

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

The average cost of non-resident fishing licenses in 49 states s \$7.36. In Texas residents and non-residents pay \$2.15 for an annual license. The average price for resident fishing licenses in 19 states is \$2.70.

Iowa and Kansas have the lowest non-resident licenses, other than Texas. They are \$3 each. Indiana charges \$3.50 and Illinois and Indiana charge \$4.

There are 45 states with temporary fishing licenses, average \$3.05 each.
