort Hays State is in District 10 of the Central States Intercollegiate Conference, NAIA Division I.

Richard is the son of Gene and Barbara Lowe of Bovina. Methodist Church, the Masonic Lodge and the Rotary Club. He is a graduate of Texas Tech, and is chairman of the Parmer County Historical Association. As a member of the historical group, Moseley has helped compile the two Parmer County history books.

He and his wife, Wilma are parents of a son, David, a junior high student at Farwell.

Playoff Possibilities For Fillies Given

Having claimed the school's first playoff win in 20 years in girls basketball, the Fillies were competing Tuesday night in the area playoffs, meeting the Wall Hawks at Big Spring.

The Wall team, which scored a fairly easy win over Presidio in the districts 7 and 8-2A playoff game last Friday, was said to have a girl (Tracy Morton) who was about 5-11, with an average of over 20 points per game.

"They have a strong inside game, and run a slow, deliberate offense. They hold their composure well," said Coach Marks Lanham.

The Wall team is no stranger to the playoffs, having competed in last year's regional tournament, and having four players returning from that team. Their season record was not available at press time.

The Fillies, meanwhile, carry a 22-7 record into the game.

A win would advance the team into the regional tournament, this Friday and Saturday at Lubbock.

The regional semi-finals are scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Friday with the finals slated early Saturday afternoon.



-----School Corner-----

I accept the fact that some changes need to be made in our educational system, but I am very much against change just for the sake of change. I believe that we, in Bovina, are fortunate to have a group of teachers who strive each day to do their job a little better. I know that it has to be a little frustrating when everything that is published concerning education points to how bad a job we are doing.

I know that we do not have the perfect system in Bovina, but we do have one that I am proud of. We have a staff that in my estimation is made up of "winners." Because of this I get a little angry when what I read and hear concerning education is all negative.

We must accept the fact that education is a simple business at its core. A teacher gives a student an opportunity to learn something, usually by showing or telling; then the teacher gives the student the opportunity to demonstrate what he has learned; and finally the teacher monitors the product of the student's effort. All three steps are necessary. Because education is a simple business, we should put emphasis on doing basic things well. If teacher and student, in purposeful fashion, spend time on the basics, their efforts yield results. If either the teacher or the student begrudges the necessary time and effort to do the job well, the education process will fail.

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I believe that our critics have failed to take into consideration that the education process takes effort on the part of both teacher and student. This expands to effort on the part of home and community.

Let's not kid ourselves: A good education is not a gift--it's a victory. It has to be earned. Good teaching and good learning require purposeful effort and they go hand in hand.

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

The decision to leave McMurry, Murphy said, came after he considered his future and it was a family decision.


"Leaving McMurry will be difficult, and it will definitely be hard next year when they have a chance for

the playoffs, or make the playoffs, but I will be glad that I, hopefully, had a part in it," Murphy said.


Murphy also said that he may not be leaving coaching permanently, and that he could be coaching in a couple of years again.


